

# 64-Year-Old Doct or Heads Champion U.S. Polo Team

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — A 64-year-old doctor completed his 11th polo season here early Friday, then quietly hopped a plane for Chicago.

There he will put on white again, but it won't be the white of a doctor's gown.

Dr. R. A. Williams, his white riding pants tucked, will thunder onto the field, the captain of the defending polo champions of the United States.

On Sept. 6 his team, playing as the Dallas Athletic Club, will take on seven others at Hensdale, Ill., to decide the 1959 championship.

Between now and then the doctor interrupted—as it usually is—by an emergency call back to Dallas.

**BACK TO PATIENTS**

"Last year," he said, "I was

forced 11 times to dash off of fields all over the country and get back to some patient in Dallas."

Dr. Williams is a relentless participant in a sport that is too rough and tumble for men half his age.

Asked if polo is dangerous, Dr. Williams replied:

"Well, I don't know what you consider dangerous. I have had 27 fractures in my lifetime and 24 of them were due to polo."

The doctor then meticulously enumerated: "I've had 11 ribs broken, seven hand fractures, five dislocations of the transverse process of vertebrae and one fractured ankle."

Dr. Williams added: "I also had a skull fracture and was unconscious two days but that

# Bike Race Is Set For Labor Day

**SUMMERSIDE** — A big 10-mile bicycle road race emblematic of the provincial championship will be staged again this year on Labor Day for the Victory Cleaners Trophy, raced for annually excepting last year when the race was temporarily discontinued.

A notable change this year will see the race start in the Town of Summerside instead of in Kensington as in former years. This move by the sponsors is designed to permit more people to see the start of the event as well as the finish.

The race will begin this year in front of the Clifton Hotel and the riders will pedal out Water Street East to Read's Corner thence to Traveller's Rest, St. Eleanor's corner, in to Summerside past the Imperial Diner on

Water Street to the Clifton Hotel and then up Central Street to the finish line in front of the Victory Cleaners establishment.

The open event was last run in 1957, but was not raced last year as the road from Kensington over which the course was laid was torn up for paving. The last winner of the annual race was Don MacEachern, St. Eleanor's. Other winners have included Jimmie Fardy, Charlottetown, and Richard Savjant and Windsor Arsenault, Summerside.

In other years up to 15 contestants have taken part and a large entry list is expected this year with contestants expected on the starting line by 9:30 Labor Day morning. Proprietors of Victory Cleaners are Russell and Gordon Kelly, formerly of Charlottetown, who state prizes will also be awarded the second and third place finishers.

# Pan Amer. Games Open Amid Protests, Beefs

CHICAGO (AP) — Canadian fencers and tennis players made a canny showing Friday when the Pan American Games opened amid protests and beefs.

And the United States was humbled by Venezuela in — of all things — baseball.

Montreal — Toronto fencers trounced highly-regarded Chile 11-5 in the first round of foil competition, then followed up by knocking over Mexico by the same score.

John Andru, 25, Toronto, and Carl Schwende, 20, Montreal, both members of Canada's team in the British Empire Games in Cardiff last year, along with Abbey Silverstone, 22, Montreal, and Joseph Vida, 44, Toronto, comprised the winning squad.

In tennis, Canadian champion Bob Bedard, 27, of Sherbrooke, Que., seeded eighth, defeated Daniel Achondo, Chile, 6-3, 6-1, 5-7, 6-3.

Toronto's Don Fontana, 28, Canada's No. 2 player, defeated Ernesto Aguirre of Chile 6-2, 6-4, 6-0.

Bedard, three times winner of the Canadian open, was beaten on Davis Cup teams seven times and Fontana five.

Twenty-year-old John F. Bassett Jr., also of Toronto, hit heavier going when he tangled with Myron Franks of Miami in a second-round match and went down to defeat, 6-1, 6-0, 6-1. He passed the first round with a bye.

The U.S. was roundly beaten in its own national sport, baseball, in the opening game of the competition. Venezuela accomplished the feat 11-6. Jose Flores, a small first-baseman, drove in four runs on three hits for the victors including a home run.

**DOVES RELEASED**

This is the third edition of the 24-country Pan American Games and hemisphere friendships were symbolized at the formal opening ceremonies Thursday when 5,000 doves were released as 2,000 athletes, including the Canadian contingent of some 200, paraded. But some sour notes were sounded Friday.

Venezuela lodged a formal objection against the use of Gen. Eduardo Vanez of Chile as a judge in the equestrian events; Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Mexico and Uruguay charged training facilities were inadequate for the modern pentathlon; and Argentina protested the lack of shells for rowing—a situation that was remedied by the arrival of a flotilla of boats.

The protests and arguments were the almost inevitable result of staging a big sports carnival in a metropolis with far-flung training sites and the resulting difficulty of establishing tight central control.

The complaints about the modern pentathlon setup charged that there was "complete disorganization" and that it had been impossible to practise shooting. Transportation was called inadequate.

**NOT ENOUGH SHELLS**

In rowing a lack of shells has hampered practice. Few of the competing nations could afford the cost of transporting the delicate boats here and at first there were not enough shells to go around.

A fresh batch arrived Friday and eased the situation. The Canadians, using their own shells, were not involved.

Venezuela's complaint against Vanez was that it was not fair to use him as a judge in the equestrian events since he served as a judge at the American try-outs, and in addition was in fact if not in name the head of the Chilean equestrian team.

The U.S.—as well as Canada—won two foil fencing competitions, downing Cuba and Uruguay by identical 13-3 scores. The Americans and the Argentines were considered the teams to beat, but the Argentines were defeated 5-4 by Chile Friday after first trouncing Mexico 9-7. Cuba defeated Venezuela 10-6.

# Sword Dancer Will Miss American Derby Classic

Sword Dancer will be among those missing in the \$100,000 American Derby at Arlington Park today, but the probable field of seven includes plenty of class.

The event is one of the two big money races on the day's program. At Saratoga nine two-year-olds were named for the \$75,000 added Hopedale Stakes, feature event on the final day's card.

The American Derby, to be contested at 1 1/2 miles, has lured several top three-year-olds, including Arnold W. Hanger's Waltz, Clarence Farm's Dancer, and Spring Hill Farm's Spur.

Waltz was a mid-season sensation in the East and Dancer won the Arlington classic. Easy Spur was victor in the Florida Derby, but if he would win today it would be a surprise. He finished last 10 days ago in his first start since the Kentucky Derby, in which he wound up 13th.

Waltz and Dancer loom as the choices. Along with Priscilla D. Willis' Little Tytus, who will be logging 120 pounds.

**\$83,700 TO WINNER**

If all seven start the race will gross \$155,425, with a net of \$83,700 to the winner.

700 to the winner, although Little Tytus as a supplementary entry would net only \$78,925 if he won.

The Hopedale, which will be televised on CBS from 5:30 to 6 p.m. ADT will be run over the 6 1/2-furlong distance, and each entry will carry 122 pounds. With nine starters the race will gross \$114,475, with the winner getting \$73,494.

# Als Whip Argonauts 24-6; Now Tied With Tiger-Cats

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Alouettes combined a balanced attack with a mobile pass defence Friday night to whip Toronto Argonauts 24-6.

The win, before a crowd of 23,927, lifted Montreal into a tie with Hamilton Tiger-Cats for the Big Four Football Union lead. Each team has won two games, but Montreal also has lost one. Hamilton plays Ottawa Rough Riders today.

The Als built up a 17-0 half-time lead with a pair of converted touchdowns and Bill Bewley's field goal, yielded a third-quarter touchdown, and finished up with another converted touchdown in the final quarter.

A hard-charging Montreal line gave quarterback Ronnie Knox little breathing space, and a crew of deep defenders virtually blanketed the receiving area, intercepting five Toronto throws.

John Red O'Quinn, Joel Wells and home brew Tom Moran counted the Montreal 1-0 touchdowns. Bewley made the converts.

Cookie Gilchrist scored for Toronto and missed his convert.

Moran, playing corner linebacker, scored on a 70-yard romp down the sidelines after he jarred the ball loose from Canadian Gerry Doucette with a stiff tackle. He picked up the loose ball and outraced three Argonauts to the end zone.

# Resignation Is 'Device'

**QUEBEC (CP)** — The president of the Quebec County Liberal Association Friday described the recent resignation of the association's secretary as "a well-known device of our enemies."

President Robert Perron said in a statement enemies of the party "arrange for the resignation of some member of one of our Liberal associations... attempting to give the public the impression there is dissension in our ranks."

Gerard Demers resigned as secretary last Monday. He said he was leaving the party to become a member of the Social Democratic (OCF) party because the Liberals were just the same as the Union Nationale party of Premier Duplessis.

"Mr. Demers is a young man who was with our association as secretary only four months," Mr. Perron's statement said. "We will redouble our vigilance to make sure we confer responsibility only on those persons truly worthy of our confidence."

He said the 800 members of the Quebec association are united under the leadership of party head Jean Lesage.

# Argo Halfback Is Remanded

**TORONTO (CP)** — Dave Mann, a halfback with Toronto Argonauts of the Big Four football league, and seven other persons were granted a further remand Wednesday on charges of illegal possession of narcotics.

Special crown attorney T. R. Deacon said the case will be tried at a two-day hearing Sept. 1-3.

Charged with Mann are former airline hostess Gail D'Arcy, 24, salesman Jack Kane, 25, store manager Geraldine Chipman, 24, school teacher Alan Shorter of Newark, N. J., school teacher Gwendolyn Findlay, 22, office secretary Mary Harding, and her brother, William Harding.

Seven of the accused were arrested by RCMP and morality bureau officers in raids on three city apartments, Aug. 11. William Harding was charged after the other seven had appeared in court last Thursday.

Since his arrest Mann has been kept out of the Argonauts' lineup and isn't permitted to practise with the team.

# Bo Winger Cops Halfway Lead In Milwaukee Open

**MILWAUKEE (AP)** — Veteran Bo Winger, winless on pro golf's tournament trail since 1956, calmly sat out a heavy rainstorm and then splashed home with a five-under-par 65 Friday for a one-stroke lead at the halfway mark of the \$35,000 Milwaukee open.

The 36-year-old Oklahoman picked up five birdies with some fine putting to surge into the lead with a 36-hole total of 131.

One stroke back with 132 were former U.S. PGA and Masters champion Doug Ford of Crystal River, Fla., and Doug Sanders from Miami Beach. Ford matched his opening round 66, while Sanders had a 67 to go with his first-day 65.

Winger sank putts ranging from seven to 25 feet before the downpour interrupted play as he left the 14th hole. After a 45-minute delay, he picked up his club and cautiously played out the water-soaked course.

Jerry Magee of Toronto shot a 68 for 137 and Al Balding of Markham, Ont., had a 72 for 151.
