A RADICAL CHANGE PROPOSED—NEW BASIS
FOR THE PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR.—The season of Advent is a solemn
time, and ought to be so considered; a
penitential preparation for the time ap-
pointed by the Church, for the celebration
of the birth of the Incarnate Deity, the
Redeemer of the world from the original
sin and disobedience of Adam. We, as
Christians, ought to take the present op-
portunity for introspection and retrospec-
tion; for looking back to the course of our
past lives, be it as curved, crooked and
dangerous as our Island Railway; and
endeavouring, by the aid of truth,
the Holy Bible, in the hand of the
only trustworthy Commentator,
who standeth at the right hand of the
Majesty on High, to steer a straighter and
a safer course for the time to come. Among
other things, we ought to remember that
"to err is human; to forgive, Divine!"
Let this Truth to all be taught!
Every angry passion healing;
Mercy offend from want of Thought,
Than from want of proper feeling!

Now, to apply this to practice, "Let each
mend himself—and he's sure to mend
ONE!" I do not approve of every par-
ticular paragraph of what you have said,
written, or printed, during the past few
months; but, where we do not agree, we
may at least agree to differ. I do cordially
approve of what you write in one of
your paragraphs, as to the injustice of com-
pelling those who were Tenants, to pay
over again for the land for the confiscation
of which the sum of eight hundred
thousand dollars was handed by the Do-
minion Government to the local Govern-
ment of this Island, that sum being as yet
far from exhausted. I also cordially con-
cur in your opinion that a great reduction
in the number of our law-makers would be
a great advantage, in every point of view.
Sir Robert Peel, who "doubled his income
by doubling the pound, expressed his fear
that "Three Tailors in Tooley street" might
endanger the British constitution. Three
would ensure a casting vote, two to one,
as was the case in the Commission held
under the Land Confiscation
Act in A. D. 1875, making it quite
certain that the decision would be in favor
of the majority, the "proletarian vulgares"
("There's luck in odd numbers, says
Rory O'Moore,") whom you mentioned in
your editorial letter from Halifax. Without
going to extremes, I really think you may
suggest that there might be two Members of
Assembly, for each of our three Counties,
two for Charlottetown, as the great Metro-
polis, one for Georgetown, one for Sum-
merside, and one for Prince Town, which
last city might have its name changed to
Gatton, or Old Sarum,—eleven in all; the
member for Gatton being appointed, ex
officio, as perpetual speaker, to give a cast-
ing vote in case of five members being op-
posed on one side to five on the other. A
Legislative Council, unless it could be heredi-
tary, is, in my opinion, an unnecessary,
and certainly an expensive superfluity.

In conclusion, allow me to say that, con-
sidering your Editorship resides in this
colony, I think you merit much commenda-
tion for the care with which you, in gen-
eral, avoid personalities; when you your-
self have been attacked, you have generally
been able to apply to yourself the words
which Shakespeare has put into the mouth
of Brutus, in the play of "Julius Caesar":
"O Cassius! you are yoked to a Lamb
That carries anger as the flint bears fire;
Who, much enforc'd, shows a hasty spark,
And straight is cold again."
Cassius eventually said, in reply: "Do
you confess so much? Give me your hand!"
as I hope you, Mr. Editor, will do to

The Sarnia correspondent of the London
Free Press has been enquiring into the
manner in which the American officials at
Port Huron have been making up the re-
turns of emigration from Canada with the
following results:—
1st. If a person from Canada crosses the
river on a visit he is put down as an im-
migrant.
2nd. Often calculations of the number of
immigrants are made from the quantity of
baggage, every trunk being supposed to
represent a passenger.
3rd. Lumbermen going through to the
Michigan woods intending to return in the
spring are called immigrants.
4th. All passengers going through to
Manitoba are classed as immigrants.

The revenue still keeps on increasing.
Halifax shows an increase of \$25,000; St.
John, \$25,000, and Toronto \$26,800—or an
increase in the three cities alone in one
month of \$76,800.

The "Agence Russe," of St. Petersburg,
announces that Russia has under considera-
tion the necessary steps for converting
Batoum into a free port; also, that England
has submitted proposals to the Powers for
maintenance of the European concert, with
a view to the settlement of the remaining
provisions of the Treaty of Berlin.

General Foreign News.

The French Chambers will be prorogued
on the 20th inst., and will reassemble on
January 11, 1881.

The manager of the Union (Paris news-
paper) has been sentenced to pay a fine of
500f. for insulting the Tribunal of Conflicts.

Shera Ali, who governed Candahar under
the British throughout the war, has obtain-
ed the Viceroy's permission to retire to
India with his family.

A despatch from Constantinople states
that a body of Albanians "lifted" 1600
Montenegro sheep. Montenegro protested
but the Porte declined responsibility.

A Constantinople despatch says that the
Persian Minister, Mohsin Khan, has sent
the Porte particulars of atrocities by Sheik
Abdullah, demanding his punishment.

Mme. Montifand, a writer of some little
notoriety in Paris, has been sentenced by
default to six months' imprisonment and
500f. fine for offences against public morals.

A despatch from Meshed to the News
says the Russians and Tekkes are inactive.
The Turcomans continue their raids on the
Persian border. Food at Geok-Tepe is
failing.

Mrs. Susan Willis, alias Fletcher, was
arrested on board the steamer Anchoria,
on the arrival of that vessel from New
York in the River Clyde, on a charge of
fraud by means of alleged "spiritualism."

All the difficulties in the negotiations
between Russia and China have not yet
been removed. The question has reached
a stage when mutual concessions are ab-
solutely necessary for a peaceful settle-
ment.

A despatch to the "Times" from Berlin
states that there is a busy agitation afoot in
the Hanse cities for inclusion in the Zoll-
verein. At a meeting in Bremen a resolu-
tion in favor of that course was almost
unanimously adopted.

Prince Hohenlohe will come back from
Paris in time for the next session of the
Reichstag. The report that the Emperor
and Prince Bismarck tried to persuade
Prince Hohenlohe to assume charge of
Foreign Affairs is confirmed. The Prince
declined on private grounds.

The correspondent of the "News" at
Paris reports that the Papal Nuncio has
communicated to M. Barthelmy St. Hil-
aire, Minister of Foreign Affairs, a note
containing a fresh protest against the re-
ligious decrees, which renders the main-
tenance of M. Desprez, an ambassador of
France at the Vatican, impossible.

The Montenegro Committee on Foreign
Affairs has informed the representatives of
the Powers at Cetinje that, despite the
military convention giving San Giorgio to
Montenegro, Dervishi Pasha refuses to
surrender it, on the ground that the De-
limitation Commission must decide the ques-
tion. General Petrovic has sent an officer
to San Giorgio to try to obtain its cession.

M. Gambetta has not thought fit to con-
sult the Chambers of Deputies regarding
M. Baudry d'Asson's letter asking that the
Chamber be requested to sanction proceed-
ings, under Article 341 of the Penal Code,
against the President, Vice President and
Questors, for arbitrarily placing him under
arrest on November 11. M. Gambetta
considers the letter an aggravation of M.
Baudry d'Asson's conduct.

The *Diritto*, of Rome, publishes the fol-
lowing telegram from Valparaiso:—
"Twenty-five thousand Chileans, 5,000
cavalry and 100 cannon left Arica on the
4th of November and arrived at Pisco on
the 25th. A great battle was expected near
the end of November. The Peruvians are
estimated to number nearly twice as many
as the Chileans." The above telegram
conflicts with the despatch received by the
Peruvian Guano Company, published
on November 29, stating that the Chileans
had occupied Pisco on November 20 with-
out opposition.

Most of the French papers devote some
space to the discussion of the Panama
Canal scheme, as set forth by M. de Les-
seps in his interview with a well known
Paris correspondent. Their general opin-
ion is favorable. The *Journal des Debats*,
which has from the first taken a roseate
view of the venture, believes that the foun-
der of the enterprise is competent to carry
it to a successful conclusion, and that there
is no doubt of the readiness with which a
large number of the shares have been taken.
