CONTRACT BRIDGE

QUIZ You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been: East South West North 1 ♠ Dbie, Pass 1 ♠ Pass ?

What do you now bid with each of the following five hands? 1. ♠KQ6 ♥J7653 ♦8 ♣AK42 2. ♠KQ83 ♥AKJ72 ♦8 ♣AJ36 3. ♠AKJ53 ♥J752 ♦A8 ♣Q4 4. ♠J52 ♥AK74 ♦AQ6 ♣AJ35 5. ♠QJ72 ♥AK8 ♣94 ♣AK52

1. Pass. An Informatory double will ordinarily range in value from a hand that would qualify as an opening bid up to a hand of 20 or even 22 points.

2. Four spades. A firm position should be taken that this hand is worth a shot at game. It is true partner may have a poor hand, since, aside from spade length, North's spade response repre-

sents no particular values, but the odds still favor a game effort. It is unnecessary to show the hearts, since a spade fit has already been discovered.

3. Two spades. The excellent spade support and the 15 high card points place this hand outside of the minimum informatory double class. But there are too many losers for us to do more than raise to two spades opposite a forced response. We can encourage partner to continue bidding but cannot safely do more.

4. One no trump. This bid, in combination with the double, shows the values for an opening one no trump bid and possibly slightly better. Since partner can have a very poor hand, the temptation to jump to two no trump should be resisted. To undertake an eight-trick no trump contract with less than half the deck invites disaster. A two no trump bid would represent about 22 points.

5. Three spades. Strong encouragement should be given partner that game is in prospect. North is being asked to contract for game unless his hand is practically worthless. Our 17 high card points, plus satisfactory trump support, place us well beyond the pale of a minimum double. These values are shown by urging partner to undertake game if he has just a few scattered assets. All we can do is ask for, but not insist upon, a game contract.

France May Recall Police As African Terrorism Spreads

PARIS (AP) — North African terrorism spread over France Wednesday as police doubled efforts to stamp out the wave of violence in the 10 days remaining before a national constitutional referendum.

There were reports that the government plans to recall 15,000 policemen who have retired or are on the reserve list.

Interior Minister Emile Pelletier called in his senior police and security aides to study measures against the terrorists who have fired gasoline depots, sabotaged natural gas storage tanks and tried Monday to assassinate Information Minister Jacques Soustelle.

The unsuccessful nationalist attempt to blow up the main natural gas storage plant of Paris was splashed on the front pages of newspapers. The bomb succeeded in blowing out only a small gas main, missing 34 high storage tanks in a thickly populated suburban area.

The nationalist attacks, launched in earnest Aug. 25, have been increasing in number and violence as the Sept. 28 date approaches for the referendum on a new constitution proposed by Premier de Gaulle.

Algerian nationalists oppose the suggested constitution.

Approval, Disappointment Is Reaction To U.K. Move

By FORBES RHUDE Canadian Press Business Editor MONTREAL (CP) — Some segments of Canadian manufacturing industry as well as food producers will get a widened chance at the British market as a result of Wednesday's announcements at the Commonwealth trade and economic conference.

That was the initial reaction in exporting circles, but it was felt that only future developments can determine what the chances are worth.

And there was disappointment that the great majority of producers of finished goods are apparently left out of the current relaxations.

Generally, the British action was hailed as a step in the right direction. There was some tendency, however, to regard it as packing more drama than accomplishment and to be more formalizing of situations already virtually existing than in breaking new ground.

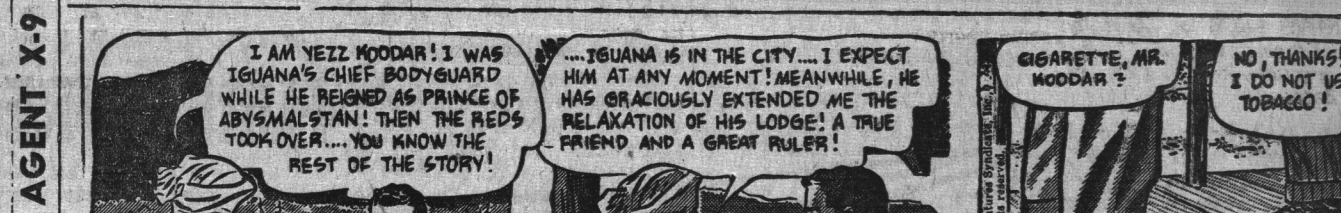
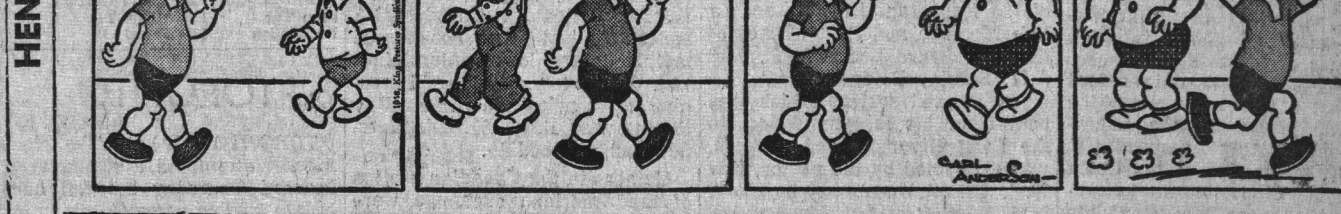
