

Murderer Is Rerieved

LONDON (Reuters) — Home Secretary R. A. Butler Tuesday for the second time in a week refused a reprieve for a young convicted murderer scheduled to be hanged.

He announced that he was unable to find sufficient grounds to justify a reprieve recommendation for Michael Tatum, 24. He is due to be hanged at Winchester prison on Thursday.

Clashes between demonstrators and police marked the execution last Friday morning of Ronald Marwood, hanged for killing a policeman after a dance hall brawl.

Tatum, a movie projectionist, was sentenced to death for murdering Charles Barrett, 85, with an African Zulu war club. He grabbed the weapon and hit Barrett while robbing his home.

Tatum's wife, Mary, 25, was Barrett's housekeeper. He was sentenced to death under one of the five types of homicide still carrying the death penalty — murder while in the pursuit of theft.

Woodworkers Seek End To Propaganda

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—The International Woodworkers of America (IWA) Wednesday asked the attorney-general to "put an end to propaganda which has as its sole aim the fanning of public passions directed against our union and loggers."

The appeal was made in a full page advertisement in the Daily News. It replied to an anonymous letter received and published a few weeks ago by the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company of Grand Falls, Nfld. The letter, signed "per IWA" threatened to burn company woods and property if the union did not win its strike.

Some 1,200 IWA loggers struck the A.N.D. Company Dec. 31 to back demands for higher wages and a shorter work week. At Premier Smallwood's urging, loggers formed the independent Newfoundland Brotherhood of Woodworkers. The legislature then decertified the IWA's two Newfoundland locals. The brotherhood now has a working agreement with the company.

The IWA advertisement, signed by President Landon Ladd of district 2, denied the union had anything to do with the letter.

"If there is no employment for loggers there is no need for our union. And if the woods were burnt, and your various properties destroyed, then there would be no employment for loggers and therefore no IWA."

He said phrases in the letter such as "this is to advise you" "so govern yourselves accordingly" "per IWA" suggest a legal or other well educated mind familiar with such word usage.

"Loggers just don't talk like this. It would indeed be interesting to find out just where this so-called letter really originated and from whom."

"The people of Newfoundland should know. We are therefore asking the attorney-general for a full investigation so that an end be put to reckless and irresponsible propaganda which has as its sole aim the fanning of public passions directed against our union and our loggers."

GRAIN

WINNIPEG (CP) — Export interest in Canadian grain was considerably improved at the close of Wednesday's session on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange. Two cargoes of wheat totalling about 800,000 bushels were sold to Japan.

Most prices were higher, though irregular at times. Advances were prompted by better export interest and reports of dust storms across the Prairie grain belt.

'Copter Crashes At Labrievill

QUEBEC (CP) — A helicopter carrying Hon. Daniel Johnson, Quebec minister of hydraulic resources, crashed on landing at Labrievill Wednesday.

All its occupants were injured, none severely. Mr. Johnson is to be returned to Quebec City by automobile.

Others in the helicopter were not identified. Mr. Johnson was on an inspection tour of power developments in northeast Quebec when the accident occurred. Labrievill is the site of the Bersimis River power station, on the St. Lawrence River north shore 250 miles northeast of Quebec City.

Witnesses said the helicopter plunged from a low altitude as it hovered for a landing. It was demolished.

Blast Is Cause For Air Crash

BALTIMORE (AP)—An explosion ripped apart a Capital jet-powered airliner in flight high over Maryland, hurling 31 persons to their deaths. Civil Aeronautics Board officials who were investigating Tuesday's tragedy said Wednesday.

But where on the plane the explosion was, what kind of explosive matter it was, or what caused it was anybody's guess but theirs. They wouldn't.

Another investigation was going on 300 miles to the southwest, where another Capital airliner—this one a four-engine Constellation—toppled over near the end of the runway at Charles-

ton, W.Va., Tuesday and tumbled down a 200-foot embankment. It burst into flame. Two were killed and six taken to hospital of the 44 aboard.

Within an hour of the Charleston crash, a Capital Viscount, a four-engine turbo-prop out of New York City also bound for Atlanta, blew apart over farming country about 15 miles east of Baltimore. The weather was turbulent from a thundersquall.

ON SCHEDULE The plane's captain, William C. Padback, 52, of Detroit, who had 29 accident-free years with Capital, checked in on schedule at West Chester, Pa., as the plane flew south. Before he reached his next ground check point, Winchester, Md., 17 minutes away, there was a flash and a roar. Scattered bits of wreckage and the bodies of 27 passengers and

the crew of four were sprayed over a two-mile area. Was there a bomb on the plane? That question was asked again and again through the day but no one in authority would comment.

There was little evidence of fire among the scattered wreckage except for bits of scorched metal or parts of bidies.

The clothing was torn off one body. This would tend to substantiate a theory that the force of the blast was within the fuselage, police suggested.

GAMBLING RAID

TORONTO (CP)—Police raided a building in central Toronto Wednesday and arrested 46 persons on gambling charges. They seized approximately \$1,200. Six men were charged with keeping a gaming house and 40 as found-ins.

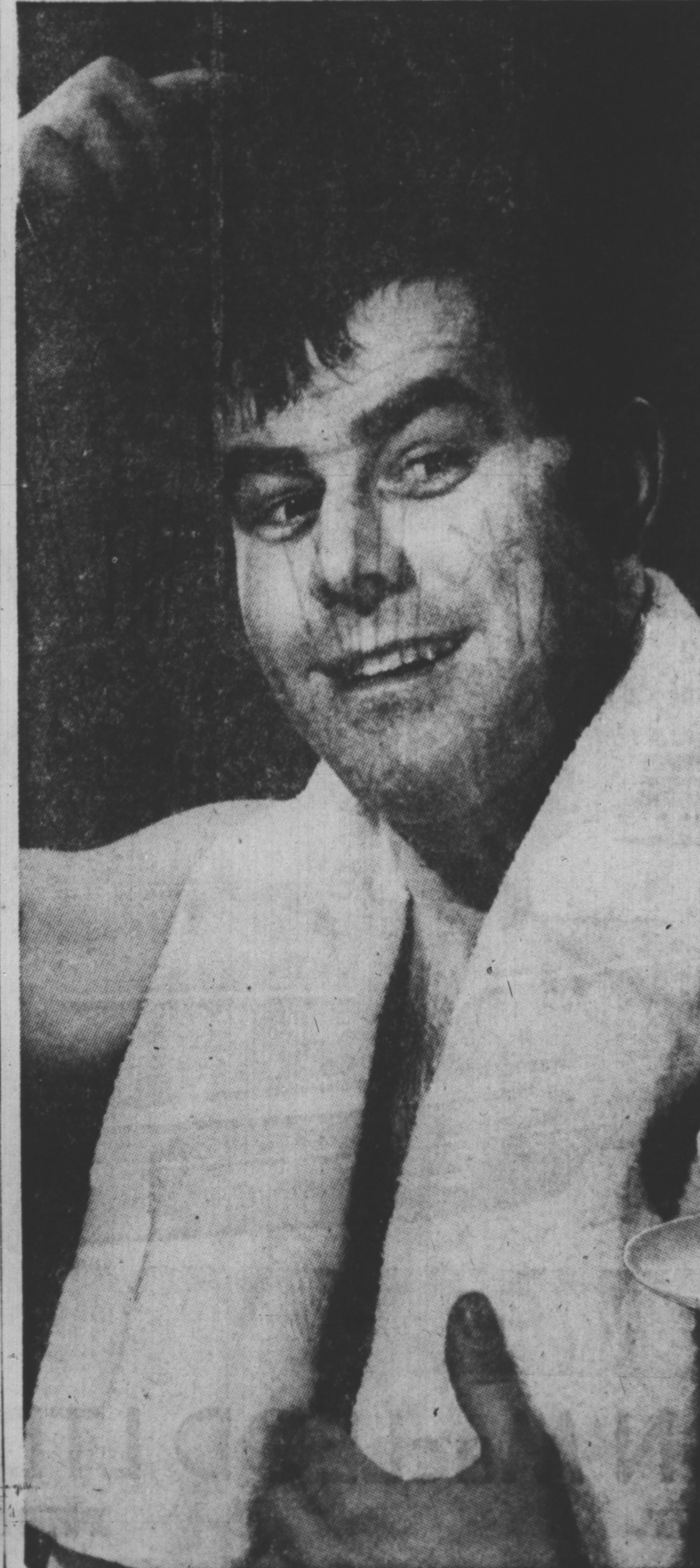

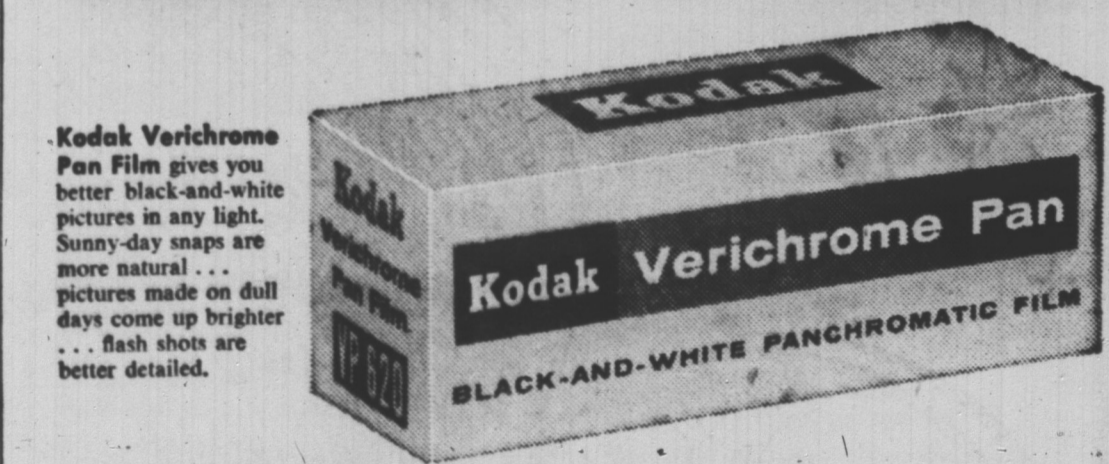
