THE CIVIC ELECTIONS.

POPULAR elections usually bring surprise and the civic elections of yesterday were not exceptional in this regard. They proved, at all events, that candidates for civic honors must continue to resort to the canvass if they would be successful. Ex-Councillor Crabbe occupied an exceptionally strong position in Ward four. He is a leader among our temperance workers; and Ward four is known as "a temperance Ward," strong when Scott Act elections or prohibition plebiscites are on the tapis—surely he ought to have received the temperance vote without respect of party. He has been zealous and careful as the chairman of the finance committee and has left a balance of \$10,000 at the Bank—surely he ought to have received the votes of property-holders anxious to keep down taxes,—without respect of party. As a councillor he was vigilant and made himself acquainted with every detail of civic business—surely he deserved the continued support of electors. But he didn't canvass;—and so he came in at the foot of the poll. We believe that he looked so closely into all civic matters that the people thought that he "wanted to run things," that he kept such a strong hand on the civic purse—even opposing a grant for the Canadian contingent—that many of his friends thought he was "carrying things a little too far" and so voted for the other candidates or refrained from voting. As untired men, in so far as civic business is concerned, Messrs. Brown and Whear are to be congratulated upon their victory, and upon the opportunity now afforded of proving themselves councillors representative of all the higher civic interests of Ward four and of the city at large. The results in the other wards contested are not particularly remarkable except as to the fact that every man who voted against the Contingent grant is now out of the Council!

We hope to see the civic business conducted efficiently and economically in the next two years. Every new councillor will, we trust, have a fair chance to prove himself worthy of the responsible and honorable position to which he has been elected by his fellow citizens. Important questions as to permanent sidewalks, street macadamizing, street lighting, etc., will be brought up in the near future. Let each matter be carefully investigated and let all be decided, prudently, upon their merits,—remembering the business principle, "Don't go ahead until you are sure."

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

It is stated that employees on board the steamship "Minto" were brought to town yesterday to vote in Ward 4. Such enterprise was never exhibited in any previous civic election.
