Gov't To Operate Vote Return Setup

The results of Monday's provincial election will be brought to Islanders through a new system being set up by the provincial government, under the office of the provincial secretary J. David Stewart. In the past, collecting the returns was a joint co-operative effort between The Canadian Press, Canada's nation-wide accepted system throughout Canada. Under the supervision of deputy provincial secretary, Wendell MacKay, the collecting and compiling of results will be carried out by personnel selected by Mr. MacKay. Election headquarters will be set up in the lounge of the Charlottetown Hotel. From this central quarters, the results as they are received from returning officers across the province will be fed to The Canadian Press, newspapers and broadcasting stations each of which will have separate facilities in the hotel near election headquarters. 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A Prince Edward Island Ayrshire cow has topped her class in Canada for production with the abnormally high bred class average of 197 in both milk and butter fat, it was learned unofficially yesterday after Wendell Moose, Kensington, R.R., accepted for his father, W. A. Moose, and himself a class leadership certificate indicating the junior 3-year old heifer, Cloverview Mabel, produced 14,994 pounds milk, 618 butterfat for an average test of 4.12 percent. Certificates of meritorious production were presented to four breeders. Gold medal certificates, indicating production of more than 100,000 pounds milk, 4,000 fat were presented to R. C. Parent, director of the Experimental Farm and D. Fred MacRae, Hunter River. Silver seal certificates—they indicate at least 75,000 milk, 3,000 fat—were presented to Fred MacRae of the firm of Andrew B. and Fred T. MacRae, Union Road and to A. MacRae and Sons, Sherwood.

Man Killed In Barn Fall Is Identified
 MONTAGUE — A farm worker killed in a fall at a barn in Brookly, five miles from here, was Joseph Macdonald, 52, formerly of Antigonish, N.S., Royal Canadian Mounted Police said. The man was killed Tuesday afternoon but his identity was withheld while a search for next of kin was made. The man came to this province about seven years ago. He has no relatives here. Coroner Dr. George Imman of Montague said an inquest would not be held. The man was killed instantly when he fell on his head from a hay loft to a barn floor. He had been employed by John MacKinnon for the past two months. He made his headquarters at Cambridge. For a portion of the year he was employed in the fishing industry.

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
