MAKING TWO SPRINGS.

Good Way to Save Water Flow In Dry Weather.

The device in the illustration explains itself. Often springs and brooks go nearly dry in hot weather, with still enough water for thirsty cows if it could all be collected.

When pasture springs are near the surface and in open fields, the ground around them and the water itself be-

come foul and muddy through the trampling of the cows' feet. Cut a tight barrel in two in the middle. Dig around the spring and sink one-half the barrel into the hole over it. Lead by a pipe the overflow from the spring into the other half of the barrel, placed in lower ground. This will make two springs where one was before and save the short supply of water, besides keeping it pure.
