THE GENERAL ELECTION AND ITS RESULTS.

The party contests by which the Colony has been agitated for several months, were brought to a crisis on Thursday last; and amongst the other results must be reckoned that unflinching one—gratified ambition to some men who had least hope or expectation of it, and disappointment to others who anticipated a far different turn of the wheel of political fortune.

The active part taken by Protestant clergymen in introducing the so-called religious element into the recent struggle, has borne its evil fruit for the time; but just so surely as liberal principles were won before the Island was blessed by the presence of those worthies, so surely will they continue to gather strength long after a returning sense of duty, or the remonstrances of the members of their several communions shall have suggested to them the propriety of confining their attention within the legitimate limits of their sacred avocations.

The poor dupes of some of these gentlemen in the Baltic and St. John's Bay, indeed, again be led as sheep to the slaughter; but let the Catholics and the intelligent Protestants—whose attachment to liberal principles cannot be shaken, and who will not yield to clerical tyranny in temporal affairs—become more closely allied than ever they have yet been, and let the Catholics themselves be more true to each other—let the few traitors who aid the enemy be disowned and cast away from the common brotherhood, to be branded as spies by the masters whom they basely serve,—let this alliance be consummated, and all the Lochheads, and Sutherlands, and Munros, and McKays in the world cannot prevail against it.

In our present issue we can give for Queen's County only a full and correct statement of the poll from its several polling divisions, as the returns were made up on Saturday last at the Sheriff's Court, and the successful candidates declared duly elected. We have accounts from some of the elections in King's and Prince Counties; but as the special votes are not included in any of them, and as some of the accounts themselves are far from being reliable, we consider it best to defer the publication of them all, until we can get a full and correct statement from the Sheriff's returns.

Total No. of Liberals—17. Total No. of Tories—13. In the list of returned members published in the Islander of Friday last, the name of the Hon. R. McAulay is given as one of the members elected for Georgetown. This, we have every reason to believe, is an error.

Another mistake is made in substituting Mr. Conroy's name for Mr. Fidele Gaudet, as member for the first district of Prince County. Mr. Conroy did not contest the election; but if he had, and had been returned, he would likewise be a supporter of the Government, as he declared himself to that effect at the nomination of candidates.

Still another mistake is made by the Islander in inserting Mr. Finlay McNeill's name in place of Mr. George Harris, for the fourth district of King's County. Mr. Harris is the successful candidate with Mr. Wightman. He is an old and well tried Liberal, and is sure to support the Government.

We cannot understand why the Islander should place Mr. Laird amongst the opponents of the Government. Mr. Laird voted, last Session, generally with the majority, in support of nearly all the measures of the Government. Indeed, the only questions on which he seriously differed with them were those in reference to the Bible and Escheat. We believe Mr. Laird was sincere and conscientious in his support of these questions. We cannot say the same of those who now impudently claim him as one of their party, and who, in former years, reviled and stigmatized Mr. Laird, under the opprobrious title of "Coles's dray horse," because he was so steadfast in his attachment to the Liberal party and their principles.

Mr. David Ramsay, returned for the second district of Prince County, is also placed amongst the Conservatives. We cannot say why his name should stand in that position. For many years Mr. Ramsay was a staunch friend and supporter of the Liberal party, and we do not know but he will be so yet. However, we leave his name for the present where we found it, trusting that when he will take his seat in the House, he will give his adhesion to those principles of a Liberal and progressive policy for which, in by-gone years, he often earnestly contended.

CENTRAL ACADEMY EXAMINATION.

The following is the result, deduced from the Register kept at the Central Academy for the term just concluded. The progress in the various classes has been quite satisfactory, while some of the pupils have attained to such a proficiency in Latin, French and Mathematics, as, if followed up, cannot fail to lead to eminence. Under Trigonometry we include the application of Geometry to Navigation, Land Surveying and Practical Astronomy.
