

### Routine Business Transacted At Meeting of S'side Council

Mayor W. A. Currie president and all councillors were present at the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last evening in the library.

Mayor Currie extended a warm welcome to Coun. W. E. MacAusland who was elected to the Council by acclamation last week in a by-election due to the resignation of Coun. J. L. MacDougall last month.

Coun. H. E. Clark, reporting for the finance committee, said that the bond sale has been completed and the cheque received. He said the town assessors have considerable work to do yet and at present one is busy at writing up tax notices.

Reporting for the electric light department Coun. Clark stated that there is a possibility more street lights will be turned on by the end of this week, if the weather improves. He added that due to the possible future need of a new engine for the electric light plant, and a possible increase in price, he had informed the Council of this matter and they would decide as a whole what action should be taken and not leave the responsibility on one man or one committee. He said four crews are working at present, one in the country and three on street lighting in town.

Coun. Jenkins read the police report at the conclusion of which he was asked by Mayor Currie to have Chief of Police White have an officer on duty at the corners of Spring and Water each day at one o'clock and five o'clock. Coun. Jenkins told of his findings that resulted from a traffic survey he conducted on various streets. He concluded with the recommendations that a caution light be purchased and be installed at the corner near the Summer Restaurant and another light nearer town. This was left to him to investigate and report on later. Of the abattoir, Coun. Jenkins said much improvement has been shown since the place was renovated.

Coun. Lidstone reported that

Harvard Street playground has been completed but will not be available for a while as it has to be seeded. He said galvanized screenings had been installed on openings in the Civic Stadium due to an influx of birds. He added that complaints have been received about teenagers keeping late, noisy hours at the Harvard Street playground and that the police are checking on these.

Coun. Perry said he made a recent survey of the streets and he read off a list of streets that needed, in part, resurfacing or patching.

Mayor Currie said it is necessary to keep capital expenditures down this year but that it would be poor economy to neglect these streets when light resurfacing or patching is all that is necessary.

Coun. Perry said he understood the Provincial Government will pay sixty percent of paving of any street that provides a thorough connection to a main highway and mentioned Harvard Street as being this type.

Coun. Perry was asked to investigate this matter of assistance from the Government in regard to Harvard Street.

Coun. Cannon reported on new hydrants and new sewerage pipe to be installed shortly in various sections of the west end of town. He also moved that the prices for cast iron pipe submitted by Mollison Hardware be accepted. This was approved. The prices are: 16 inch pipe, \$7.83 per foot; 6 inch pipe, \$1.88 per foot.

Other resolutions approved were that tenders be called for installing a cement floor over the pipes in Civic Stadium and that Coun. W. F. MacAusland be elected to the following committees, finance and assessment, electric light and police and abattoir.

Coun. MacAusland thanked the Mayor for his warm greeting and said he realized that the Council faces many difficult problems. He pledged his support to the Mayor and Councillors.

Before adjournment Coun. Clark asked Coun. Jenkins if it is true that only two or three men can run the pumper. Coun. Jenkins said he was unable to answer as he didn't know but he'd find out.

### INVOLVES ACCIDENT AT CROSSING

## Action For Damages From C.N.R. In Supreme Court

An action for \$5,000.00 damages against the Canadian National Railways was heard before a judge and jury in a continuance of the June sitting of the Supreme Court Summerside yesterday. Mr. Justice G.J. Tweedy presiding. The plaintiffs are Charles L. Hamilton and Hilda G. Hamilton. Mr. J.O. Campbell, Q.C. is counsel for the plaintiffs while Mr. Frederick A. Large and W.H. Hewson, regional counsel for the C.N.R. are acting for the defendant.

The case was adjourned until this morning at 10.30 a.m. after six witnesses for the plaintiff gave evidence.

The action resulted from an accident on Sunday, February 13th, 1955 when a 1951 Studebaker, driven by Mrs. Charles Hamilton (Hilda G., a plaintiff) was struck by a C.N.R. freight train at a crossing near the Albany station and in which Mrs. Hamilton suffered a broken back. In the car with Mrs. Hamilton at the time, where her two daughters, Joan and Linda, aged 13 and 5 years respectively at that time and Ronnie Nicholson, 6 years, who lived next door to the Hamiltons. The children suffered only minor cuts and bruises. Mr. Hamilton was manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Albany until a few days ago when he was transferred to the Westville, N.S. branch to take up the same duties. The Hamiltons lived in the upstairs apartment, over the Bank which was located only a few yards from the crossing where the accident occurred. At the time of the collision, Mrs. Hamilton was driving the children to Sunday School.

Evidence given during yesterday's sitting revealed that visibility to the east of the crossing, Hamilton car was slowly proceeding, is quite restricted due to the presence of the railway station and nearby warehouses and it was from this easterly direction that the train was proceeding towards Borden. Also, to see the travelling as the Hamilton car was, it is necessary to look back over the right shoulder somewhat, due to the angle at which the highway crosses the railway track. Evidence also revealed that the train was not heard to blow her whistle or ring her bell until she was near the crossing, well past the "whistle signal" post.

### Queen And Duke Visit H.M.C.S. St. Laurent Monday

STOCKHOLM (Reuters)—Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh spent half an hour Monday aboard the Canadian destroyer St. Laurent.

They expressed their thanks to the crew of the ship which, with two British vessels, accompanied the Royal yacht Britannia on its trip from England to Sweden last week.

The royal couple made similar visits to the British warships, Defender and Delight.

The Queen and Duke attended the opening of the Equestrian Olympics Sunday in the final day of their three-day state visit.

PRINCESS JOINS PARTY  
They plan to remain in Sweden aboard the Britannia this week. Princess Margaret arrived from London by air today to join them on the yacht for the remaining unofficial portion of their visit.

This afternoon they attended the Olympics again.

Railroad and dockside workers stood on trains and at warehouse windows and cheered as the royal car drove up to the destroyers this morning. The Queen wore a cherry-colored dress with a wide skirt and small cherry hat, and white gloves and shoes.

Princess Margaret, accompanied by the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester, landed at Bromma airport in a special plane and was given a rousing greeting by a crowd of 10,000.

Dressed in pink and black, the princess was met by Sweden's 44-year-old Prince Bertil.
