Expansion Of Industry Is Seen With Tri-Milk

A giant step in the expansion of the dairy industry in this province was taken yesterday afternoon with the official opening of the tri-milk subdivision of Amalgamated Dairies Ltd., Summerside.

Premier Walter R. Shaw cut the ribbon that officially opened the new department at this large dairy farm located at Summerside East.

The Premier stated he was most happy to be associated with the opening of a new industry—a new resource that will be enjoyed, not only by local consumers but by those where new markets are being opened up.

He said he could foresee tremendous openings for new markets in the north shore area of the St. Lawrence. However, he warned that the tri-milk product is up against keen competition and as such it must be of very high quality to remain competitive. He said he felt tri-milk will do a tremendous job of selling not only in the Atlantic provinces but also in other markets.

Premier Shaw said this new development is in keeping with the resources development program planned for this province and congratulated general manager John S. Wright and his staff and wished them success in the future.

RESULT OF SURPLUS

The chairman of the official opening was the president of the company, Douglas Affleck of Bedeque who introduced the speakers. Mr. Affleck also spoke briefly welcoming the large group of directors, patrons and other interested parties, and during his remarks stated that the tri-milk process resulted from the fact that the country had surpluses of butter and cheese and it was felt that some new way should be investigated in an endeavour to use up the large quantities of milk available in this province and the result was tri-milk.

Mayor W.A. Currie extended a civic welcome and congratulated the firm on "the remarkable progress you have made since your inception in 1954."

Opposition leader A.W. Matheson said Wednesday that he had received a causeway report comparable to that received recently by the Premier as far back as 1959. Mr. Matheson was speaking at the annual meeting of the East Prince Liberal Association. He said that in 1959 he had been told the causeway was economically feasible.

Mr. Matheson also touched on teachers' supplements, saying that the teachers got much less than what was promised and criticized the health department and the firing of members of departmental staff since "the present health minister took over."

Abattoir To Fill Community Need

Hon. Andrew MacRae, provincial agriculture minister, officially opened the new abattoir

of Farm Enterprises Inc., yesterday afternoon in the presence of a large group of dignitaries and other interested parties at their new plant on the Green Road located in St. Eleanors.

Premier Walter R. Shaw was also present for the opening. Chairman for the function was Charles Yeo, St. Eleanors one of the group of four men operating the modern plant.

Mr. Yeo told the gathering that the abattoir was designed to fill the immediate needs of the community and although not very large he hoped that quality would make up for what might be lacking in size.

Mr. MacRae congratulated the men associated with the new endeavour and stated it was a much needed organization that would be of great benefit to both the producers as well as the consumers.

Premier Shaw said it was the fourth official opening of a new enterprise he had attended in the past two days and was very pleased that it is related to the resources development program.

He said it was an abattoir that will render great service not only to the producers but to the consumers who want to see their products properly slaughtered and inspected. He congratulated Mr. Yeo and his associates, Arnold MacLennan, Lorne Driscoll and Lester Baglole.

Earle Cannon, chairman of St. Eleanors village commissioners officially welcomed the gathering as well as farm Enterprises Ltd. to the community and assured it of the full cooperation of the village commissioners.

He stated that 42 new units had been constructed in St. Eleanors in the past year which included 22 new residences. He added that St. Eleanors will be the second community in the province to have installed a complete water and sewerage system and also that it is the second largest community in Prince County with a population in excess of 1,150.
