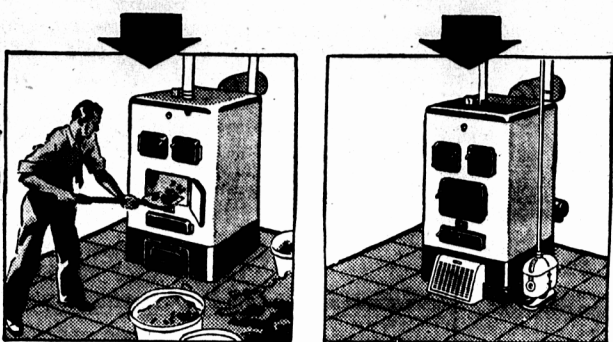

The monthly W. A. meeting of St. John's Church was held Wednesday evening at the home of Mrs. V. MacLeod, Albany.

Pending the receipt of recently levied taxes, the incorporated village of Crapaud waits with mixed anticipation the appearance of electric street lights.

Under pressure from the immutable progress of road machines, the old creamery building has taken wings and assumed the embarrassing position of a poor relation beside its streamlined successor. Whether creamery officials will tolerate the dilapidated appearance of their old home or let the building disintegrate gracefully in useful retirement remains to be seen.

From the monthly bulletin of St. John's Anglican Church comes a revealing record of material achievement and progress. Parochial men cut the lumber early this spring for the staging of the church spire; repairs have now been made, and two coats of paint (Bergundy red and white) have been applied to the spire and the church proper. New steps, front and back, lattice work trim around the base of the sun porch, have added greatly to the exterior of the new rectory, while inside, the walls and ceilings have been decorated.

Dr. Nelson R. The doctor has a notorious record for being able to keep them out, thus making this particular aspect of pastoral work exceedingly difficult for the local clergy. The evidence of good medical attention in any community, according to the popular mind, is the number of people who live to an active ripe old age. The doctor is a living example of the value of his own medical prescriptions, having recently attained the venerable age of 37. . . . or is it 38? Seriously, the residents of Crapaud will join in hearty congratulations; certainly many, many people down through the years will bear evidence to those familiar words, "Well done thou good and faithful servant."

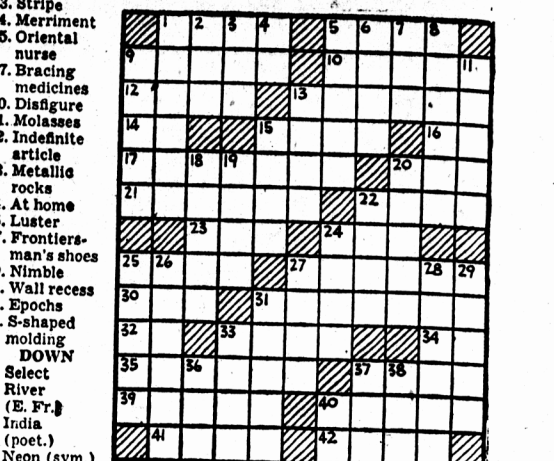
—"12 O'CLOCK HIGH" AT CAPITOL, SUMMERSIDE —Gregory Peck in "12 O'Clock High," Twentieth Century-Fox's mid-century movie which had its triumphant world premiere on the West Coast at the tag end of 1949 and is the first major Hollywood product of 1950, has been announced as the attraction at the Capitol Theatre, where its engagement began today.

The intimate and yet spectacular dramatic story of "12 O'Clock High" tells, through the eyes of a dozen colorful flyers, of aviation's part in the recent war and the rising prestige of daylight bombing. The definitive aviation film of the war, it contains specially staged crash sequences quite unlike any ever attempted before as well as authentic German and American combat footage not previously released to the public.

The picture stars Peck in the role of General Frank Savage, commander of the fictional 918th Bomb Group, which is reportedly based on the actual history of the 305th Bomb Group. Authors Sydney Bartlett and Beirne Lay, Jr. wrote it from their own experiences.
