THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

Warning From High Quarters

CONCORD, N. H., Dec. 29. Governor Goodall yesterday issued the following proclamation: In view of the various heinous crimes which have been committed in this State within the last few weeks, directly traceable to the use of intoxicating liquors, in the sale of which the criminal laws of the State have been flagrantly violated, I hereby warn all persons engaged in this illegal and deadly traffic to desist therefrom immediately; and I call upon the attorney general, the solicitors and sheriffs of counties, mayors of cities, and selectmen of towns, and all other officers of the law of the State, and all good citizens of every party, sect and faith, to unite in one supreme effort to close up and suppress every liquor saloon of every description within our borders. Let no guilty man escape.

Congratulations.

LISBON, Dec. 29.

The Conservative leader Pimental, writing in the Gazette de Portugal, congratulates the Ministry upon their conduct of the Nyassa operations, and promises the spontaneous support of all parties. Serpa Pinto's despatch to the Government states that the Makololos have signed a declaration that they were instigated to attack him by the director of the Lake Nyassa Company, English missionary Scott at Blantyre urged them to refrain. Major Pinto says he is convinced he has put an end to the slave trade and other acts of violence among the Makololo, besides opening the Nyassa route to commerce and occupying the Shire District.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.

Messrs. R. G. Leckie and A. T. Patterson, of the Londonderry Iron Works, waited upon the Minister of Finance yesterday and asked that some inequalities and inconsistencies in the tariff with respect to iron ore be removed at the coming session of Parliament.

The Provincial Anglican Synod of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada give notice of applying to Parliament for powers for the Metropolitan Bishop to confer degrees in Divinity under certain conditions.

Regal Ceremonies.

LISBON, Dec. 29.

The ceremonies attending the proclaiming of Don Carlos as King of Portugal and Algarves were continued to-day. The King and Queen, accompanied by Archduke Eugene of Austria and a brilliant suite, reviewed the garrison. All the foreign diplomatic representatives were present. The people received the King and Queen with every token of sympathy and affection. In the evening a state banquet was given in the palace, when two hundred guests were present.

Influenza.

LONDON, Dec. 29.

The epidemic of influenza continues in Paris, and there are no signs of improvement. In Munich the disease is increasing. In Berlin it is accompanied by dangerous fever. Many officers of the Berlin garrison are affected. About one-third of the military and workmen at Spandau are ill with the disease.

The Egyptian Debt.

LONDON, Dec. 28.

The Paris correspondent of the News says the French Government has as good as come to terms with England regarding the conversion of the Egyptian debt, England reserving the option when to evacuate Egypt and the right of occupying the country in case of necessity.

Interviews with several doctors bring out the fact that a dozen mild cases of "La Grippe" have appeared in this city.
