The train leaves at 7.50.

LAST THURSDAY a thunder storm was so severe in Boston that hundreds of basements were filled with mud and water, and the sewers backed up and discharged their contents into the cellars of dwellings and warehouses. The south end of the city received much damage, many occupants of houses being driven from the basements to the upper parts of their residences.

MR. K. C. HIND, son of Professor Hind of Windsor, and brother of the late Rector of Georgetown, has been engaged as organist and choir-master of St. Peter's Church, and also as assistant master of the school. Mr. Hind has just finished his collegiate course at Windsor University, and is preparing for the ministry of the Church. He will arrive on the Island about the first week in October.

THE SCOTT ACT.—This morning, Theoph. DesBrisay, Peter McGowan, and Alexander Haydon, Esquires, Justices of the Peace for Queen's County, disposed of two offenders under the Scott Act. James Gillis and Patrick Doyle, both of Mount Stewart, were each fined—the first fifty dollars and the last one hundred dollars and costs. Business is looking up in this court. Three seduction cases are to be tried this week.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DROWNING.—A young man named John Toombs, of North Rustico, had a narrow escape from drowning while out boating on New Glasgow River, during the gale on Tuesday last. The boat, which was insufficiently ballasted, capsized, and Mr. Toombs was suddenly thrown into about five feet of water. Being alone and unable to swim, he had great difficulty in extracting himself from his perilous situation.

THE VACANT ARCHBISHOPRIC.—According to the Toronto World,— "The name of Bishop Walsh, of London, Ont., is said to have been sent to Rome in connection with the vacant archbishopric of Halifax."

The belief in Halifax is that the names of three priests—one from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island, respectively—were forwarded.—St. John Globe.

REV. JOHN BURWASH, A. M., delivered his opening discourse last evening, in the Prince Street Methodist Church. The building was thoroughly filled. After briefly addressing the children in the Sabbath School, who occupied seats in the gallery, he delivered a most powerful sermon, in which he plainly showed the great responsibilities resting upon the teachers and officers of the school. The rev. gentleman made a most profound impression, and our Methodist friends are to be congratulated upon obtaining the services of such an able and eloquent minister.

On that occasion it is intended to form a Committee of gentlemen to devise the best means for providing a suitable building for the institution; and who will at a later day wait upon the Government with a view to securing an annual grant for its maintenance. To better promote the formation of such a committee, Colonel Gray, as Chairman of the preliminary meeting, advised that the ladies of the committee should specially invite the Clergy, the members of the Bench and the Bar, and also His Worship the Mayor, to pontenance, by their presence on that occasion, the work in hand.

LATEST WAR NEWS.

Troops on the Move. A Fight Expected.

Anarchy and Murder Prevailing. Reported Assassination of Arabi.

Special Despatch to the Examiner. ALEXANDRIA, July 24. General Allision is moving two regiments and a mounted squadron in the direction of Arabi's intrenchments. An engagement is anticipated. The British now occupy Aboukir and Ramlet. There is great excitement here to-day. The poisoning of Arabi Pasha by an emissary of the Khedive. Anarchy is increasing. The natives are murdering all foreigners and attacking the railways. The British advance cannot take place for two weeks. Arabi is preparing to flood the country from the Nile and the Canal. The Khedive has signed a proclamation directed against Arabi, declaring him a rebel.

LATEST EUROPEAN NEWS. Revolution in Russia. CZAR'S CORONATION!

Special to the Examiner. LONDON, July 24. It is reported here, on what seems to be good authority, that the Grand Duke Constantine and his Party are preparing for a revolution in Russia against the Czar. It is also alleged that in the event of a disturbance Germany will annex the Baltic Provinces. The Czar's coronation (so often postponed) is now fixed to take place at the end of August.

LATEST CANADIAN NEWS.

Special to the Examiner. MONTREAL, July 24. The ship "Peruvian Congress" owned in St. John, N. B., has been abandoned at sea. It is reported that Wallace Ross will claim the championship, if Hanlan won't row this year, and it is said that Hanlan's doctor has forbidden him to row this season. A great Trades Union Demonstration took place in Toronto yesterday. Three thousand workmen marched in the procession.

GENERAL NEWS. PARIS, July 21. The Temps announces that England and France, having submitted to the Conference their proposals relative to the occupation of the Suez Canal, will not wait for its decision before proceeding to make active preparations. The French Government will consequently ask the Chamber without delay to pass a vote of credit to defray the expenses of an expeditionary corps. LONDON, July 21. The Daily Telegraph states Sir Garnet Wolseley will command the expedition to Egypt, which will consist of 20,000 men of all arms. Another battalion of marines has been ordered to prepare at once for service in Egypt. The Times Alexandria correspondent says the respectable inhabitants complain that English soldiers have robbed and pillaged their houses. It is reported that Bright will visit America during recess of Parliament. It is not unlikely he will deliver addresses in many of the principal cities.
