Maritime Co-Op Service Up 18 Per Cent In Year

MONCTON (Special) — J.E. Walsh, president of Maritime Co-operative Services Limited, called on all co-operative organizations in the Maritimes to make sure that their operations are giving efficient service to their farm members.

He noted that in many cases the maintenance of efficient service might require co-operatives to make changes in their organizational structure and methods of distribution.

Mr. Walsh was addressing the annual meeting of the Maritime Co-operative Services Limited, in Moncton.

He pointed out that the annual average increase in production by individual farmers had increased at a rate one and one half times faster than production by industrial workers but in spite of this farmers are under severe economic pressure.

It was reported at the opening session of the meeting that the past year has been one of expansion both for the regional co-operative wholesale and many of the local retail cooperative organizations.

NEW BUILDINGS

Many local cooperatives have constructed new buildings or renovated existing ones during the past year. Maritime Co-operative Services reported an increase of 18 per cent in its business volume for the year as compared with 1964. This was due to increases in the manufacture and sale of livestock and poultry feeds, livestock marketing and the wholesale distribution of grocery, hardware, and petroleum products and agricultural supplies.

Some of this increased sales volume was a result of the meeting with the Eastern Nova Scotia Co-operative Wholesale during the past year.

Liberal Convention Due Dec. 11

At a convention in Charlottetown on Saturday, December 11, a leader of the Liberal Party in this province will be named. Dr. M. L. Bonnell, M.L.A., is acting leader, having been elected in caucus following the resignation of A. W. Matheson, former leader and premier.

No announcement has been made about a main speaker at the convention, but it is believed someone high in federal party circles will be present and it is expected a statement to this effect will be made shortly. The specific site of the convention was not decided at press time today.

Sex Teaching Up To Parents

Ruth Ross, R.N. public health nurse, was guest speaker at the monthly meeting of the Parkdale Home and School Association held in the high school last night.

Miss Ross outlined the duties of a public health nurse visiting schools and suggested that parents should have their children given physical and dental check-ups before they begin school.

A discussion on sex education followed Miss Ross's talk. It was decided that this was mainly the parents' responsibility but perhaps it could be supplemented at the school level.

It was decided to hold a used skates sale at the WI Hall this afternoon at 3 p.m. The home and school will reserve 25 cents on each pair of skates sold. This money will go to the home and school funds.

Two members were delegated to attend a meeting of the Parkdale Recreation Committee on Nov. 22. Future rink and playground policies will be discussed at this meeting.

Newly elected president, Earl Elliott, chaired last night's meeting.

The two principles, Mrs. Winnifred MacMillan of the elementary school and Mr. Carmichael of the junior high school commended the parents on their attendance at the parent-teacher interviews.

Lunch was served by the committee in charge.

Kensington Duo Has Big Producer

W.A. Moore and Son, Kensington, RR, had the leading junior 2-year-old Ayrshire producer in the current issue of the Ayrshire Review.

The heifer Blackadder Amethyst 2, produced 18,632 pounds milk, 544 pounds butterfat in 305 days, with the unusually broad class averages of 1.94 in milk, 106 in butterfat.

The heifer continued milking for a total of 404 days, producing in all a total of 17,270 pounds of milk, 705 pounds butterfat for an average test of 4.08 percent butterfat.

The Moore, father and son combination — the son is Wendell — purchased the Blackadder heifer at the 1964 Ayrshire Breeders Club sale. She was a bred by George Boswell, Frenchport. Her sire is Selwood Dewdrop's Commander and she is classified "very good."

Assets Now Quarter Million, Credit Union Members Told

SUMMERSIDE — At the annual meeting of St. Paul's Credit Union here last night, members were told that an objective of one-quarter of a million dollars in assets set by the credit union last year has fallen short by a small margin when the books closed. The credit union had reached a point where a full time treasurer was required at a permanent location.

To meet these additional expenses, he said, the directors had no alternative but to increase the rate of interest on loans from one-half of one per cent per month to three quarters of one per cent per month on unpaid balances.

The treasurer's report showed a net profit of \$8,615 for the year and a record of comparative growth in membership showed that from 174 members in 1964 this credit union has grown to 621 members in 1965.

DIRECTORS RE-ELECTED

Three directors due to retire after a three-year term, E. F. Arsenault, Wilfred Perry and Ted Gallant, were re-elected. A member of the credit committee, J. E. Gillis, was also re-elected. Mr. Gillis is serving his 29th year on this committee. Another long-time member of the committee, E. G. Harrington, tendered his resignation for health reasons. He was replaced by Martin MacKenna.

Re-elected to the supervisory committee was Earl Perry.

Speakers at the meeting were Joseph Gaudin of Rustico, managing director of the Prince Edward Island Credit Union League; Keith Duggan, Summerside; Leo Blaquiere, Summerside, president of the P.E.I. Credit Union League; and Harry Bishop, Summerside, director of the Trinity Credit Union.

The president told members that next year the credit union will make available a new plan to its eligible members. It will be in the form of a group insurance plan and it will be available at a much lower premium rate than other plans of this type.

He pointed out, however, to have such a contract the plan requires a 50 per cent membership. It was explained in detail by Leo Blaquiere.

St. Paul's Credit Union lost six members through death during the past year. Their savings and loans were forwarded to CUNA Insurance with rebates being received in full.

Diabetic Search Planned In P.E.I.

A turkey dinner for Christmas with all the fittings and an announcement that a concentrated effort will be made to detect all of the diabetics in Prince Edward Island, were two of the highlights of the monthly meeting this week of the Charlottetown branch of the Canadian Diabetic Association.

Charles Praught, vice-president of the Canadian association, presided in the absence through illness of President Stewart Ives. It was Mr. Praught who told about the upcoming concerted effort to locate all of those affected by diabetes. The estimate now is that there are three persons affected with this ailment, for every one that is a known diabetic.

A turkey dinner for the average person is routine; there's nothing special about it. But for a diabetic whose diet is restricted, often severely in certain regards, the Christmas dinner outlined by Sister Joan Mary was really appreciated.

B. Frank Tinney indicated the dozen points at which the insulin and other diabetic controls are purchasable for diabetics. This is the only Canadian province where these materials are available free of charge to the patient.

DIETS DISCUSSED

Diets were discussed in detail by the guest speaker, Miss Isobel Lockerie who used visual means to form various food combinations that may be used in a diet. The exchanges, or substitutes for various foods, was also explained in detail.

CNIB Needs More Funds For Program

B. W. Patterson, chairman of the board, presided at the regular meeting of the P.E.I. advisory board to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind held in the CNIB Centre in Charlottetown Wednesday evening. The meeting was well attended in spite of inclement weather.

Interesting reports were given by Russell Driscoll and Allison Gill on the P.E.I. United Fund and the Lions Glaucoma Clinics, respectively. During the discussion of the P.E.I. United Fund, it was pointed out that the Board would have a deficit on Dec. 31 unless additional money could be realized. The Board approved the expenditure of \$1,045.60 for eye services, which had been extended to 122 persons throughout the province during the period of May 1, 1965 to Nov. 1, 1965.

The Field Secretary, Phil Bower, reported briefly on the new tape talking book service, braille watches on loan, bowling, and field work.

F.H. Flinn, Superintendent of the Maritime Division of the CNIB addressed the meeting. He made brief remarks on the CNIB eye bank registry, eye research, employment, the importance of the work being carried on by the pre-school worker, as well as some new changes in CNIB policy.

The CNIB is one of the participating agencies of the P. E. I. United Fund.
