

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

HALIFAX, Oct. 14.

Yesterday afternoon a despatch was received by the City Marshal from the New York Chief of Police, giving a description of James Whitford, alias James A. Langshaw, of Rochester, charged with forgery, and asking, if found, he be detained until an officer arrived. The Marshal and Detective Hatt visited the Halifax Hotel. On looking over the register they found the name of James Whitford among Saturday's arrivals. The description of the visitor as given by the proprietor of the hotel was identical with that in the despatch. A few minutes later Whitford came into the hotel. Detective Hatt went up to him, and informing him of the nature of his business, Whitford quietly walked with him to the station. Arriving there he was searched, and on him were found drafts on the National Commercial Bank of Rochester to the amount of between two and three thousand dollars. He had also a number of drafts daily made out and signed, but with no amount filled in, and cash in gold, etc., amounting to about \$600. He wore a handsome gold watch and heavy chain. After being arrested he was asked if he wished a lawyer, but declined legal assistance, saying he would fight his own case when he returned to Rochester. He appears to have changed his mind, however, and has engaged counsel to watch his case. No particulars as to the charge are obtainable. The accused gives his age as twenty-one, although he would pass for much younger. He dresses in good taste and since his arrival here has made a number of friends with whom he has been spending money freely. It is said he sent a telegram to his brother in Rochester, requesting him to send some clothes which he required, and it is supposed through this telegram his whereabouts was discovered. He was committed to jail, awaiting the arrival of the officer and necessary papers.

The criminal term of the Supreme Court is now over. The docket comprised seven or eight cases, of which four were tried, but only in one was a verdict of guilty found, something almost unprecedented in this Province. The man found guilty was Thomas Hill, colored, tried on a charge of malicious mischief to property in Cunard street. He was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. The Mail says it is very evident that in criminal trials in Halifax the prisoner gets the full benefit of anything approaching doubt.

TORONTO, Oct. 14.

A city paper having asserted that Hanlan's races to come off with Rosa and Triquet were hippodrome exhibitions, and that Hanlan didn't put a cent on himself. Hanlan called on the editor and gave flat denial to the statements. He said everything was square, and that he puts up his own money on both races, and that if he had wished to row crooked he could have had sufficient money to purchase nearly half the city.

UNITED STATES.

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 14.

Prof. King, accompanied by a U. S. Signal Service Officer, made a balloon ascension from this city yesterday afternoon. A stiff breeze was blowing, but the ascent was successful. The balloon left in a south-westerly direction. The intention is to make the voyage as long as possible.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.

Communication with London has been cut off from all directions by a severe gale in England.

KOKOMO, Col., Oct. 13.

A fire broke out in the Summit House at 7 o'clock last evening, by the explosion of a lamp. The flames spread rapidly until 10 o'clock, when they had consumed every house within reach. Less than 20 houses are left standing. The fire communicated to the powder magazines, causing several terrific explosions. About eighty families are homeless and destitute. The loss is over \$400,000; insurance light. Whiskey was free, and hundreds of men were infuriated.

PARNELL'S ARREST.

LONDON, Oct. 15.

At a sitting of the Kildare Convention, at Naas, yesterday, a telegram from Parnell was read in which he says: "I rely upon you as true and sterling men, act as if I were with you." A resolution of sympathy with Parnell was then passed.

DUBLIN, Oct. 15.

At a meeting of the Land League Executive yesterday, Dillon announced that an indignation meeting will be held in the Rotunda on Friday (to-day). Lord Mayor elect presiding, Dillon said it was strange that the arrest of Parnell should be regarded by an outburst of passion which has disgusted even Gladstone's warmest friends in Ireland. He believed the most effective weapon left for the League to avenge the arrest was to continue the organization on exactly the same lines. The motion was then carried that the League regard the arrest of Parnell as an act of malignant personal spite of Gladstone, and urging the people to abide by the principles of the recent convention.

LONDON, Oct. 15.

Sir Stafford Northcote, speaking at Edinburgh last night, said it was a satisfaction to arrest Parnell, but he held the Government responsible for the state of affairs leading to the arrest.

LONDON, Oct. 14.

Since the arrest of Parnell threatening letters of unusual character have been received by Mr. Gladstone and Sir Wm. V. Harcourt.

On receipt yesterday at Naas, Ireland, of the intelligence of Parnell's arrest all the shops were shut and black flags displayed from many windows.

A Dublin despatch says there is a singular absence of excitement there. The entire suppression of the League is thought in all political circles to be certain.

A telegram from Kinsale says the news of Parnell's arrest was received there with unbounded satisfaction by tradesmen whose business has been paralyzed since the agitation began.

The Times says the arrest of Parnell caused little surprise in London but everybody seemed to approve of it.

The Times comments upon the recent attack on a person who was serving ejectives near Glengarriff when as an escorted

party of police retired a number of armed men were seen approaching the scene.

The Times says surely it is impossible to practice forbearance in the face of an armed and concerted resistance. Unhappily it is only too likely that the differences which paralyzed the Cabinet a year ago may again appear.

DUBLIN, Oct. 14.

The Evening Mail says the League has resolved to attack Kilmunham jail.

Forster was guarded by dragoons in going from the castle to his residence.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.

Despatches from all quarters report considerable excitement in Irish circles on the arrest of Parnell. Meetings to express sympathy with Parnell are announced in several cities and Leaguers are invited to renew their efforts in the cause of Ireland.

HIGH PRICES FOR POTATOES AND APPLES.—There appears to be a regular "boom" in potatoes and in apples. Speculators in both are ranging the country far and wide, and are doing their best to outrive each other in securing the largest lots. As high as three dollars per bbl. has been offered for Nonpareil apples, and from \$2 to \$2.50 for the earlier winter apples. Potatoes are bringing from \$1.25 to \$1.60 and upwards per bbl. in Halifax, and the same price here. The farmers are to be congratulated this year on the handsome prices they are obtaining for their produce.—*Budget, N. S., Monitor.*

MR. VENDOR AND THE WEATHER.—Mr. Vennor says: The cold wave has followed the brief period of warmth somewhat speedily, but it will again probably give place to a fine day or two previous to the first real wintry spell of weather likely to come in between 15th and 20th the present month. The season is acting almost day for day with that of the year 1877, when frequent snowfalls occurred between the 7th and 10th days. The prospects for the remaining portion of October and early part of November are not bright, but unless the "recurring period" changes abruptly, we may look for some very fine and open weather in November. Early as the snow seems to be in arriving, we shall feel the want of it before Christmas time.

OVERDUE VESSEL.—Some anxiety is felt here concerning the schr "Evergreen" and her crew. This vessel sailed from St. John on the 5th inst., for St. Stephen with a cargo of brick for Mr. Patterson, contractor for the cotton mill, and since leaving port no intelligence of her has been received. She has been several days expected at St. Stephen for several days past, and her non-appearance has given rise to fears that she and her crew have been lost. She had 30,000 brick on board, and it was thought best, in order to lighten her, to take off 4,000 brick. She certainly was not overloaded. The schooner was commanded by Capt. Gerow, who has a wife and family St. Paul street, Portland. The mate's name was Robert Hickey, and he belongs to P. E. Island. There were two others on board—both St. John men.

Later.—We are glad to be able to state that the "Evergreen" and her crew are all right. She arrived safely at St. Stephen on Wednesday.—*Globe.*
