

# Flyers Dump Montague 4-2 To Tie For First Place

Playing coach Allie Carver fired goals no. 18, 19 and 20 to lead the Parkdale Flyers to a 4-2 victory over the Montague Primroses at the Sports Arena last night and send the Flyers into a two-way tie for the leadership of the Island Senior "B" Hockey League with the Basilia Youth Club.

Carver picked up one marker in the second and shot the winning goal in the third.

Flick Landry and Billy Hughes potting singles for Montague and Jim MacLeod notched the other Flyer counter.

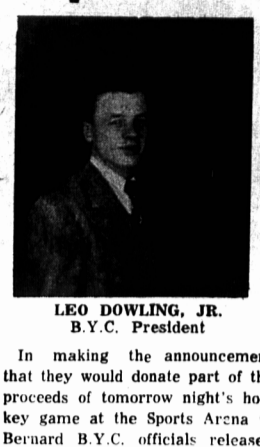

"While knowing that the accident was purely accidental the B.Y.C. team members and officials wish to take this opportunity to pay some small tribute to an outstanding athlete who has done a great deal for sport in this province.

"We have always held Joe Bernard in high esteem as a hockey player and a baseball player. His high hard fast ball has won many a baseball game for Summerside teams and his play as a forward in hockey has helped many Summerside hockey teams to championships.

"But above all his conduct on and off the ice has commanded our respect at all times. A clean player who always stuck strictly to the sport at hand Joe Bernard set a fine example for all athletes to follow.

## Sport Forum Cobey McCluskey Had Spotlight In 1955 Rings

Boxing in this province, both pro and amateur, struggled through some lean days from an attendance viewpoint in 1955 but there were signs of better times in the coming year.

An exhibition promoted all bouts in Charlottetown which numbered 3 and which were staged at the Forum. Jerry Sheen promoted 2 cards at the Raceway Stadium in Summerside and amateur activity included one card at the R.C.A.F. Station in Summerside.

Louis "Cobey" McCluskey, Mari time middleweight champ and also ranked number one contender for the Canadian middleweight title, became a tremendous crowd pleaser in two main event bouts in Charlottetown.

On May 6th he punched out a 10-round decision over Rudy Watkins of Baltimore and the biggest pro boxing crowd of 1955 crowded into the Forum on July 12th when 2000 fans came to see McCluskey and New York's Jimmy Skinner in the latter got the judges' nod after 10 close rounds.

Cobey had one of his best years since he began tossing leather back in 1943. In Halifax he won a 10-round decision over New Glasgow's Gary Simon and followed up with a 3-round knockout over Rocky Pollard of Boston at Dartmouth. In his next appearance at Dartmouth Cobey K.O'd Johnny McDonough of Boston in 8 rounds, then battled to a draw in Moncton with Lou Lawrence. Cobey finished out the year by dropping a much disputed 10-round decision to Lawrence in a bout for the Canadian middleweight title at Fredericton, N.B.

Don Ross of West Bay Road, N.B., suffered the first knockout of his career December 19th in a Toronto. His opponent was a husky veteran from Barrie, Ont., Don Wallace. Ross, who had stashed 39 opponents himself and who had lost only 13 fights against 72 wins and 4 draws, was decked with a right early in the fourth, and although he struggled to his feet referee Harry Davis stopped the fight. Up to the time of the K.O. Ross was leading by a comfortable margin on points.

Back in 1934 Gussie MacLellan of New Aberdeen, Cape Breton, started tossing leather for pay and for 5 years ruled the roost of Maritime featherweights. He was well known in New England and in one period of 13 weeks he took part in as many fights in and around Boston. He was managed by Al Clementie of Boston. Gussie announced his retirement from the ring shortly after losing to Kid Lantz in March 1939.

Walter Edgerly, better known as the "Kentucky Rosebud", one of the great featherweights of all time, closed a fabulous career and established the record of being the oldest fighter ever to participate in an official contest when he stopped John Henry Johnson in 4 rounds in 1916 at the Broadway Athletic Club in New York City. The Rosebud was 63 and Johnson 45.

Bob Fitzsimmons fought his last match at the age of 52.

Jack Johnson another ex-champ engaged in his last fight at the age of 48 when he defeated Pat Lester in a 15-rounder at Nogales, Texas, May 5th, 1926. Jack spotted Lester 23 years and had boxed professionally for 27 years.

MONCTON (CP)—Amherst Ramblers' high-scoring trio of Shermie White, Jackie Schmidt and Pierre Brillant continue to dominate the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League scoring race.

## Can. Skier To Undergo Surgery For Leg Fracture

ST. ANTON, Austria (CP)—Andy Tommy of Ottawa, 23-year-old member of Canada's Olympic ski team, will be operated on today for a double fracture of his right leg.

Tommy, who thrice before in the last four years had suffered broken bones, slipped this morning while practising on a slalom course here.

"He twisted his leg, and he fell, I think it broke even before he fell," said Mrs. Patsy Ramage of Brantford, Ont., leader of the team. "We've got one of the best bone surgeons looking after him."

NARROWS TEAM

The accident left only Tommy's brother Art and Andre Bertrand of Quebec City to compete for Canada in the Alpine section of the Olympics, to be held at Cortina d'Ampezzo, Italy, later this month.

The Alpine section is made up of three races—slalom, downhill and giant slalom.

Tommy was taken some 50 miles to a hospital at Feldkirch where he was resting comfortably Tuesday night. Mrs. Ramage said the doctor expected he would have to place screws in the leg to fix the fracture. Tommy broke his leg once before in the same place—just above the ankle.

The Canadians leave St. Anton Saturday for Kitzbuehl, Austria, where they will take part in the Hahnenkamm races, final major trophy before the winter games. They leave for Cortina Jan. 16.

## Clarence Campbell Leans Penalty Rule Revision

MONTREAL (CP)—President Clarence Campbell of the National Hockey League said Tuesday he would like to see the penalty rule revised so a penalized player could return to the game when the opposition scores a goal.

"A foul conceivably can prevent a goal, but only one goal," Campbell told The Canadian Press. "Why give the other team a chance to score more? Through the change we would simply conform with the logic of our own rules."

Campbell quoted from Rule 34, section B of the NHL rules. It deals with delayed calling of a penalty by the referee when a foul is committed by a player of the team not in possession of the puck. The rule says: "If the penalty to be imposed is a minor penalty and a goal is scored on the play, the minor penalty shall not be imposed in the normal manner regardless of whether a goal is scored or not."

DOESN'T KNOW WHEN

In giving his personal opinion, Campbell said he does not know if or when such change would come about. Suggestion for such a change was recently made by Conn Smythe, president of Toronto Maple Leafs.

"We are not hunching about our rules and we are not averse to change, despite what some people might think," said Campbell. "We are willing to make changes if we think they will benefit the game."

Campbell made it clear that if such rule revision comes about the change should not apply if both teams are reduced to equal strength through penalties, such as five or four men a side.

There may be bugs that would have to be worked out, however, he said. A circumstance could arise whereby the player of one team was given a major penalty and a player of the other team a minor. Campbell said consideration might be given to reducing the minor penalty, normally five minutes, by two minutes in case of a goal.

## Thinks Canada Can Win Some Medals At Olympics

MONTREAL (CP)—Canadians should be able to bring home some medals from the Olympic winter games opening this month in Cortina, Italy—and from the summer games in Melbourne late this year, St. Jovite, Que.

In speed skating there is hope that Gordon Audley of Winnipeg will do at least as well as in the last Olympics when he placed third in the 400-metre event. John Sands of Saskatoon is another possibility.

The Canadian winter team will have 37 competitors and 13 officials. The hockey squad is the largest group, with 17 players. The skiers are already overseas and their number was cut to nine Tuesday with the injury—double fracture of the leg—that befell Andy Tommy of Ottawa. There now are five men and four women skiers.

## Directors Vote Miami Into Triple A Circuit

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Directors of the International Baseball League unanimously voted Tuesday to add Triple-A circuit Miami and drew up a 154-game schedule with season opens April 18 in Columbus, Richmond, Miami and Havana.

The campaign by Sid Salomon Jr., St. Louis investment banker, to bring the Syracuse franchise to Miami came to a successful conclusion after he and his associates had worked out an agreement for use of Miami Stadium.

Salomon bought the struggling Syracuse club for a reported \$100,000 from Marvin Haske.

BREAKS HAVANA TRIP

Officials of the other International League clubs heartily endorsed the move to Miami, partly because they feel this rapidly growing resort city will draw well and partly because the Miami location will break up the long trip from Havana to Richmond, the next southernmost city in the league.

A prediction that Miami would draw 400,000 customers in its first season in the league was made by the Havana president, Roberto Maduro.

In the league's opening games, Montreal will be at Columbus, Toronto at Richmond, Buffalo at Miami and Rochester at Havana.

Northern cities will open at home May 2, with Columbus at Montreal, Richmond at Toronto, Miami at Buffalo and Havana at Rochester.
