MONTREAL, March 28 — (CP) — Canadian Pacific Railway Company today reported net earnings for February at \$1,724,230, compared with \$42,611 in the corresponding month last year. Gross earnings for the same month were \$30,954,131, compared with \$26,403,293 in February 1950, while working expenses totalled \$29,229,901 against \$26,360,682.

LONDON — (CP) — Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary have each donated \$325 to provide two chairs in the restored guildhall of St. George at King's Lynn, Norfolk. The building erected in 1408 is the largest and most complete surviving guildhall in the United Kingdom.

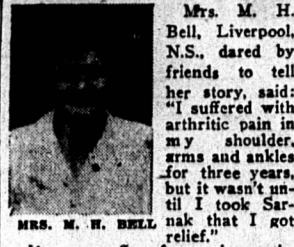
