

Treatment of Bright's Disease.

Semmola, of Naples, in an article in the Wiener Medizinische Blatter, No. 49 advises, strongly against allowing a patient who is suffering from nephritis to come in contact with cold in any avoidable way.

He would advise the patient to live in a dry and equable climate; to strictly avoid all exposure or going about in severe winter weather; to practice mild gymnastics in a comfortable room rather than venture into a temperature below 18 or 20 degrees C.

The methodical inhalation of oxygen, which Semmola has urged since 1867, has been repeatedly proved to be of the highest benefit. Albumen soon disappears after its use, and although casts may remain in the urine, the patient's general condition is so much improved that the author thinks we have here an argument for the dyscrasic or hematogenic origin of Bright's disease.

All astringents are considered not only valueless, but also injurious. Especially is the action of ferrum sesquichloratum and plumbum acetatum through injurious, because of their astringent influence on the capillaries of the skin.

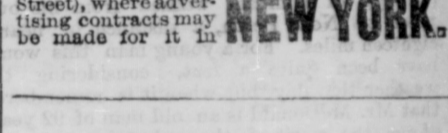
