The nuptials of Walter A. O. Morson, Esq., and Miss May DesBrissay were celebrated at six o'clock this morning.

According to an Ottawa despatch, from information received by the Minister of Agriculture it is learned that there is now a good demand for two-rowed barley for shipment to the English market.

A new scandal has been unearthed in Quebec. The story is that some time Attorney General Robidoux, of the Mercier government, took proceedings to secure to the Province the property of one Fraser, recently deceased, the contention being that the son who succeeded to the property was illegitimate.

A correspondent reminds us that tenders are being called for the New London mail service, as the contract is about expiring. This service has to be performed with two horses, and parties have, he says, been in the habit of tendering low and running the mail for the greater part of the time with a one-horse team.

Before the Teachers' Provincial Institute.

(MR. OXENHAM'S REPORT CONTINUED)

A paper on Politeness was read before the Teachers' Institute, by Miss Alice Fennessey, of Queen Square School, a synopsis of which is as follows:
