

## New Hampshire Inspires Two New Waffle Recipes

NO wonder this is called The House of the Beautiful Flowers, Madame," remarked the Chef. What an interesting piazza floral border arrangement is here at the Ravine House! It reveals at once the woman's touch.

Yet, he went on, it is an idea anyone can carry out if they are fortunate enough to have a wide piazza with no railing. It's very simple.

### GORGEOUS PETUNIAS

Phyllis Shea, the owner has merely bordered the piazzas, which extend the entire length of the Inn, with low green painted window boxes filled with gorgeous petunias. Every porch pillar is covered with clematis vines—both are easy to grow and care for.

It's a lot of loveliness for a little work and money. The woman's touch is also evident in the menus. Chef, I observed. The waffles at breakfast were delicious. Which reminds me, our readers will enjoy trying the two new waffle recipes you worked out in the test-kitchen, Chef.

**Buttermilk Waffles:** Into a bowl, measure 2 c. pancake mix. Add 1/2 tsp. baking soda, 2 c. buttermilk, 1/3 c. melted shortening and 2 eggs. Beat with a rotary egg beater until fairly smooth.

Pour the batter into a heated waffle iron. Bake until it stops steaming. Serve hot with butter and syrup or creamed dried beef, creamed eggs or slices of crisp bacon.

**Cornmeal Waffles:** Into a bowl, measure 1 1/2 c. pancake mix, 1/2 c. enriched cornmeal, 1/4 c. milk, 1/3 c. melted shortening and 2 eggs. Beat with a rotary beater until fairly smooth. Pour into a

heated waffle iron; bake until it stops steaming. Serve hot with butter or syrup, or with creamed chicken or ham, or with any a la king sauce.

**Hot or Iced Coffee or Tea Milk Pecan-Cloverleaf Muffins Ravine House:** Prepare Parker House roll dough as usual (or make up 1 pkg. roll mix according to package directions). Rub deep muffin pans with butter. Then cream together 1/2 c. butter and 3/4 c. brown sugar. Spread on the bottoms of the pans. In each put a 1/8" section of canned sliced pineapple. Put in 3 pecans, radiating toward the edge. In each pan put 7 marble-sized balls of roll dough. Let rise until doubled. Bake 25 min. at 375 degrees F. Brush with butter. Serve upside-down.

### TRICK OF THE CHEF

Brush pork chops before broiling with equal parts of soy sauce and lemon juice.

which were four feet in width so as to have room to gather the roses and this is an unusual procedure for most of us who grow roses. In this city garden the flowers overflowed on the sidewalk making it possible for passers-by to get the fragrance of the tall multicolored rose Condesa de Sagato which were planted by the walk leading to the front door. Low growing yellow roses and a lovely blue ageratium with some apricot violas made the rose colored tiles of the path a pleasant walk that beautiful morning when it was my privilege to visit the garden. Stachys lanata was planted where the soft grey velvety leaves curved over the edges of the path when we entered the arch which was made of lovely green leaves on the arching branches of the Snowflake Mock Orange with large double white flowers.

The window boxes were planted with petunias in a beautiful shade of blue and looking very well with lovely geraniums in a good crimson red. A shady grass walk which was bordered with pansies and fuschias covered with rosy bloom and good foliaged shrubs brought us to the rose garden. Among the favorite roses of this good gardener were Betty Prior, Masquerade, Frensham, Fashion, Goldilocks, Lady Silvia, and Else Poulsen. The most fragrant rose grown in this city garden is Hector Deane, and San Fernando, Volcano and Texas Centennial were among the favorite roses. In this small city garden many

lovely bouquets of roses and other flowers go out to cheer the sick and other folk needing their beauty, making it a worthwhile hobby for anyone to follow. It was a pleasure and a privilege to see this well-planned and carefully tended garden. In a small garden it is necessary to select very carefully the plants grown as the space is so limited. I think it is more difficult than in a large garden where quantity of plant material is needed. Here in this small garden nothing was included that was not beautiful every month in the year. It was a lesson in good planning and planting.

In the sharing of a garden which has been made by our own effort we multiply our own joy in it. As the poet has written: He who joy would win, must share it. Happiness were born a twin. Next week I shall tell you about other lovely island gardens it has been my pleasure and privilege to visit the past few weeks. ### OATMEAL COOKIES

1 cup shortening and butter (mixed)  
1 cup brown sugar (heaped)  
1 tsp. soda, dissolved in 1/4 cup hot water  
1 cup rolled oats  
1 cup crushed corn flakes  
1/2 cup coconut  
1 pkg. candied red cherries  
1/2 cup walnuts  
2 cups flour  
pinch of salt  
Method: Drop by teaspoon on greased cookie sheet, and press down with fork dipped in hot water.
