A motion granting the commissioners authority to negotiate a loan to the amount of \$6,000 for the acquisition of a lot of a land and for the erection of a building 24' x 32' was approved at a special meeting of the rate payers held last night. Mr. J. Edmund Arsenault, chairman of the Commissioners presided.

Mr. Howard Douglas explained the plans of the new building which in addition to housing the fire truck and equipment will have a firemen's recreation room. The hall will be centrally located and arrangements are being made to purchase a lot of land on Eden St. The contract will be awarded immediately and the erection of the building will get under way as soon as the lot is purchased.

## Queen Mother Takes Time Out To Visit N. Y. Empire State Building

NEW YORK (CP)—The observation roof of the Empire State building got its 1,080,000th visitor Thursday. Moments later the 1,080,000th arrived—a royal visitor from overseas.

Queen Mother Elizabeth, who arrived for her North American visit Tuesday on the world's largest liner, took time out Thursday to visit the world's tallest building. She gazed with delight at the view of New York and its surrounding area.

"There are no adjectives with which I can express the beauty I saw from the tower," she told officials of the corporation which owns the 102-storey building. "It is breathtaking, isn't it?"

The Queen first went to the observation balcony on the 86th floor, but the crowds already there were so great that a way could hardly be cleared by her escort of 15 policemen. She could hardly move for the crush of photographers, reporters and spectators who crowded round so, after looking out briefly from two sides, she was whisked up to the crow's nest on the 102nd floor, which had been reserved for her.

A large crowd lined the sidewalk of lower Broadway as the Queen arrived, and hundreds of others gathered from the windows of the surrounding skyscrapers and showered bits of paper and confetti down on her.

Walter Gifford, former U.S. ambassador to London, presided at the luncheon, attended by 25 guests and given by the Pilgrims Society, an organization dedicated to British-American friendship.

Thursday night Sir Pierson gave a private dinner at Wave Hill for United Nations and Commonwealth diplomats. Among those attending were Eelco Van Kleffens, president of the UN General Assembly, Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld; Paul Martin, acting chairman of the Canadian delegation to the General Assembly; and David Johnson, permanent Canadian delegate to the UN.
