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FORGERY CASE WILL GO TO JURY TODAY

Evidence Was Concluded Yesterday With Testimony By Accused.

Case of John McAleer and Frederick McAleer, charged on two counts with forgery will go to the jury today following the charge by His Lordship Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault who presiding over the hearing. Yesterday three witnesses for the Crown and a like number, including the two accused, for the defence gave evidence. Those examined were Frank Acorn, manager of Ed's Taxi where John McAleer was employed at the time of the alleged offense, Warren Burns, meteorologist at Charlottetown Experimental Station and A. F. McIsaac, hand writing expert in the Halifax Police Department, for the Crown and William Moran, principal at the local business college and writing instructor, and the two accused for the defence.

Before Court adjourned the jury heard a summary of the case by Mr. J. Johnston, counsel for the accused and by Attorney General Thane A. Campbell on behalf of the Crown. When the latter concluded after 5 o'clock on Friday morning until 10:30 this morning when Mr. Justice Arsenault will charge the jury.

The case arose out of a money order cashed in the Charlottetown Post Office by John McAleer. The order was made out to Mrs. Wilfred Doucette and was purchased by her husband, a sailor on the C. S. Carley at Lunenburg, N. S. on the 1st day of October last. Mrs. Doucette laid complaint some time later with post office authorities she had not received the order which was cashed by John McAleer at the local office on October 5. After investigation a new money order was issued payable to Mrs. Doucette, Mr. A. V. Saunders, post office inspector for the office testified.

A. F. McIsaac, hand writing expert called by the Crown testified samples of Frederick McAleer's writing strongly resembled the document. Mrs. Wilfred Doucette, on the money order made out to a person by that name and cashed at the Charlottetown Post Office by John McAleer. The witness was subjected to lengthy cross examination by Counsel for the defence.

William Moran, called by the defence testified in his opinion the hand writing of Frederick McAleer and the name, "Mrs. Wilfred Doucette" signed on the money order were not similar.

John McAleer testifying in his own defence told that on the evening he cashed the money order in question, early last October, a woman called at Ed's Taxi stand where he was driver. She wanted a money order for \$44.00 cashed but as there was not enough money he suggested she go to the post office as it was still open. She engaged him to drive her to the post office, the witness said. He did so and drove to the back door of the post office, which was closed at the time. The woman asked him if he would mind running in and cashing it for her. He complied but Mr. Griffith, whom the witness had known since "I was a kid," said the order had been endorsed in the wrong place. He took the money to the woman. No one had a pen so they went to Fontana's restaurant where he got her a pen and she endorsed the order in the car. They then returned to the post office where Mr. Griffith gave the money, first having the accused sign also. The witness then drove the woman out Elm Avenue to Manuel's Corner where she got out.

The witness did not know the woman but he described her. Next witness, and last one to testify, was Frederick McAleer, brother of the last witness. He was at the taxi stand when the woman called and his brother drove away. Then he went inside and sat at the desk. Questioned whether he knew J. A. Weir the witness said he did. He had known him for some time. He had seen him at a house on Buxton Street about the first of October. They were there one night and the witness accompanied Weir in his car to in front of the 5 and 10 on Queen Street. He was about 15 minutes while Weir went away. The witness alone in the car had seen no mail bag in the car nor had he taken any letter.

Mr. Weir, Charlottetown letter carrier in evidence the preceding day testified he did not remember having any letter for Mrs. Doucette which he did not deliver.

WINNIPEG, June 27—(CP)—When hunting days are over, the problem of the aged is often solved quickly by the Eskimos. Dr. A. E. Fleming, bishop of the Arctic, told newsmen here. They are walled up in snow huts and left to die.

"According to our ideas it is very cruel but it is easy to understand it when you realize that Eskimos live most of their lives on the verge of starvation," he added.
