The steamer "Mitsubishi" arrived last evening at seven o'clock, from Montreal, with a large number of excursionists, most of whom went to Seaside, Lorne, and Point Pleasant Hotels.

LONDON, Ont., goes to a centenarian inmate. He is an old man who has been in for safe keeping for a long time. He rarely leaves his cell and never goes into the yard. His name is Thomas Ross, and his age 106.

THE Annual Scottish Gathering of the Clans, under the auspices of the Caledonia Club of this Province, will take place on the grounds immediately opposite the residence of the Hon. John Longworth, in this city on the 18th day of August next.

AMONGST the passengers leaving for England to-day, were Staff Com. J. G. Boulton, R. N., wife and family. Capt. Boulton has been attached to the Admiralty Survey for the past nine years, and has recently been recalled to join another survey. Both Captain Boulton and his good lady leave with the best wishes of the entire community.

SUPREME COURT.—In the case of Owen Connolly and another vs. George Howatt, the jury last evening returned a verdict of over \$1,200 for the plaintiffs. The case of Cushing vs. Coombs, is now before the Court. To-day the prisoners John McCloskey and Patrick McCloskey were sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for assaulting Manson, and Joe. McKee, for the same offense, was sentenced to six months imprisonment in the common jail.

THE Bronze Medals awarded by His Excellency the Governor General to each of the pupils in the three public schools of the city who obtained the highest number of marks for general proficiency at the June Examinations, were received by the Secretary of the City School Board last night's mail, and handed by him to those entitled to receive them, viz. Miss Gertrude Brown, of Upper Prince Street School, John A. Grant, of Queen Square School, and Gordon A. Laird, of West Ken Street School.

THE Dominion Alliance, a branch of which it is proposed to form in this city on Tuesday morning, welcomes all to its membership, without prescribing any other texts than agreement with its objects. All gentlemen friendly to the South Act, whether subscribers or not, will find in the alliance a most effective field of labor. There is work to do, and there should be no want of men to do that work. As a people, we have accepted the Canada Temperance Act, 1878, and we think it is now in order that the proper steps be taken to have the law carried out fairly and squarely.

THE Stirling News-Argus, after quoting the Toronto Globe's article on the alleged abuse of a lunatic at the Prince Edward Island Asylum, publishes a letter from a former patient of the Rockwood Asylum, who states that the inmates were, a few years ago, "clubbed, kicked, and knocked around, and that without any provocation whatever, only that in the caprice of the attendants." He relates the circumstances of an assault upon himself by the keepers, who beat him and tore his clothes off from mere wantonness. He asserts that he complained next morning to Dr. Dickson, who said "it would not happen again, and he would like to know the names of the men."

At the Monday afternoon session of the Prince Edward Island Baptist Association, Rev. Mr. Hinson requested and obtained permission to address the body with respect to his position and relation to its members. He said it was known to most of those present, that some time since he had written a letter to one of the Island newspapers, reflecting on the reputation of some of the brethren, and that he had afterwards denied that he was the writer of the said letter. He now felt it to be his duty to express his regret that he had written the said letter, and that he had subsequently denied its authorship, and that he had cast any reflections on the reputation of his brethren. In the evening sitting, a resolution was submitted and adopted, to the effect that the Association accept the apology of Brother Hinson.—Christian Messenger.

STIPENDIARY MAGISTRATE'S COURT.—At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, Richard Manley and Alfred Farmer appeared on complaint of Chas. Palmer, Esq., for stealing a cricket bat from his yard on the 14th inst. The evidence was clear against Manley, and he was sentenced to two months imprisonment with hard labor. There was no evidence that Farmer was a partner in the robbery, although it is believed he had something to do in it. He was held until another boy who was with Manley is arrested. Daniel Carroll and Henry McEwen appeared on complaint of John Beer, Esq., for stealing the sum of four dollars and a quarter from his store on Thursday, the 14th inst. The prisoners, it appears, entered the store of Mr. Beer on the night of Saturday, the 2nd inst., after nine o'clock, on pretense of buying a shirt. Carroll asked for the article in question, and Mr. Beer, who was alone in the store and counting his days receipts, which were on the desk, arose to serve them. While Carroll was looking at the shirt McEwen went to the desk and took the above sum. Mr. Beer did not see him do it, but being suspicious called his son, who was in the office. On hearing his call, Carroll ran off and McEwen followed, but the latter was caught by Mr. Beer and given in charge of Watchman Shea. He got clear of Shea but was a few days later arrested. In court to-day, one tried to blame the robbery on the other, and the Magistrate settled the matter by sentencing both to six months imprisonment with hard labor.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

LONDON, July 14.

The Times says the leaders of the Irish party in the Commons oppose emigration absolutely and completely, and by indirect and direct means are resisting the adoption of the emigration clause of the land bill. They, doubtless, calculate that the ministry will rather abandon the clause than impel it by rather protract Parliament, at whatever modifications Gladstone may accept, he can scarcely surrender the principle.

The News understands Lord Salisbury has issued a circular to the Conservative peers inviting them to remain in London or at such distance from London as may make their attendance in the House of Lords, when the Land Bill reaches there, conveniently practicable. The same journal says the delay caused by the discussion of the emigration clause places the Bill in a critical position.

PARIS, July 14.

The bombardment of Sfax has ceased, pending the landing of the troops.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, July 14.

Minister Lowell telegraphs Secretary Blaine that he has received the following from the Queen:—"I wish to express my great satisfaction at the very favorable accounts of the President, and hope that he will soon be considered out of danger."

EXECUTIVE MANSION, July 14, 11 p.m.

Up to 5 p. m. the patient's temperature, which is the surest test of febrile disturbance, remained about the same, and the range of pulse only from 92 to 98. After 5 o'clock the temperature gradually increased until 7 o'clock; an examination was made when it was found to be 101 degrees. Since that time it has again fallen, leaving 101 as the maximum of temperature, and 98 as the maximum of pulse for the day. This is a marked improvement upon the record of yesterday. Dr. Reyburn said: "I should not like to promise uninterrupted and unvarying continuance of the President's improvement, but at the same time I may say there is at present every prospect of the President's recovery. The President is sleeping quietly, and all his symptoms satisfactory."

BALTIMORE, Md., July 14.

The numerous deaths from lock-jaw, occasioned by the reckless use of the deadly toy pistol on the Fourth of July, have created considerable excitement in this city. Two more victims were added to the list to-day, making 13 persons who have died of lock-jaw from wounds received by explosion of toy pistols. Three other cases were reported to-night of parties who cannot recover.

SHIP NEWS.

Barbadoes, W I, July 14—In port brig Natatia, Capt W H Barnard, now loading a cargo of molasses and sugar. This vessel had previously arrived from Prince Edward Island. In addition to a full cargo under deck she discharged 16 horses, 4 cows and 40 sheep deck cargo, all of which landed in good order. Boston, July 12—Schr J J Bell, from Charlottetown.

The Vienna police have seized nearly all the leading journals of that city for publishing a resolution passed by the Constitution alists belonging to a German club. The resolution was not an attack on the Ministry, but merely an expression of the general feeling in regard to the arrogance of the Germans, and their menaces against the Czechs.

Two imperial army commissioners, assisted by several local militia officers, are engaged in locating sites for the new fortifications at Victoria and Esquimaux, B.C. It is expected that a British regiment will be permanently established in the former city.

The great Socialist congress which was to have been held at Zurich will not come off after all, the Grand Council having rejected by a large majority the appeal of the Socialists against the prohibition already issued.
