Morrison Succeeds Bevin As U. K. Foreign Minister

By Arthur Gavahan LONDON, March 9 (AP) - Ailing Ernest Bevin resigned tonight and turned over the job to his old-time rival in the Labor Party, Herbert Morrison.

Bevin has been loath to give up the Foreign Office despite his serious illness. Attlee has revealed he told Attlee a year ago his work as foreign secretary, as much as anything else, has kept him alive.

Three Chinese Counter-Attacks Are Repulsed

TOKYO, March 10 (Saturday) (AP) - The massive United Nations offensive rolled forward Friday, leaving thousands of Chinese and North Korean dead piled amid the crazy snow-capped mountain peaks of Central Korea.

Enemy Withdrawal?

There were increasing signs of a general enemy withdrawal in the western sector as Allied troops gained up to four miles. On the west-central front, the Commonwealth 27th Brigade fought its way ahead more than a mile east of Yongdu, key hub on the road to the Communist stronghold of Hongchon. The Reds offered only spotty resistance as they were driven.

Report Sharp Drop In Canadian Butter Stocks

OTTAWA, March 9 (CP) - Butter reserves are down to almost one-third of what they were a year ago, but officials say Canada likely will squeeze through March with only scattered shortages until new production starts stepping up in April. Domestic stocks of creamery butter March 1 totalled 14,879,000 pounds, the Bureau of Statistics reported today. This was 21,571,000 pounds lower than the 36,450,000 pounds last year.

Foresees Brighter Outlook For Province Financially

House Approves New Development

OTTAWA, March 9 (CP) - The Commons today approved the establishment of a new department to direct the purchase and manufacture of defence supplies. Without a dissenting voice, members gave third and final reading to a bill establishing a department of defence production. The measure now goes to the Senate for three readings and royal assent. Trade Minister Howe, head of the Munitions and Supply Department in the Second World War, will head the new department when it is established. It is expected that Mr. Howe will relinquish his Trade portfolio when he takes over the new department. There has been some speculation that George McIlraith (L-Ottawa West), Mr. Howe's parliamentary assistant, will be appointed Trade Minister.

Child Shows Signs Of Recovering

WINNIPEG, March 9 (CP) - Peter Shannon and his wife hurried downtown today to buy a "big beautiful doll" for their five-year-old daughter. The child, Ila, had just begun to emerge from a coma which had kept her unconscious 17 days. The lot was run over by a taxi Feb. 20 outside her Fort Frances, Ont., home.

U. S. Gov't Rolls Back Soap Prices

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP) - The U.S. Government today rolled back the manufacturer's ceiling prices on soap and said it should mean a cut of one cent a bar in many retail stores. Also, it said soap chips or flakes and soapless detergents may cost two cents less a package. A companion order announced by the Office of Price Stabilization also cut back from 18 to 15 cents a pound the producers' price of fancy tallow, a basic material in soap manufacture. Both orders are effective Monday.

Paris Meeting Is Continuing

PARIS, March 9 (AP) - The Big Four deputies - trying to arrange an agenda for a foreign ministers meeting - agreed tonight that an agreement may have been reached on something. United States, British and French deputies agreed on all points in the draft of issues proposed by the Russians for discussion could be included on the draft they had submitted.

U. S. Senate Approves Drafting 18-Year Olds

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP) - The Senate today passed the administration's big manpower bill providing for a draft of 18-year-olds and for an eventual program of compulsory military training for all young men. The roll-call count was 79-5. Passage after weeks of hearings and debate sends the issue to the House of Representatives. The armed services committee there is writing its own bill. The Senate-passed measure embracing the first compulsory universal military training program in American history - includes most of the features urged by top military leaders. The legislation combines two programs: First, it extends and expands the present selective service law, now due to expire July 9. The draft age would drop from the present 19 to 18. Second, it provides for future establishment of compulsory military training for all young men as they reach 18. This program would be set up whenever the international tension permits a shift to this training instead of the present build-up of regular forces. Six months of training is contemplated.

New French Premier



PARIS, March 9 (AP) - Henri Queuille (above) leader of the Radical Socialist (Conservative) Party, was confirmed as Premier tonight by the French Parliament, thus ending the country's nine-day cabinet crisis. The vote, by unofficial tally, was 332 in favor of Queuille. He needed at least 311 votes.

Tributes To Late Mr. Blythe Hurst

"Blythe Hurst was one of nature's noblemen," said Premier J. Walter Jones in paying tribute yesterday to the late author of "Newspaper Notes" who was known to decades of Guardian readers under the penname of "Agricola." "A wonderful teacher," Premier Jones added; "a notable biologist, a musician, an editor of note, an apostle of good-will. This Province mourns his loss." Also received yesterday was the following tribute from Dr. W. L. Holman, formerly of Summerside and now of Toronto: "My wife and I feel a great sorry in the loss of a dear old friend. We will miss our stimulating visits at his home to which we looked forward from summer to summer as highlights of our vacations on the Island. Blythe Hurst was young in spirit, a happy conversationalist who gave generously from his broad funds of knowledge in many fields; and it is sad to say goodbye to Agricola!"

Princess Patricias Have Day Of Rest In Korea

By BILL BOSS (Canadian Press Correspondent) WEST-CENTRAL FRONT, Korea, March 9 (CP) - This was a day of rest for the Princess Patricias, who swapped battle yarns, read mail and wrote letters around campfires on top of newly-captured Hill 532. From the hill which they took yesterday after a two-day battle - twice charging with fixed bayonets - they watched British troops clearing the next hill. The 27th Commonwealth Brigade in which both they and the Britons are serving has come to be known as the "Banzi" Brigade - the "Banzi" combining the first letters of British, Australian, New Zealand and Indian, the forces that it comprised before the Canadians reached the front.

Gov't Wheat-Marketing Policies Called Failure

OTTAWA, March 9 (CP) - The Canadian Government's wheat-marketing policies were described today as a "colossal failure." Hon. Earl Rowe, minister without portfolio in the last Conservative Government, said the Government had made a "colossal blunder" in wheat trading with the United Kingdom. Government "muddling and meddling" in the farmers' business had cost the farmers \$1,000,000. He spoke in the Commons during continued debate on a bill making several amendments to the Canadian Wheat Board Act. The amendments are aimed at simplifying operations of the Board. Few members referred to the legislation. Most of them dealt mainly with the marketing of wheat under the former four-year agreement with the United Kingdom. Agriculture Minister Gardiner told the Commons last night that the British Government had refused a final payment to Western

Accuses Russia Of Military Pressure

By ALEX SINGLETON BELGRADE, March 9 (AP) - Premier Tito's Government cautioned the Yugoslav people today to align themselves against the possibility of an invasion from the Russian-led states and protested officially against Soviet military movements around its borders. The warning came from Deputy Foreign Minister Ivo Vojvoda. He delivered it in issuing a 481-page white paper in which the Government accused Russia of applying "direct military pressure" against this independent-minded Communist nation. As he finished his statement, Vojvoda was asked at a press conference: "Does the Government of Yugoslavia expect aggression from Russia or the satellite states this year? Or an invasion?" He replied: "The Government of Yugoslavia is not engaged in the business of making prophecies. But the documents (in the white paper) do show that the people in Yugoslavia should be concerned and ready for any possible occurrence."

Toughest Document

The white paper itself constituted probably the toughest document Yugoslavia has issued officially since its break with the Cominform. A prepared statement summarizing the context of the white paper outlined the measures taken by Yugoslavia's neighbors. "Such measures are, for instance, the erection of barbed wire fences and the planting of mine fields along the frontiers, the digging of trenches, the construction of machine-gun nests and emplacement for mortars and artillery and the building of observation posts."

More Aid Planned For Gold Miners

OTTAWA, March 9 (CP) - A new subsidy formula for gold mines was announced today by Finance Minister Abbott, and Government officials said it will add about \$3,000,000 to the 1951 aid previously decided on for the industry. Effect of the new formula, designed to compensate mines for rising production costs, will be to make the subsidy applicable to a greater part of the output of high-cost mines than was permitted under a formula set up last October for this year. A ceiling payment of \$11.50 an ounce will be continued.

Swap Cans of Food

Swapping cans of meat from food rations are about the only dealings the Canadians have had so far with the other troops in the brigade. Sometimes the troops of the Commonwealth countries march past one another's bivouacs and brief breaks give scope for a cup of tea together. Pte. Bill St. Paul of Kazabavua, Que., tells of one of these meetings: "A couple of New Zealanders made some tea for us as we were passing the other day. They even gave us a tin of condensed milk."

Duchess of Windsor Out of Hospital

NEW YORK, March 9 (AP) - The Duchess of Windsor was to be released today from the hospital where she underwent an operation 15 days ago. A hospital spokesman said the Duchess has recovered. Nature of the operation has not been disclosed but it was called minor.

German Nobleman Dies In Quebec

VAL D'OR, Que., March 9 (CP) - A German nobleman who preferred the life of a Northern Quebec prospector to that of his native Germany, died in hospital Thursday. He was known throughout the Val D'or gold belt as Fred Henry but his real name was Baron Frederick Otto Carl Von Heinrichhausen. The Baron, 61, came to Canada in 1922.
