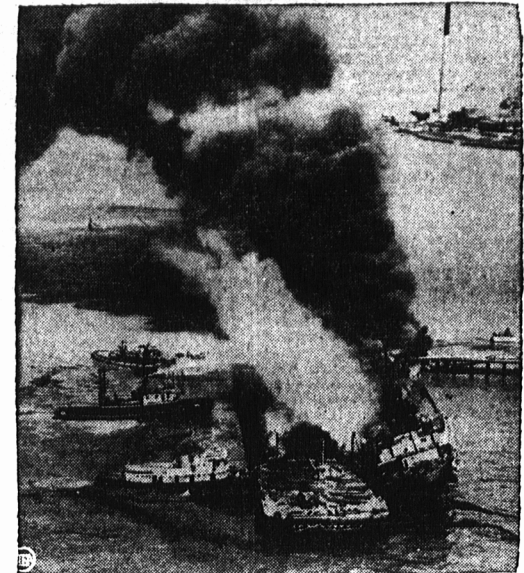

Tignish Legion Plans Large Recreation Centre

Undaunted by the severe loss they sustained three weeks ago when the Tignish Legion building and contents were completely destroyed by fire, the Legion members together with the members of the Legion Club, are already planning to build a much larger building which will be in the nature of a recreation center to be known as the Tignish Legion Recreation Center. Such an institution has been a long felt need for the residents of Tignish and the surrounding farming and fishing settlements. Present plans are that the new building will be the headquarters for the Tignish branch of the Canadian Legion and the Legion Club, moving picture theatre and dance hall, bowling alley and reading rooms.

At a meeting held recently it was decided that the chairman of the meeting, Mr. Claude Kinch, who is president of the Legion, appoint a committee of six to make a survey and study three problems, namely—the location in Tignish which would serve the public best, the estimated cost on any agreed type of building to be erected and the possible practicable method of financing the enterprise. Why U. S. Cannot Permit Loss Of Western Europe

(By J. M. Roberts, Jr., Associated Press News Analyst)

The reason why the United States cannot sit back and take chances on the conquest of Western Europe by Russia can be found in a recent United Nations report on industrial patterns.

The United States and Western Europe together produce 150,000,000 metric tons of steel annually. The U. S. share is 95,000,000.

The Iron Curtain countries and Western Europe produce 97,000,000 tons. The Russian-controlled share is 40,000,000.

Without Europe, Russia cannot compete with the U. S. in this industry vital to war. With Europe, she is an equal.

The U. S. produces 519,000,000 metric tons of coal, Western Europe 502,000,000, the Soviet 281,000,000. A combined continental production would have all the edge.

The oil situation is different. The U. S. produces seven or eight times as much oil as the European continent.

There are adjacent to Russia, however, vast oil reserves subject to possible conquest.

The manpower situation is well known. Thus, in a world where continental Europe was mobilized, even against its wishes, for Russian purposes, the United States would cut a small figure.

The greatest immediate opportunity of the West lies not in new development, but in the industrial revival of Germany.

In one way, reports of industrial production behind the Iron Curtain contain hope. Hope that when Russia will have developed her own vast resources, she will find herself in the position which has had so much to do with the international morality of the United States. Then Russia would not need to employ aggressiveness to seek her ends.

But while that aggressiveness still exists, the necessity of preventing an imbalance of power through Russian mobilization of Europe can hardly be overestimated.
