PLAN APPEAL - The Provincial Potato Marketing Board will appeal the judgement of the Supreme Court of this Province to the Supreme Court of Canada if the present marketing legislation is declared ultra vires by the P. E. I. Supreme Court. It was stated yesterday by Mr. D. A. Macdonald, Chairman of the Board, said the Potato Marketing Board is quite satisfied to have the validity of Bill 82 tested before the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island or before the Supreme Court of Canada or both.

MR. REID'S RESIGNATION - Mr. E. D. Reid, Secretary-Manager of the Prince Edward Island Potato Growers Association will resign from office on August 1, it was learned yesterday from Mr. Reid. His resignation was handed in to the Association directors a week ago and has been accepted with regret. Queried about his future plans Mr. Reid said he would not forsake the potato business with which he has been connected for the past six years. It is believed that he is going into business for himself. He has been manager of the Potato Growers Association since Sept. 1, 1948, taking office shortly after the death of J. W. Souther, his predecessor. Several applications have been received by the executive of the Potato Growers' Association for the position.

POLICE COURT - Heavy sentences and fines were meted out in City Police Court yesterday morning when six drunk and disorderly cases were heard. The fines were steeper than usual in some cases due to the people involved resisting arrest and fighting with the Police. One of them was fined \$50 and costs or thirty days, two others got \$40 and costs or 25 days and the fourth was given 30 days. One of the other two was fined \$30 and costs or 20 days and the last \$25 and costs or 20 days. Also on the docket were five drunken driving charges. Four of them were remanded to this morning and the fifth until June 25th. A drunk and incapable drove 10 days, three more were each fined \$10 and costs or 10 days while four others each were fined \$20 and costs or 20 days. A summary ejection case was adjourned to the 21st and a warning given a person charged with keeping a vicious dog.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. WILLIAM SHEEN

On the evening of June 2nd there passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Frank Platts, her mother Mrs. William Sheen at the advanced age of eighty-four years. The deceased had enjoyed excellent health and was able to be about and meet her friends with her ever cheerful smile until an accident which occurred on November 22nd, 1949, - a fall which resulted in a broken hip made her a bed-ridden invalid from that time until the call came which relieved her of her suffering and brought rest and peace. Through all this trying time she was never heard to murmur or complain but always had a bright and cheery greeting for those who cared for her and who did everything possible to make her comfortable.

Mrs. Sheen (Alma McLeod) was born at Burlington, one of a large family, three of whom still survive - a brother, George McLeod of Burlington and two sisters, Mrs. John McGougan and Mrs. Hugh Campbell of Kensington. On Dec. 19, 1888, she was married to William Sheen of Park Corner and to this union were born five children, two of whom survive to mourn the loss of a devoted mother. Elga (Mrs. Frank Platts) and Nelson, both of Tyne Valley. The eldest daughter Lila (Mrs. W. E. McNevin) died on April 2nd, 1928 at Grossy Lake, Alberta, leaving an infant son, now grown to manhood and serving with the Canadian Navy at Dartmouth, N.S. Two other children passed away in their childhood. Mrs. Sheen's husband was a miller by trade and they operated a grist and flour mill in New Glasgow for a time. Later in 1899 they moved to Tyne Valley where they engaged in milling grist and running a saw-mill until the death of her husband on January 9th., 1930. A splendid couple, they were among the pioneers of this community.

On June 5th, a large procession followed the remains to the Presbyterian Church where an impressive service was conducted by the minister in charge, Mr. T. Cunningham, after which all that was mortal was laid to rest beside her loved ones who had gone before. Many beautiful floral offerings with their messages of sympathy and love covered the new made grave.

The pallbearers were - Messrs. Ernest Ellis, Thomas Grigg, Hardy Ramsay, John Ballum, Angus McLennon and Edward Ramsay.

Making Study Of Co-op Movement

An accountant with the Puerto Rican Government, Mr. Augustus Roig of San Juan, Puerto Rico, is paying a two weeks visit to the Province as part of a tour during which he is studying the set up and organization of the co-operative movement in the Maritimes. Although established only four years ago, the Co-operative and the Credit Union movement in Puerto Rico has mushroomed, states Mr. Roig. He added that the Puerto Rican Government supported the movement both financially and educationally.

Mr. Roig himself is deeply interested in the movement particularly the internal workings of the co-operatives. He stated that co-operatives in his country had a sales business of \$25,000,000 last year while the whole country did a sales business of \$387,000,000.

The association borrows heavily from the Puerto Rican banks. Each year he stated that the marketing associations borrowed \$10,000,000 from the banks which in turn is distributed to the members through loans. The co-operatives are now organizing their own bank, he said, and the government is supplying \$1,000,000 working capital in order to get the bank started.

One of the reasons for the Puerto Rican government's support of the co-operative movement is that the Governor himself is very interested in the movement.

As a result a number of Puerto Ricans have been surveying the movement in the Maritimes and five senators from that country spent some time at St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish. More students will be sent up to the Maritimes next year, said Mr. Roig.

Population of Puerto Rico is about two and a half million. The average farmer owns about an acre of land on which he grows tobacco and cultivates other minor crops. Considerable rum is made in the country and its production costs about 12 cents a Canadian gallon, said Mr. Roig. The same quantity of rum here costs approximately \$20. In Puerto Rican liquor stores the rum sells for \$1.25 to \$2.50 a quart but bootleggers sell it for 35 cents a quart, he added with a smile. The Government imposes a luxury tax of \$6.00 a gallon on the liquor.

A farmer sometimes has quite a job getting the proper grade for his tobacco. In all there are 45 different grades and the prices range from \$27 to \$45 so that the difference between grades is quite negligible.

35 Bodies Found In Hospital Ruins

MONTREAL, June 18 - (CP) - The death toll in Friday's Ste. Cunegonde fire was officially placed tonight at 35 by Coroner Dr. A. B. Clement.

Dr. Clement said there appeared no possibility of further bodies being found in the fire-wrecked home for aged and children. Firemen have completed moving and searching debris where bodies might have been hidden, the coroner said.

Seven bodies were taken from the building today to complete the count.

Meanwhile, preparations went forward for a civic funeral tomorrow for the victims.
