Thursday night's races last week at Saint John, N. B., saw a surprise winner in the 3rd and 5th dashes when Dixie Belle B., owned by H. Renaud of Bouctouche, and driven by Art Gallant, headed the field both trips, best time 2:18 2/5. Dannie Steele, owned by C. B. Smith, French Village and driven by Frankie Carr was 3-2. Dot Cash, owned by Henry Bishop with driver G. Woodside, 5-2. The 6th dash was won by Ramona Chips, 2:13 3/5, owned by the Bright Spot Club, Saint John, and driven by Mac Lawson, kept up her winning streak by being first to the wire in the 4th and 7th dashes. This mare had a good record in Ontario last year where she made 36 starts in tough company, was 12 times first, nine times second, and 10 times third. The redoubtable Monty Budlong, that many Islanders will remember, owned and driven by G. R. Armstrong, was 2-4; Rusty Hanover (Carr) 4-3; Danny Dale Boy (H. Crawford) 6-2; Adagio 3-5. Time, 2:14 3/5, 2:14 3/5. In the 5th and 8th dashes Piney Boy, owned by the Bright Spot Club, Saint John, with driver Lawson, was 1-5. The 17-year-old O. U. Volo, owned by Norris Cooper, Saint John, and driven by Currie Wood, was 4-1; the trotter Tyrone Semple, owned and driven by G. Woodside, 2-4; Doc B. Gratian (Renaud) 5-2. Time, 2:18 2/5, 2:18 2/5. What an old pro that O. U. Volo is! He has been racing since a three-year-old.

A welcome visitor at the race track every morning is Longworth MacMillan of Calgary, Alberta. Mr. MacMillan left here 49 years ago, took up land in the west and became one of the largest operators in Alberta. Some years ago he disposed of his holdings and is now enjoying life. He takes a keen interest in the horses and is the owner of the pacer You'll See 2:17 2/5 in the Blair Andrew stable.

A real good race card brought the largest attendance of the season to the Charlottetown track last Saturday night.

The largest night crowd of the season saw a splendid program of racing at Summerside Saturday night. The first race was a single dash and was won by the trotter Frisco the Great, owned by Reg Sonier and driven by Don McNeill, time, 2:17—a new record for Frisco. Just a length back was Sandy Mar (Robichaud) and June Henley (Cormier) 3. In the 2nd dash the pacer mare Meg, owned by Don McNeill and Charles McKay of Summerside, was the winner with Winnie's Last (Shea) 2. Time, 2:12 4/5, only two-fifths of a second off her record. The 3rd and 4th races were won by that good pacer Peter Clegg, owned by George Brookings, Kensington, and driven by Don McNeill. Resourceful, driven by Clayton MacLeod was 2-3 and Chocolate Dip (Sobey) 7-2. Time, 2:14 3/5, 2:14 2/5. The 4th and 7th races were won by that reliable pacer Jo-Jo Spencer, owned by Andrew Perry and driven by the veteran driver Tyndal Semple. Ann's Boy (Bowness) was 2-2.

the trotter Nell Kalmuck (Goguen) 2-4. Mary's Beauty (Sobey) 4-3. Time, 2:11 3/5, 2:10. The 5th and 8th races, equivalent to a Free For All, were won by that super pacer Iola Henley 2:07 2/5, with Hedge-wood Chief (Somers) 2-2, Shamrock Thoughts (Mount) 2-3, time, 2:10 1/5, 2:10 2/5. Iola Henley hasn't lost a heat this season that we can recollect of and she was almost unbeatable last year.

The pacer Ann's Boy 2:11 2/5 has been sold by Ensor Bowness of Summerside, to Joseph Moreau of Rimouski, Que., the same gentleman that purchased Peach Butter 2:08 from Harry Hirsch a couple of seasons ago, paying a very long price. While here he looked over several other horses. We understand Mr. Bowness made a nice profit on his purchase price. It will be remembered that Mr. Moreau bought the pacer Victorious Guy 2:02 from Harry Hirsch of Sydney a couple of months ago. Harry had purchased him at the Harrisburg sale. Since then Victorious Guy won in 2:04 3/5 at Richelieu Park, Montreal, which is the fastest mile paced there this season.

Despite a rainy morning and a track that looked uninviting to racing Jim Llewellyn and his helpers put things in shape for racing Tuesday night at the Charlottetown track, and those who there enjoyed the program immensely. They also saw a wonderful performance by the 3-year-old pacer Jerry's Night-mare, bred and owned by James O'Brien, Alberton, and driven by Earle Semple. He won both dashes of the three-year-old pacing stake, the first in 2:17 4/5 and the other in 2:13 2/5, which considering the conditions was fully equal to the time made by Royal Bank last year in his record-breaking mile at Truro—2:12 2/5. Due credit must be given to driver Cyril Smith up behind the pacer Bob Clegg, owned by Alyre Pineau, South Rustico, that was 2-2. The second race in the program furnished a surprise, at least for the writer, when the trotter Rajah Hanover outfooted six pacers and a trotter to win for owner Myron Bell and driver Ike Moreside, Mighty Deo (Lecher) 2. Time, 2:17. The 6th dash with the same field was won by Vernita Pearl (Lowery) owned by Annear & Lowery, Montague, Shinola (Sobey) 2. Time, 2:16 2/5. In the 3rd and 7th races Time Table 2:08, owned by P. T. Downey and driven by Pat McKenna, was 1-1, My Darling (MacGregor) 5-3, and the slow class pacer Whispur (C. Smith) 3-2. Whispur Hope put up a terrific battle in the final dash, leading until very close to the wire and must have paced a shade better than her record. Time, 2:14 2/5, 2:13 2/5. Josedale Clipper, owned by E. Johnston, Saint John, and driven by Walter Craig, won both the 4th and 8th races with Esso (O'Meara) 2-5, Gahagan (Shaw) 4-2, best time 2:13 3/5.

Battles right to the wire featured four of the eight dashes raced at Summerside Wednesday night. In the 1st and 5th races Buddy O'Connor, owned by L. Taylor and driven by L. O'Meara, was 1-1. Hottest opposition came from another slow class pacer, Sleepy Sam, owned and driven by Joe Wisnessey, and with these horses have enough whiz to go in 2:10 and will take quite low records later on. Time, 2:19 2/5, 2:16 4/5—a new record. The 2nd and 6th races had a field of eight trotters, but Anyway, owned by Roy Bevan and driven by James MacGregor, was tops with 1-1. The nifty little black mare Helen Harverson (Thompson) was 2-4, and Sunny B., owned and driven by Emmett Bernard, 5-2. Time, 2:21 4/5, 2:19. In the 3rd and 7th races the pacer Little Delbert (E. Semple) had too much luck for the veteran pacer Mannister Direct (Dewar) that was 2-4, Ruby Dale (Sobey) 7-2. Time, 2:15 4/5, 2:17 1/5. Little Delbert is another one of the good pacers owned by James O'Brien, Summerside. The 4th and 8th

traces were real battles between Money Royal (Llewellyn) and Chocolate Dip (Sobey). The former was 1-2 and the latter 2-1. Chocolate Dip forced Money Royal to take a new mark of 2:13 4/5 then went on to win the final in 2:15 3/5.

Rankin McLaine and Willard MacDonald returned this week from a combined business and pleasure trip which included a stop off to see the racing at Foxboro, Roosevelt and Saratoga. At the latter place they saw the Free For All Trot, purse \$6000, which was won by Sharp Note in 2:02. They also saw Joe O'Brien, who looks well and gave them a warm welcome. They had a talk with Claude, who arrived in time to drive Prince Jay in the Free For All Pace and finished fourth with him. On the way home they stopped off at Richelieu Park and witnessed the racing there. They noted that in one place the temperature was up to 117. All through their trip the heat was terrific and returning here found the cool days quite a relief. They were glad to hear over the radio on the way home Tuesday night that Doctor J. A. had won in 2:07 at Roosevelt with driver Del McTavish up.

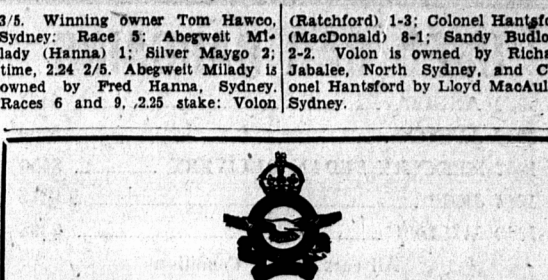

ally had practically cleaned out southern Saskatchewan's antelope herds. A close season was declared on antelope but this measure failed to halt the species' steady decline.

It looked as if the antelope were on the out when sportsmen, backed by the government and government officials, declared war on the coyotes and brush wolves. They were hunted by plane, car, dogs, traps and snares. Shooting from light planes was very effective and lying in wait along the wooded shore lines of large lakes in winter time with cars, the tires equipped with ice-grips, accounted for large numbers. Hunters would wait till the coyotes crossing the lakes were well out on the ice when powerful engines roared into life and the coyotes' chances of escaping were close to zero. Sometimes the predators were enticed out on the ice by the carcasses of dead horses and other farm animals that had died.

The game commissioner for Saskatchewan told me in Ottawa that the antelope came back like a storm and an open season was declared in 1952. Incidentally the coyote population in Saskatchewan has been reduced by close to 75 per cent.

Hunters in this province can help by reducing the crow, fox, skunk and racoon population. And remember your hunting dog running at large can do more harm than a man with a gun and also help keep cats in check that run wild in back woodlots and swamps—and don't forget those found nearer civilization. Complaints have reached game headquarters recently that some owners of bird dogs are training their animals at this early date on coveys of immature Huns and pheasants. Here is a tip boys—if you are caught at this practice before September 1st it's liable to be an expensive outing.

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
