### ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION

#### Father Allen Macdonald Remembered by His Congregation.

Previous to his departure for Europe Rev. Allan J. Macdonald, the esteemed pastor of Fort Augustus, was presented with a purse and the following address by his parishioners:

To Rev. A. J. McDonald, P. P., Fort Augustus.

REV. AND BELOVED PASTOR.—The announcement made this morning of your intended departure from amongst us for a trip abroad, has fallen upon us as a surprise, bearing with it mingled feelings of pleasure and regret.

We all feel that the duty of giving expression to those feelings in a full and adequate manner would require more time and organization than is now at our disposal, but as you leave us on the morrow we hold you responsible for the insufficiency of our material recognition of your worth, to which we all wish now to bear testimony, though in an impromptu and hurried manner.

Glancing backward over the last twenty three years of your pastorate at Fort Augustus, we see so many evidences of your ability in the administration of the affairs of the parish, that we find it impossible to even hint at them all, in the course of this short address; but it will be only necessary to single out and sample a few of the greater ones to tell you, that we know your worth. You came here to find a parish burdened with debt, and church and church property in an unfinished condition. You courageously undertook the device of ways and means to lift off that burden, and this device succeeded. Next you set to work to put in order the interior of the church, which undertaking was also brought to a successful issue. So that the decorated interior of the old Fort Augustus Church with its magnificent furnishings outvalued many of the foremost edifices of the Diocese.

All this work was under your guidance accomplished so smoothly that we really had to ask ourselves time and again how was it done.

All our pecuniary obligations were discharged and a substantial fund laid aside to the credit of the parish when the dreadful news of that September morning of three years ago, was heralded abroad that our dear old church was laid in ashes and the work of a quarter of a century was undone.

To say the least this was disheartening news for us. We all knew how discouraging this calamity must have been to you, Dear Father, and we proudly put it forward today and we seconded every move you made to replace the old church.

We knew this was our duty; but we did it willingly, because we knew you so well and felt that your genius could devise means and your vigorous energy could carry out the plans for the tremendous task before us.

All is now accomplished and we can proudly look upon St. Patrick's brick church as the architectural gem of the diocese of Charlottetown. What is better still is that in the short period of three years this structure, erected at a cost of \$14,000, is practically clear of debt. We fully admit that this great achievement is due in a very great measure to your skilful management and holy zeal.

Should not this siege of trials and labour for the good of Fort Augustus entitle you to a vacation; and therefore be the occasion of that pleasure, which is ours in wishing you God-speed, an enjoyable trip and a safe return. These traits of the zealous priest so manifested in the above recounted facts, and your many other deserving qualifications have endeared you to us, and justify the regrets that the announcement of your intended absence of some months make us feel to-day.

You will be privileged to visit the venerable shrines of Europe, and to offer up the adorable sacrifice in the sanctuaries of Rome. Think of us there, kind Father, and be assured that our prayers will go out for you each day, that you may be benefited in every particular and come back again to your old parishioners to live amongst us, and to administer in your own zealous way to our spiritual wants.

In saying "Good-Bye," we ask you to accept the accompanying gift as a feeble expression of our love and esteem for you.

### THE DEFEAT OF MARTIN.

The defeat of Joe Martin gives prominence to the inter-cine struggle that is going on in what was once the United Liberal party. After the victory of 1896, Mr. Martin was a candidate for the Interior Department. He had fought hard, and fully expected the portfolio. Clifford Sifton, however, took the field against him. As he was in the Manitoba Government, and had the power to alter the School Act at will, he held the key to the situation, Laurier had to take him in, otherwise the school law would not have been changed in the slightest degree. The victory of Sifton over Martin has developed into a feud. Martin is after Sifton and vice-versa. A large body of clean Liberals sympathize with Martin, and no end of them detest Sifton and his school, because of the corruption they have introduced. Out on the Pacific Coast the McInnes element is hotly antagonistic to the budding influences. Mr. McInnes, the younger, it will be remembered, protested publicly against the Toronto Globe's coal mine grab, which Sifton engineered for the organ on condition that the organ should puff him and help him with a "deal" when his turn came. Martin was also against the grab, and Governor McInnes did not favor it. When Martin was in the Turner Government he refused for a time to give up the coal lands, and the organ had much difficulty in getting them. Laurier would have liked it if Martin could have created a straight Liberal Government. But he was unable to do this. His failure gives great satisfaction to the Sifton faction. The Toronto Globe jeters at him now that he is defeated, and wants Governor McInnes, whose son stood out against the coal deal, executed at once, and without benefit of clergy. It is a nasty quarrel, and its main feature is the circumstance that the Siftonians, or new Liberals, want to destroy everybody.—Mail and Empire.
