LONDON (AP) — A headmaster at a school in England turned up at Sutton High School Friday to teach just one pupil.

All the other boys found a new school to attend, but not Graeme. Since the boys are entitled to a full term's notice—something that someone apparently tried to give his charge last year—Mr. MacNeill said the school board had no teacher qualified to teach all the boys' subjects—so the teaching will be shared.

Unless Graeme finds a new school, the situation will continue until Christmas. "If he wants to work hard," said the education officer, "he can benefit from the most intensive cramming any boy could have."

The boy's mother, Mrs. Margaret Young, said she was "certainly a shock when we learned about this. We tried hard to get him into another suitable school, but without success."

A 1,000-word statement handed to correspondents here was the first in which the government said it was taking direct responsibility for the Formosa-based U-2 flown by a Nationalist Chinese Air Force pilot.

Productivity Council Led By 5 Countries

OTTAWA (CP)—The National Productivity Council, in the spotlight currently because of the resignation of president Claude Jodoin of the Canadian Labor Congress, arrived late on the Canadian scene.

The 25-man group was authorized by Parliament Dec. 20, 1960. The act set up the council to provide expanding opportunities for increased employment and trade and rising national standards of living.

Some 30 other countries have productivity councils which link government, management, labor and other groups in various degrees of planning.

Britain, seeking to rehabilitate her waning economy, formed one in the late 1940s. Its missions visited North America during the past several years, when Canadian businessmen were more concerned with meeting orders than finding them.

Ironically, one of the major acts of the Canadian council in its brief life was sending a team back to Europe recently to scan the more sophisticated liaison existing there among government, management and labor.

In announcing his resignation from the Canadian council Wednesday, Mr. Jodoin said in effect that it was putting the cart before the horse by limiting its studies to products, rather than the more efficient use of men, machines and money to compete in a vastly more competitive world.

European councils, he said, operated on a much broader basis and "this is the position we support." Better productivity was creating more jobs rather than more jobs which was the real problem.

Regional council chairman H. George De Young, Mr. Jodoin was resigning just at a time when broad-based plans were to be unveiled at a Sept. 20 meeting in Halifax. Council members were unitedly agreed that "productivity alone is not the full answer to Canada's economic growth."

BY-LAW
TO INCLUDE AN AREA OF THE FORMER SCHOOL DISTRICT OF SPRING PARK WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF CHARLOTTETOWN

WHEREAS it is deemed to be of advantage to the Citizens of the City of Charlottetown as well as to the residents of the District of Spring Park to extend the limits of the said City to include the area hereinafter defined so that economy and efficiency of essential services, be now primarily school, sanitation and water supply, may be had by co-operation of operation, and extension.

AND WHEREAS the final and effective passing of this By-law is intended to be conditioned upon the approval as required by the Municipal Extension Act of the residents of the area intended to be included.

BE IT HEREBY ENACTED by the Common Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:

1. THAT from and after the passing of this By-law the corporate limits of the City of Charlottetown shall be enlarged and extended to include the area comprising that portion of the former school district of Spring Park which was not included within the limits of the Village of Spring Park as heretofore taken into the corporate limits of the City of Charlottetown, that said area is described as follows:
2. That upon the approval and final enactment of this by-law such area shall constitute an addition to the City of the said City.
3. That the said City will immediately make available or provide school accommodation for the area.
4. That the City will provide police and fire protection for the area.
5. That the City will provide street maintenance for the area.
6. That the City will proceed to design and install water service for the area to provide such service within five years from the final enactment of this by-law, and if necessary the City augmenting the funds of the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply.
7. That the City will provide sewerage service for the area at such time in its discretion as sewerage service shall appear practicable and necessary.
8. That the valuation of real property in the area assessed for the year 1957-1958 in the Spring Park school district as improved property shall remain unchanged for the years 1962 to 1968, inclusive, but the general tax rate of the City shall be applied to the said valuation. All other real estate in the area hereinafter and hereinafter assessed as improved property shall be assessed by the City at the assessed rating system of the City, as shall all real estate in the area after the year 1968.

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
