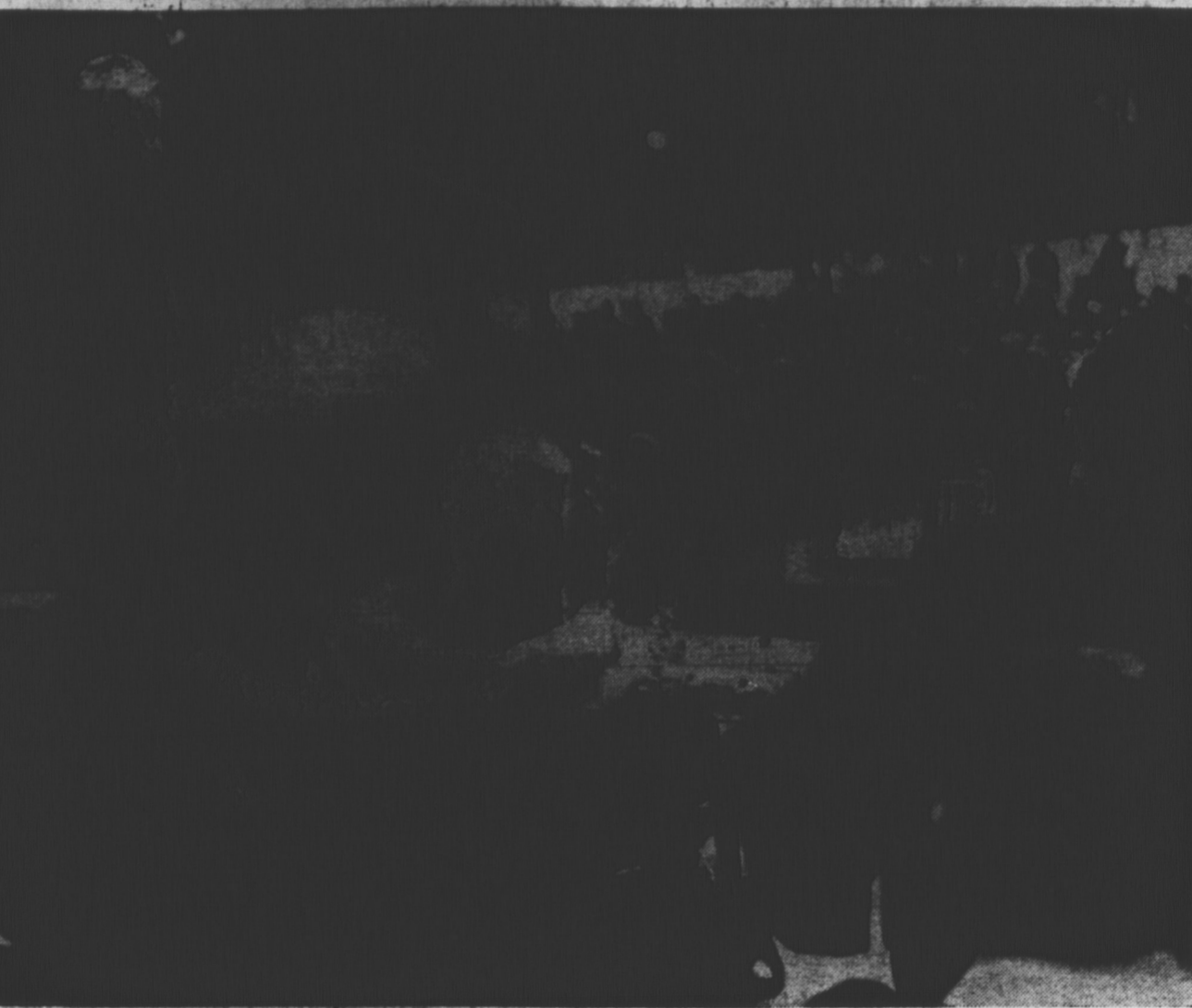

# Wilson Trip Nears Failure

SALISBURY (Reuters)—British Prime Minister Wilson's 11th-hour bid to prevent a final break between Britain and Rhodesia appears close to failure.
