

Beavers Score Third Win Over Islanders

Winnipeg Blue Bombers Win Way To Cup Finals

WINNIPEG, Nov. 13 (CP) — Winnipeg Blue Bombers today won the right to represent the West in the Grey Cup final at Toronto.

They rolled to an easy 29-6 victory over Edmonton Eskimos in the third game of their best-of-three final for the Western football championship. Edmonton won the first 17-18, at home; Bombers the second 22-12, here Saturday.

Winnipeg now meets the Eastern champion — either Hamilton Tiger-cats, Toronto Argonauts or Toronto Balmy Beach — Nov. 23.

More than 8,300 fans at Osborne Stadium watched Bombers take a commanding 14-0 lead in the first quarter.

Indian Jack Jacobs, import quarterback from last year's Green Bay Packers, called a near-perfect game for Blue Bombers. His passing, especially in the first quarter, was deadly. His kicking was just about perfect. And he plunged for two touchdowns.

Tom Casey and Tommy Ford scored the other Bomber majors. Joe (The Toe) Aguirre, the league-leading scorer, accounted for six points on three converts and three deadline kicks. Jacobs added three singles.

Edmonton's scoring — all in the third quarter — came on a touchdown plunge by relief quarterback Bill Stukus. Brother Annis, Esks' playing coach, converted.

Unlike Saturday's game — which was the roughest in the West this year — the play was clean, the players held a check throughout by sharp officiating.

After the game, Lindy Berry, Edmonton's quarterback from Texas Christian, said the Bomber line was what turned the tide. He had special praise for Buddy Tinsley, Bomber tackle.

"He's about the best," said Berry.

Members of the Abegweit rugby team and accompanying coaches and fans had the opportunity last Saturday night to witness two of the hockey clubs in the Cape Breton Senior Hockey League circuit in action. The boys took in the game between Glace Bay Miners and North Sydney Victors, following their McCurdy Cup rugby match against Glace Bay in the afternoon. The tickets had been reserved for the visiting party through the kindness of the Glace Bay rugbyists.

Seated in front row seats along the boards, one had plenty of chance to see the Cape Breton League squads at their best. To many it was a bit of a disappointment. Having heard much of the hard-hitting tactics of that particular league, maybe local fans were expecting to see too much in that respect; but they certainly didn't see anything that measured up to previous expectations.

It was a well-balanced, evenly contested game but by no means produced the speed, fire or hitting power that fans have been witnessing here in Big Four competition. Their play seemed to be concentrated solely on the puck at all times, with little evident concern as to whether or not an opposing forward went in over the blue line unhampered or not. Their playmaking was good at times, but lacked the speed and snap in the execution of their plays as compared with the M.S.H.L.

There wasn't an over abundance of back checking either, and most of the bodying seemed to be reserved for the corners and in and around goal, with little checking at centre ice areas by the forward sections, a feature that is almost a "must" in the M.S.H.L. today. There was one feature that definitely stood out over the Big Four circuit, however, and that was the refereeing.

The two referees in charge, Good and Elliott were firm and in complete control of the game at all times. There was no hesitation on their part in making a decision and their verdict was handed out to the offending player in a very direct manner that left no doubt in anybody's mind, including the player in question, as to what the offence was for or the penalty imposed.

They were sharp on the lines and were very distinct on indicating delaying whistles where the occasion arose and were right on top of the play at all times. Their faceoffs were quick and impartial, as seemed to be the case on all decisions, that kept the game open, clean and easy to watch at all times. It could be noted too, that they showed considerable judgment where it concerned an intentional offside over the blue line. If an attacking player was really trying to get back out over the opposing blue line as the puck was being sent back in, it was seldom called — unless another attacking player gained possession of the puck. It kept the game rolling with a minimum amount of blowing of whistles unnecessarily, which so often slows down a game.

But the thing that was most impressive about the refereeing was the respect that the individual player showed for the man with the whistle. There were no arguments between player and official over a decision. When the offending player was waved off, he went directly to the penalty box without a word or a backward look. There was no pushing or shoving around of officials or demonstrations of dissent against their decisions.

Talking to many of the boys from the Island who witnessed the game, they all to a man remarked on the "good refereeing" and admitted that it certainly made for a more interesting and better game to watch "even if it isn't as good hockey as the Big Four", one of the lads stated.

Tommy Brennan Paces Saint John To 5-3 Victory Over Ch'town

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Nov. 13 (CP) — Saint John Beavers strengthening their third place in the Maritime Senior Hockey League, tonight scored their third consecutive win over the loop-leading Charlottetown Islanders.

The 5-3 triumph, coupled with a Halifax St. Mary's win over the lowly Moncton Hawks tonight, reduced Charlottetown's lead over Halifax to seven points while Beavers stayed three points behind Halifax.

Saint John gained a 2-1 lead in the first period and had a 4-3 edge at the end of the second.

Centre Tommy Brennan paced the point-getters with three goals and an assist. Vic Jackson had one and two. The other Beaver tally was shot by Buck Whitlock. For Charlottetown, Cecil Dowling fired a brace, helped each time by brother Maurice. The first Island goal also resulted from a brother act, with Dan Horeck setting up Johnny.

The game was a rugged one. For the first time, fans here saw the new league system of a referee and two linesmen officiating instead of three referees. Charlottetown played a new left winger, Marcel Clements from Glace Bay Miners, who was exchanged for right winger Bob Gray.

Brennan opened the scoring after taking a pass from Jackson and pulling out goalie Hal Gordon. Johnny Horeck equalized by golfing and grabbed the puck in the Saint John zone. Three minutes before the period ended Brennan scored from a faceoff outside the Charlottetown blue line while Howard Beaudry sat in the penalty box. Dennis Brodeur made 11 stops during the session and Gordon six.

Brennan counted the third straight goal for the locals with a low, close shot early in the second period. Islanders retorted quickly when Maurice Dowling passed to his brother from the right boards and Cec made a 15-footer good.

While Clements and Phil Vitale served penalties and Beavers outnumbered the Islanders five to three, the homesters used five forwards effectively. Brennan passed to Jackson from behind the cage for the fourth Saint John marker. Then, with Beavers short a man, the Dowling brothers combined to end the period scoring. After skating behind the net Cec lifted a short backhander into the cage. Each goalie made six stops in the frame.

The orphan third period tally, by Whitlock, was assisted by Manny McIntyre shortly after the session opened.

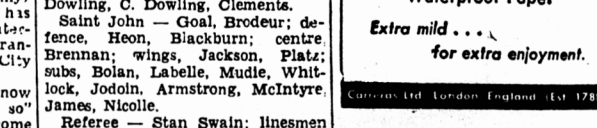
