COAL FAMINE.—There is said to be a coal famine at Calais, Me.

SCOTT ACT.—It is said that Moncton's net proceeds of Scott Act prosecutions last year were \$5,510.

A DISASTROUS EXPLOSION.—Frozen waterpipes caused a terrible explosion in Baltimore last week in the Home of the Friendless. Several people were killed.

THE LATEST TRUST.—The latest trust is one involving the trading sum of \$25,000,000, and will cover the big steam engine building companies of the United States, including the Corliss Steam Engine Co's plant, at Providence, one of the largest in the world.

A FLOT THAT FAILED.—One evening last week David O'Donnell, of Clairville, Ont., drew \$2,000 from a bank in Alliston and started home. While passing a shed two men rushed at him and struck him on the neck with a club. Two coat collars broke the blow, and Mr. O'Donnell showed fight, whereat the men ran.

MILTON SOCIAL.—Owing to the stormy weather on Jan. 24th the congregation of Milton have decided to have a repetition of their basket social at Winsloe Hall on Feb. 22nd. Proceeds in aid of the new church. Admission 10 cents. Ladies with baskets free. If the evening of the 22nd is stormy, the social will be held on the following evening. Doors open at 7 o'clock, concert at 7:30.

CHANGES BEING MADE.—The old vestry and parish board system of London, Eng., must go. The London County Council was a long step towards the abolition of the vestry. The County Council is now to be supplemented by the creation of twenty-nine municipalities each with its Mayor and Council, to look after purely local affairs, the County Council still to exercise its present functions in governing the whole aggregation of boroughs. Parliament will deal with the matter this session.

Church Finances.

ROME, Feb. 8.—The Pope and his financial advisers have decided to withdraw part of the Church funds invested abroad, on account of the low rates of interest obtained, and invest the money in Italy, where higher rates can be obtained.

The Holy See has \$16,000,000 deposited in English, French, and Belgian banks, from which a revenue of only \$400,000 per annum is obtained, the average rate of interest being 2 1/2 per cent.

Most of these funds will be invested in shares of the Banco di Rome, the Banco Commercial, and the Credito Italiano which are considered solid financial institutions. These banks will pay the Pope eight per cent dividends, or \$1,280,000 annually, instead of the \$400,000 now received.

A resident of a Minnesota town died recently of obesity. He weighed, at his death, 438 pounds.

It is said that the firm of Kynochs, of Birmingham, England, has begun making 10,000,000 cartridges under an American contract. The cartridges are to be supplied at the rate of 1,000,000 a week.

NEWFOUNDLAND IRON LANDS

Dominion Coal Company's Operations Enlarged.

Boston, Mass., Feb. 11.—The extensive iron areas of Newfoundland owned by the Nova Scotia Steel and Iron Company have practically passed into the control of Mr. Henry M. Whitney and his associates after several months of negotiations, thus further enlarging of the Dominion Coal Company's operations.

The deal was completed at a conference held in this city on Monday between President Whitney, B. F. Pearson, his Halifax representative; President J. F. Stairs, of the Nova Scotia Steel and Iron Company; and Graham Fraser, manager of the Ferrona Steel Works, of Nova Scotia.

At a final meeting, the papers in the big transaction were formally passed. It is understood that \$1,000,000 is the price to be paid for the property. A conservative estimate of the total deposit of iron in the land purchased is 50,000,000 tons.
