DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, May 5.

The Speaker took the chair at 3 o'clock. Mr. Girouard presented the report of the Rykert committee, and Mr. Blake asked when it would be discussed.

Sir John Macdonald said that an opportunity would be given for discussion at an early day.

Hon. Mr. Chapleau's bill respecting the establishing of a bureau for the collecting and publishing of labor statistics, was read a first time. The bill to amend the Seamen's Act was read a second time and passed. The resolution respecting the extension of the iron bounty from 1892 to 1897, was received and adopted, on a division of 69 to 45, and a bill founded thereon was introduced and read a first time. The Senate amendments to the bill respecting bills of exchange, cheques and promissory notes, were taken into consideration, and after recess were concurred in. The Banking Bill was again considered in committee. Further progress reported. The House adjourned at 12.15.

Great Labor Demonstration.

LONDON, May 5.

The Pall Mall Gazette commenting upon yesterday's labor demonstration says: "The marvellous spectacle will cause yesterday to rank among the most decisive days in the industrial history of England. The demonstration was a spontaneous genuine working class movement. No Continental country could produce so striking a sign of earnestness as was afforded by the enormous processions pouring in streams of human beings into the parks." The St. James Gazette admits that an enormous number of men took part in the demonstration, but minimizes its importance. It places the number of men in the park at 250,000, but claims a large portion of them were idlers.

The Times, the Standard, and the press of all shades of opinion agree that the demonstration was of an impressive and significant character. In re application of Daniel O'Brien for certiorari, argued Hilary Term last. Mr. Justice Hensley now delivers judgment, dismissing the motion to quash the conviction without costs to either party.

Michael McGaughey, appellant, vs. Daniel W. Headerson, respondent. Default made by appellant. Appeal dismissed.
