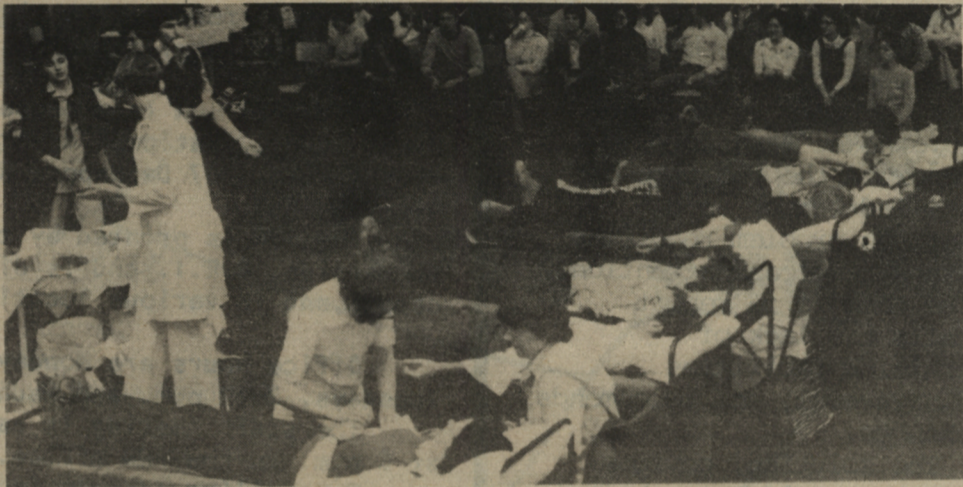

The conscientious, hard-working, usually good natured Barn Custodian, Clyde Bell, is very disturbed at the litter which has been surrounding his castle. At the Barn

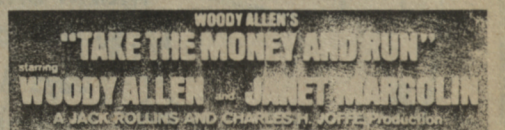
MOVIE crime lives!
