Lt.-Col. Herbert Arthur McKibbin, CD, RCAC, (right), 42, of Port Arthur, Ont., will be appointed Deputy Military Adviser in Laos.

NEW VETERINARIAN AT O'LEARY
Dr. W. Freeburn has recently set up veterinary practice in O'Leary restoring the service of a resident veterinarian which was temporarily interrupted last fall when he returned to Ontario Veterinary College. Dr. Freeburn's home is in Young's Point about fifteen miles north of Peterboro, Ontario. He received the degree Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) from Western University in 1952 and received the degree Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (D.V.M.) from the University of Toronto and Veterinary Surgeon (V.S.) from Ontario Veterinary College this spring. During the summer of 1954, Dr. Freeburn was engaged in veterinary work in New Brunswick and last summer worked with Dr. T.R. Furness in the Kensington area until the middle of July. At that time he moved to O'Leary where he serviced the area left by Dr. M. H. Clark who moved to Kensington. Since September the O'Leary

area has been serviced by Dr. Furness and Dr. Clark who have been extending service from Kensington with the charge to the farmer being unchanged. Dr. Freeburn has not yet completed housing arrangements in O'Leary and the general public is advised to contact him through the telephone operator. **PRE-CENSUS QUESTIONNAIRE**
All farm operators have received a questionnaire from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics which has to do with the forthcoming census. The farmer is asked to carefully fill out this questionnaire and when the Census Enumerator calls at your farm his or her time as well as your own will be greatly facilitated. The coming census is a very important undertaking as it was felt with the changing of farm practices and the increase in population that a ten year period between the taking of the census was too long—hence the decision to conduct a census this year. The information you give the Census Enumerator is strictly confidential and is used only in the preparation of statistical tables. The Dominion Bureau of Statistics is not allowed by law to disclose information about individual farms to any government department or individual. The wholehearted cooperation of our farm operators is requested in the taking of the census this year. **PASTURE UTILIZATION BY LIVESTOCK**
Farm animals on pasture do not all behave alike. Sheep relish grass and graze very closely the most tender shoots while beef cattle will consume the coarser grasses to better advantage. Heavy milk producers require abundant nutritious storage, while the young stock can be maintained on somewhat coarser herbage. Consequently, different methods of utilization are necessary. **DAIRY CATTLE**
One of the fundamentals of dairying is liberal feeding. Dairy cows will decline in milk production and lose weight when fed a ration that is sufficient or unbalanced. Growing stock should receive plenty of feed in order that they may develop normally. **Nutritional Requirements:** A good milch cow requires a large amount of feed to keep up her production. Cows weighing 1,000 pounds require about 15 pounds of digestible nutrients per day to maintain their weight and produce one pound of butterfat. In order to get these nutrients they must consume from 23 to 24 lbs. of the dry matter of a balanced ration. Assuming the dry matter in grass to be around 94 per cent, these cows will have to consume 120 pounds of green herbage daily. If optimum milk production is to be obtained, abundant good quality pasture must be provided. A pasture composed of grasses, clover, and alfalfa, is considered one of the best. Its production is abundant, and although alfalfa is not the most palatable herbage, its addition to the mixture will generally increase the protein content and provide more green growth in dry periods. Pasture either permanent or in a crop rotation, will seldom furnish succulent herbage all summer. In Eastern Canada, pastures are at their peak during late May, June, and the early part of July.
