The institutes then separated for their business meetings with Mrs. Oliver Bernard presiding for New London. Minutes were

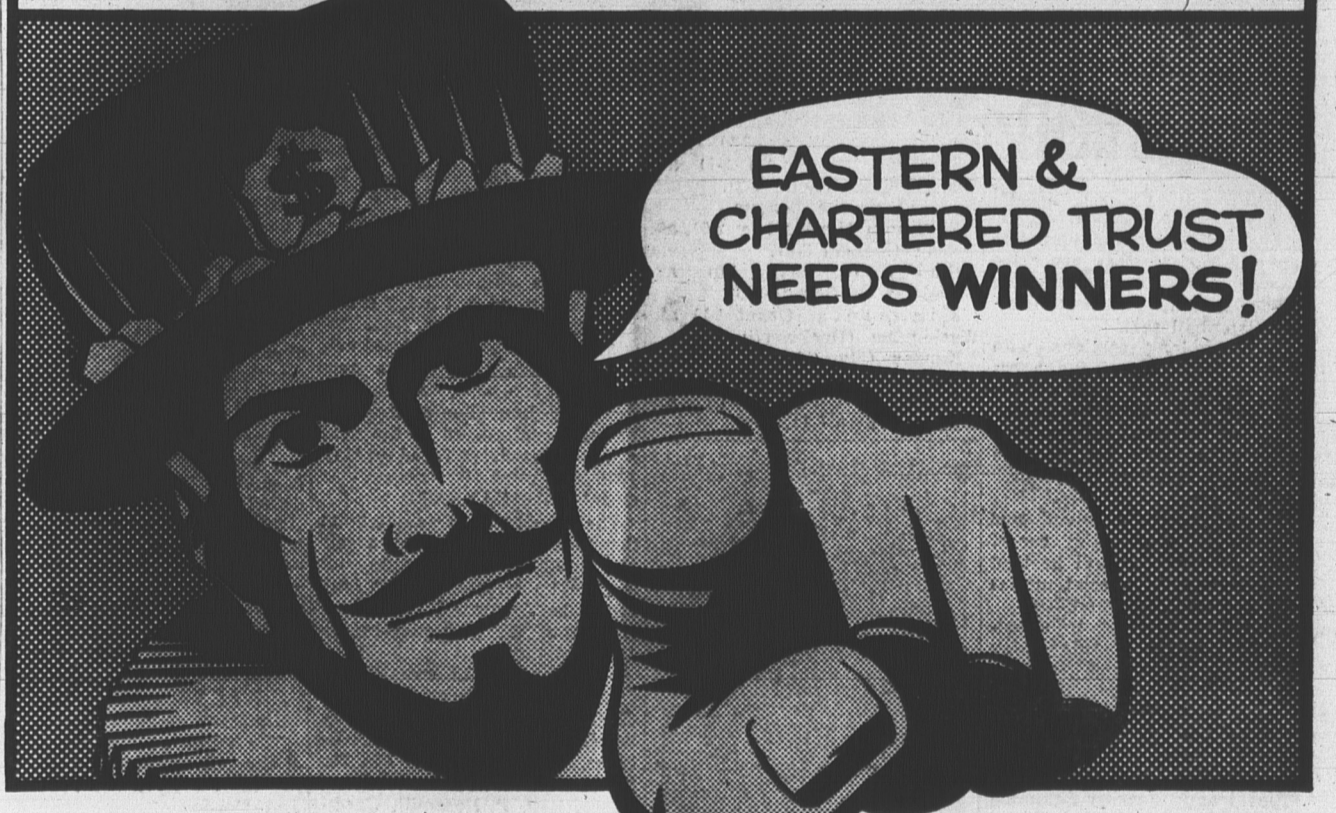
