## Employment Outlook Bleak At Georgetown

George W. Cheverie, manager of the Charlottetown Manpower Centre said yesterday that his staff had already been in touch with the major companies in the Georgetown area to determine their winter employment schedule, when he was questioned on the plans of the Manpower Department for the personnel affected by the developments in the businesses in Georgetown.

Most of the other large employers in the area operate seasonal businesses and consequently will not have a need for additional staff — at least not in any great numbers.

One of the fish-processing plants in Souris is expected to be able to absorb a few skilled lineworkers. These will probably be drawn from amongst those

workers who have been engaged at Georgetown, but who live in the areas north of the town towards Souris.

Mr. Cheverie pointed out that the Provincial Vocational authorities are now advertising a jointly sponsored course designed to bring students up to required educational levels for further Vocational Training.

The immediate release of workers in the Georgetown area is expected to stimulate interest in these courses. Courses are scheduled to begin in January 1967, and applications close on December 16, 1966. Any persons interested in this training are urged to apply to the Canada Manpower Centres before that date.

## 3 Alberton South Men Get Two Years In Dorchester

ALBERTON — Possession of stolen goods from Nicholson's Drug Store, in Alberton, sent three men from Alberton South to Dorchester Penitentiary for two years. They appeared yesterday morning in Prince County Magistrate's Court.

The three, James Alfred Garth Powers, Clarence Edward William Powers, and Terence Michael Collins, were all sentenced by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald, who said he had no alternative considering their previous records.

James Alfred Garth Powers was also sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary for a second charge of possession of a coil of rope stolen from Alberton Fisheries, the sentence to run concurrently with the first.

Nicholson's Drug Store was broken into on the night of Nov. 3.

Five Kensington youths and one from Spring Valley were each fined \$25 and costs or 15 days for littering the highway with straw in Kensington on Hallowe'en night. The youths were Louis Stewart, Gerald Mann, Roland MacArthur, Robert Dunphy and Garry Dunphy, all of Kensington, and Floyd Bryanton, Spring Valley.

Wayne Bernard, French River, was fined \$10 and costs on each of two charges, failing to stop at a stop sign and driving without due care and attention. Mrs. Mabel Cahill, Summerside, was fined \$10 and costs for driving without a valid license.

## Will Be Guest Speaker Here New Year's Day

Unqualified support to the theory or "responsible faith healing" was given recently by the minister emeritus of New York's Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, and one of the outstanding Protestant churchmen of his time, Rev. Dr. John Sutherland Bonnell.

Dr. Bonnell, a former Islander and a frequent visitor, will be heard in Charlottetown as the guest speaker at the service to be conducted in Confederation Centre on New Year's Day. It will signal the start of this city's participation in the 1967 Centennial of Canada.

In his recent speech on the subject in New York, Dr. Bonnell stated "It is quite evident that faith, legitimately exercised, can produce far-reaching effects in healing human ailments."

He said his belief was based on the "command" of Jesus Christ to his disciples to teach and heal and claimed the church had "abdicated" the responsibility entrusted to it with the result there was much present confusion over the validity of spiritual healing.

The minister maintained instances of "notable" healing can be established in only one way and that is by submitting them to medical scientists. This is the procedure followed invariably at the Roman Catholic shrine at Lourdes.

## Laboratory Technologists Holds Annual Banquet

Dr. Lea Steven, Assistant Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, Dalhousie University addressed the Provincial Society of Laboratory Technologists at their annual banquet. The meeting and banquet held on December 2nd at the Confederation Centre, was chaired by the president of the Society Mr. William MacDonald.

**SIGNIFICANT ROLE**  
Dr. Steven outlined the significant role the laboratory plays in the diagnosis and treatment of patients. He reviewed in detail the clinical history of patients suffering from various heart diseases. It was stressed that any one discipline by itself could not arrive at an accurate diagnosis or treatment plan. The necessity of cooperation among all members of the medical team was given emphatic attention. The speaker was thanked by Maureen Fisher.

The annual business meeting was held prior to the banquet. The president in his annual report reviewed the past year's activities. Six scientific sessions, and a delegation to a workshop in St. John, N.B. highlighted the year's program.

Edward Gillis B.Sc., A.R.T., Provincial Director on the Medical Executive gave a pertinent report on activities at the national level.

## MacLean To Stay On Party Executive

OTTAWA — Queen's MP Hon. Angus MacLean said here that he will probably continue on as a representative of the Conservative caucus on the Progressive Conservative National Executive.

He made the statement on his return from a weekend in Toronto where he attended the annual meeting of the Canadian Branch of the Royal Air Force Escaping Society.

Last week Mr. MacLean and Melvin McQuaid, MP for Kings, were elected by the party caucus to the executive although it was made clear that Mr. MacLean and Heath Macquarrie, the former Queen's MP, had agreed to retire to make way for Mr. McQuaid and the Rev. David MacDonnell, MP for Prince.

Mr. MacLean was not present at the meeting as he was in Western Canada addressing the organizing meeting of two Saskatchewan ridings.

Stores in Summerside will be closed Dec. 26 and 27, and open Saturday, Dec. 31, until five o'clock. Stores will be closed on Jan. 2.

The Christmas lights should be up on Water Street this evening, a Retail Merchants' Committee member said. The complete Christmas lighting in attractive colors will be completed sometime Wednesday, if it is anticipated.

## Alberton Man Suffers Burns

ALBERTON — A flash fire in a large storage building at Alberton, South, resulted in Cecil Hutt, an Alberton South fisherman, being taken to the Western Hospital yesterday morning with severe burns to his face and hands.

The fire was brought under control by the Alberton Fire Department after considerable damage to the two-storey building which contained two seine nets, a large quantity of rope and other fishing equipment valued at approximately \$15,000.

Most of the equipment was salvaged undamaged.

The fire was believed to have started when net dipping fluid caught fire and Mr. Hutt's injuries were received when he carried the container of burning fluid outside the building which is owned by his father, E. I. Fred Hutt. The fishing materials are owned by Cecil and Leonard Hutt.
