Local and Other Items.

HAVE ALL RESIGNED.—The police force of Amherst have all resigned their positions. New men will be appointed.

ANTICOSTI ISLAND.—It is understood that Mr. Senior has offered the Quebec Government \$100,000 for all the beach lots and other shore rights of Anticosti.

WANT A MARKET BUILDING.—An agitation is going on in Halifax for a market building. Heretofore all the buying and selling has been going on at the street corners.

ADVANCE IN PRICES.—Flour went up ten cents a barrel yesterday and oats advanced four cents a bushel. The definite rumors of war is the cause.—St. John Gazette.

IT PAYS TO ADVERTISE.—An Oklahoma girl advertised for a husband and got him. The advertisement and wedding outfit cost \$11 and within a year he died and left her \$5,000 life insurance.

A NICE BRICK.—The Modstock gold mine at Forest Hill, Guysboro county, recently produced a nice brick of gold of 190 ounces, which gave a good profit over production.—Halifax Herald.

THE CAUSE OF DEATH.—Within two weeks twenty-five children, pupils in the public school at Scranston, have died of what was believed to be diphtheria. Sewer gas from the sewer pipe accumulated at night, and was turned into the class rooms through the cold air pipe during the day.

HOPE ABANDONED.—Captain William Bartlett, brother of the commander of Lieut. Peary's steamer Windward, has abandoned hope of the vessel returning this autumn. He says they never saw the ice form so rapidly in the northern waters. He has just returned himself from Labrador.

WHERE THEY'RE SUPPLIED.—The London police have discovered in Red Lion square an establishment which supplies professional beggars with the paraphernalia used by them to impress the urgency of their distress upon the public. A large assortment of wooden legs and arms, asthmatic hand organs and fiddles, wigs and beards, ragged suits and dresses were found.

FRUIT IN AUSTRALIA.—There is no portion of the globe in which fruit is more abundant or more extensively used than in Australia. The supply is so ample that during certain seasons of the year pineapples bring one and a half cents a piece, oranges one cent a dozen. Even the ignorant people believe that fruit eaten freely is an aid to health, and as a result the death rate is low, not only among the natives, but in the foreign population as well.

A VALUABLE COW.—Here is a cow that is worth owning. Her owner boards at the Columbia hotel paying \$3.00 a week or \$12.00 a month for meals. He milks his cow, getting four gallons of milk a day, which he sells at 20 cents a gallon. This brings him \$24.00 a month. After paying \$1.50 for pasture he has his living and \$10.50 in cold cash. This man works ten hours a day. If he lives long enough and the cow keeps up her record as a milker, this man will be rolling in wealth some day.—Columbia (Mo.) Statesman.

HORSES FOR THE ARMY.—It is reported that buyers for the British army are paying good prices now for suitable horses. South Africa, among other places, has been visited by them, and nearly 1,000 horses have been secured, as high as \$200 being paid for some. When some army officers were here a few years ago to purchase, they were unable to get many of the right sort, and sellers complained that the prices offered were too low. The Farmer's Advocate suggests that, now that better prices are being given, our breeders should keep this in view and try to get what they can out of it.

A TALE OF WOE.—According to a late despatch Charles Farnsworth, of Massachusetts, has returned from Kotzebue Sound, where he went in April on the schooner Marion from San Francisco. He says her voyage north with 57 men on board was something terrible. Farnsworth's party became disgusted with prospecting late in August, and returned to Kotzebue, where they found 800 hungry and for the most part penniless prospectors living in tents. Farnsworth says not one in ten had money to pay his return passage, and not one in fifty had supplies for the winter. He believes that before this time starvation exists among these arcticans. Farnsworth thinks the Red Cross society of the government should send a steamer to Kotzebue and rescue these unfortunates.

Train leaves Ch'town at 6.30 a.m., making 7 hours quicker time to Montreal and 12 hours to Toronto than via any other line.

VICTORIA AND THE CHIEF.

A recent arrival at Ottawa, from the Kitimaat district, B. C., tells a story concerning Queen Victoria and a chief of the Kitimaats which is related in the New York Times. Chief Shakes, who has a very good house at Lowe Inlet, also owns the fishing privilege below the falls on a stream close by. The chief sold 60,000 fish for which the manager of a cannery paid him \$5,000. In the exuberance of his spirits and loyalty the chief conceived the idea of sending \$100 as a present to Queen Victoria, and handed the sum to Indian Agent Todd, to be forwarded, which was accordingly done. In due time the Queen caused to be sent to Chief Shakes a letter showing her appreciation of his loyalty, and she asked him to accept a special engraving of herself, set in a handsome frame, together with two plaids of sheep's wool, just the kind to delight any native chief.

Shakes called his people together on the day of presentation, and the Indian agent read and interpreted the Queen's letter. The venerable chief, in responding, said that it made his heart glad to know that a humble being residing so far away from his good mother had not been forgotten by her, adding that, although he could never expect to see her on earth, he would try and lead such a life that would enable him to meet her in heaven. And then, overcome with emotion, the chief burst into tears.
