LETTER FROM REV.

T. F. FULLERTON.

On the March to Pretoria—Boers Running.

KROONSTADT, May 13, 1900.

MY DEAR MR. JAMES,—I seize the opportunity of dropping you a few words, as I do not know when a chance may occur again.

Kitchener, in a way, has successfully trapped us, as we left Bloemfontein for a three days' march only, and here we are half way to Pretoria after marching some hundreds of miles and fighting five general engagements.

We have had some fatalities; but it is astonishing that we have not had more. Only those who have been in the conflict can possibly conceive how thickly shells and bullets can play around and so many escape wounds or death.

The result of the fighting you know;—the Boers will not stand.

I am the only Chaplain with the regiment now, Father O'Leary being in Cape Town and Rev. Mr. Almoud in Bloemfontein. We all expect to return soon, owing to the fact that the enemy is simply fleeing before our advance.

I believe I am doing good here, and would feel that I was acting the part of a coward were I to leave now when I am alone as Chaplain and the men do not know when they rise in the morning whether they will see the sun set.

For the past thirteen days it has been tramp, tramp, and I think I have surprised everybody by my endurance.

McDonald and I have footed it along suffering very much from dysentery, but in this we are like a great many more. It will, I think, soon have an end. I should say the end of the month will probably see the end of the war.

Ernest Lord is in Bloemfontein, better but weak. Hedley McKinnon was left at Winburg suffering from rheumatism—but not very acutely.

I must close as the convoy is starting. Give my regards to all my friends in Charlottetown—to the session and congregation.

LA GRANDE DUCHESSE.—The steamer La Grande Duchesse leaves Boston for Charlottetown on Saturday next, her first trip here this season. She will arrive in Charlottetown about midnight on Monday and will leave on return on Wednesday about ten o'clock. An important change has been made in the dining room on La Grande Duchesse. Formerly the rate for meals was 75 cents for dinner and 50 cents for breakfast and supper. Now meals are served on the European plan—a passenger pays for what he uses. He who requires only ten cents worth gets it; and he who wishes to spend as much as 50 or 75 cents has the opportunity of making a selection to suit his taste and his appetite.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.

At Saturday's meeting of the Conference at Moncton the report on church property was submitted. The report on temperance was also submitted. The conference favored the total prohibition of the importation, sale and manufacture of intoxicating liquor as the only satisfactory solution of the liquor question. It was thought fit for New Brunswick to pass a prohibitory law. In further discussion it was stated by the secretary that no reply had ever been received from Premier Laurier with reference to the resolutions passed by the conference last year. The report was referred back to the committee.

Among the sustentation fund grants voted was \$215 for the Charlottetown district as follows: Winsloe, \$40; Vernon River, \$47; Montague, \$46; Souris, \$42; Mount Stewart, \$40. For Summerside \$124 were granted, as follows: Granville, \$40; Bideford, \$50; West Cape, \$34. Conference adjourned till Monday.


FOREIGNERS IN CHINA.

Statistics concerning foreigners in China are contained in a report on trade relations between China and the United States received at the State Department from Consul Fowler at Chefoo, dated May 8. The nationality for the foreign element for 1899 is stated as follows:


- American—Residents, 2,335, increase over 1898 of 279; firms, 70, increase of 27.
 - British—Residents, 5,562, increase of 414; firms, 401, increase of 3.
 - German—Residents, 1,134, increase of 91; firms, 115, increase of 8.
 - French—Residents, 1,183, increase of 263; firms, 76, increase of 39.
 - Dutch—Residents, 109, increase of 19; firms, 9, increase of 1.
 - Danish—Residents, 128, increase of 11; firms, 4, increase of 1.
 - Spanish—Residents, 448, increase of 53; firms, 9, increase of 5.
 - Swedish and Norwegian—Residents, 244, increase of 44; firms, 2, increase of 2.
 - Russian—Residents, 1,621, increase of 1,458; firms, 19, increase of 3.
 - Austrian—Residents, 90, decrease of 2; firms, 5, no change.
 - Belgian—Residents, 234, increase of 5; firms, 9, no change.
 - Italian—Residents, 124, decrease of 17; firms, 9, no change.
 - Japanese—Residents, 2,440, increase of 746; firms, 195, increase of 81.
 - Portuguese—Residents, 1,423, increase of 339; firms, 10, decrease of 2; no firms.
 - Korean—Residents, 42, increase of 2; no firms.
 - Non-treaty powers—Residents, 29, increase of 2, no firms.
- The total number of residents, 17,193, shows an increase of 3,772 over 1898. The total number of firms, 933, shows an increase of 160 over 1898.
