sent Kings in the last parliament. "There is not a more promising young Member of Parliament anywhere in Canada than John," the Prime Minister said emphatically, as he opened a 30-minute speech in Confederation Centre on his overnight visit to this province.

The young Souris man was praised most warmly at the Murray River meeting. Alex Matheson, Charlottetown said "he will be Kings first federal cabinet minister. He is the finest member you have had since Confederation."

Acting Liberal Leader M.L. Bonnell, MD said "we must have him back in the Liberal House of Commons. He is an excellent member."

Mr. McIlraith, public works minister in the Pearson administration, agreed with the warm praise for Mr. Mullally and added "John is the most persistent type of MP when he comes seeking public works for this constituency of Kings."

The Ottawa man said the Liberal government needs a majority so it can proceed with confidence on the constructive program it has prepared for the country. "No government can function at the peak of its efficiency if it does not know at what minute of any day it may be thrown out of office, and that has been the situation in the last two and one half years," he said, "with the combined opposition having control of the commons."

"How can the government negotiate problems with other nations — United States for example — if it is never sure whether it will be able to speak for Canada by the time the day is out?"

Remarking on "the incredible beauty of the province" — he had viewed much of it from a low flying helicopter — Mr. McIlraith said that thousands of Canadians from other provinces are just waiting for the completion of the causeway to visit Prince Edward Island.

TREMENDOUS BOON

"It will be a tremendous boon for the province, it will bring results even beyond the fondest dreams of those who were the most prominent in advocating it through the years," he said with enthusiasm.

The works minister added that arranging the final papers on the causeway for the Prime Minister's press conference on the causeway announcement was his very first act of works minister. He said that the tenders for the first part of the causeway construction — the approach road from the New Brunswick side across Jourmain Island — will be opened on Oct. 26.

The minister was introduced by Mr. Mullally and thanked by W.A. Acorn, Souris.

LaMarsh Denies Pension Remark

SUMMERSIDE — Federal Health and Welfare Minister Judy LaMarsh, last night at a "ladies night" here, denied categorically a statement attributed to her in Preston, Ont. recently concerning the Canada Pension Plan.

She was reported to have said that "a pensioner in Prince Edward Island doesn't need actual dollars anything like a pensioner in Toronto."

"I was astonished when I read this," she said. "The report is completely erroneous... it's preposterous."

Commenting further on these alleged statements that the plan was based on a means test, she said that the contributions in every part of Canada as well as the pension, would be the same. "There are no second class citizens in this country," she said.

She also stated that in her addresses on the pension plan she had mentioned the provinces "but I have never singled P.E.I. This just floored me."

She was also emphatic that the pension will not be paid on a means test basis. "This is the largest non-means pension in the world," she said. "We are not the richest country but we pay more to the aged than any country in the world."

"We have had enough of this means test," she declared, "and enough election gimmicks."

Miss LaMarsh then proceeded to take issue with some of the opposition's campaign promises. "The first broadside she fired was on Opposition Leader

John Diefenbaker's denial that he had ever stated that, if elected, his government would start, at age 65, a pension of \$100.

"He now claims," she said, "that he had stated his government would provide this pension to those 70 years of age and over out of the Canada Pension Plan."

She stated that this couldn't be done and that the fund would be sharply reduced if this came to pass. "It would also mean that those already on pension would be paid from this fund," she said.

Mr. Robichaud struck out at Conservative leader John Diefenbaker and Mr. Diefenbaker's remarks about separatists in Quebec. "If there is a separatist leader in Canada today, it is John Diefenbaker," said Mr. Robichaud.

Mr. Robichaud compared the Diefenbaker years to those of the Depression under the Conservative government of Prime Minister R. B. Bennett.

He reviewed the work of the government of John Diefenbaker from 1958 to 1963 and its shortcomings and contrasted these with the work done and programs initiated by the Liberals since 1963.

Find Body In Woods

George Edward Duggan, 77, a resident of Kensington, was found dead in a wooded area near the Kensington Regional High School shortly after 9 a.m. yesterday.

The body was discovered by pupils of the Kensington High School who were playing in the area, about one quarter mile from the Town of Kensington, reported RCMP last night.

The incident was investigated by Cpl. Victor Cameron, Cst. L. Robbins of the RCMP and Cst. Vernon Reeves of the Kensington Town Police.

Dr. L.E. Prowse, provincial coroner, last night said there will be no inquest.

The late Mr. Duggan, a widower, is survived by two sons. Funeral services will be held 1:30 Friday afternoon from the United Church in Kensington.

Both vehicles were heavily damaged at the front end. The Younker vehicle came to rest after crashing into the fence surrounding the home of city Fire Chief H.H. Jewell.

Miss Younker's injuries were treated at the scene by Dr. Alan MacMillan and she was taken to the city hospital by MacLean's ambulance.

When it was feared her injuries might be serious an aircraft from search and rescue in Halifax was called.

The Air-Sea Rescue Centre in Halifax said an RCAF Albatross from Greenwood, N.S., flew the girl to the Navy air station at Shearwater near Dartmouth, from Charlottetown.

She was transferred by ambulance to the Victoria General Hospital in Halifax.

Details as to the extent of her injuries were not immediately available.

Miss Younker was first taken to the Charlottetown Hospital following the accident which occurred at the Pownal-Dorchester street intersection about 9 a.m. yesterday.

The other vehicle involved was a Seaman's Beverage Company truck driven by Donald Reeves of Charlottetown.

PCs Mean Unity, Flemming Says

The Hon. Hugh John Flemming, addressed about 150 voters of Kings last night at Georgetown.

He congratulated them on the election of Melvin J. MacQuaid as candidate, saying that Mr. MacQuaid was good enough for the Liberals to maintain on the Atlantic Development Board and regardless of what they say, "the ADB, ARDA, APEC, all were creations of the Progressive Conservatives under John G. Diefenbaker. These, the Dief dollar, sales of wheat to China, all have been continued by them although they objected to them previously to coming to power."

"They want a majority government," he said. "So be sure to ask their candidates why? They thought they caught the PC's divided and unprepared for an election."

"Mr. Pearson was fooled, he was not convincing when making the announcement. John Diefenbaker will form the next government as Canadians are turning from this government."

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CAUSEWAY EXAMPLE

"The Pearson government also have talked disunity ever since coming to power," he said. "We never heard of such disunity before. Mr. Diefenbaker has always talked of one Canada. This is what we want. We shall maintain our policies. We stand for unity of the nation, progress, honesty in government, a fair deal for older citizens."

The Canada Pension Plan has neglected the citizens form 55 years of age to 65. This is our reason for the \$100 old age pension.

Speaking of potatoes he said "we will maintain the subsidy, the starch program and treat eastern farmers as western wheat growers."

Mr. MacQuaid thanked the audience for their attendance. He spoke of the redistribution bill, the old age pension, the Canada pension plan. He criticized the statement by Miss LaMarsh saying M. was rank discrimination to P.E.I.

"This has been the policy of the Liberal administrations" he said. "We in the Atlantic Provinces were not discriminated against when John Diefenbaker was in power, we must return to this government."

In conclusion he said "I have made no promises except to say I stand behind the party platform and will do my best for Kings."

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RCMP Guide Road Fatality Investigation

SUMMERSIDE — Investigation into the motor vehicle fatality on Stirling Kilbride early last Friday evening on the West-ern Highway, a short distance west of Miscouche is being conducted by the local RCMP detachment.

An RCMP spokesman said last evening that a person or persons in a black automobile, who are believed to have been witnesses to the accident, are being sought. They are asked to contact the local detachment.

Mr. Kilbride was fatally injured when a three-ton gravel truck he was driving went out of control and overturned, coming to rest right side up on the opposite side of the highway. The accident occurred at approximately 5:40 in the evening.

In 1967, he was transferred to RCAF Station Greenwood where he served as crew captain on Neptune and Argus aircraft, and became Officer Commanding of the Argus Conversion Unit, a position he held until being transferred to MACOEQ Halifax as Senior Personnel Staff Officer in 1968.


