

Conway Youths Have Legs Broken

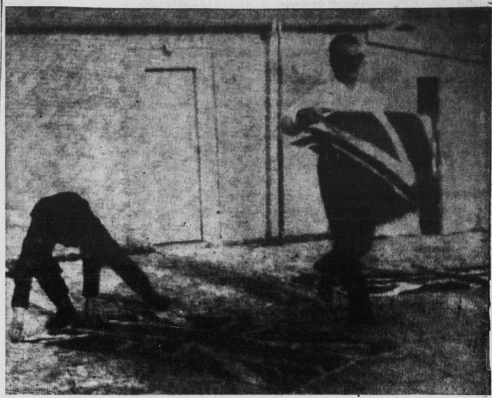
The Summerside detachment of the RCMP investigated an accident at approximately 9:45 Christmas night on the Ellerslie Road in which two Conway youths suffered broken legs.

The youths, Clinton Morrison, Jr. and Kenneth Palmer, passengers in a 1953 model car driven by William Cook when a 1959 European model car driven by Gordon MacDougall of Tyne Valley and travelling in the same direction as the Cook car, struck them. The driver was momentarily blinded by the headlights of an oncoming vehicle.

When Mr. MacDougall did see the two youths standing at the rear of the parked vehicle he was unable to avoid the collision due to the road conditions. As a result they were crushed between the bumpers of the two vehicles.

The victims were treated at the scene by Dr. G. E. Robinson of Tyne Valley and then transferred to the Prince County Hospital by Compton's ambulance where they were reported resting comfortably.

Approximately \$150 damage was sustained by the MacDougall vehicle while the damage to the Cook car was estimated to be \$75.

He said preliminary indications of capital spending plans for 1964 suggest continuation of this year's rate of advance in capital investment by business.

The continuing growth of incomes should provide firm underpinning to the consumer market generally.

"All in all, demand prospects appear good in both home and foreign markets. Strong overall demand means increased production, more jobs and higher incomes."

COULD BE SHORT-LIVED

But Mr. Sharp said these conditions could be short-lived unless they are accompanied by the kind of initiatives which will ensure a continued strengthening in our position in both home and foreign markets.

The promising export outlook "might seem to bring us within sight of balancing our external accounts for the first time in a decade."

But mounting prosperity in Canada "can all too readily bring a resurgence of imports and strain in our balance of payments."

Foreign earnings from Canada's traditional export lines—foods and industrial raw materials—"are not likely to be adequate, in the longer run, to meet the ever-mounting foreign exchange requirements of a prosperous Canada."

"No lasting solution to our balance - of - payments and related problems is likely to be achieved except through the further substantial broadening and filling out of Canada's industrial structure on a competitive basis."

Looking back over 1963, Mr. Sharp said total industrial production rose five per cent, bringing the cumulative advance in the last three years to 16 per cent.

Total employment had averaged more than two per cent higher than in 1962 while unemployment was four per cent lower.

Industrial growth had been spearheaded in large part by a strong advance in secondary manufacturing. Motor vehicle production exceeded 600,000 units after having topped the 500,000-unit mark in 1962 for the first time.

Steel ingot production was 14 per cent higher and there had been substantial gains in production of farm implements, textiles, clothing, electrical apparatus and a number of chemicals. There were notable increases in iron ore, aluminum, lumber, kraft pulp and plywood.

Yesterday Said Coldest Day Of Winter So Far In S' side

SUMMERSIDE — Prince of Wales residents suffered through the coldest day of the winter yesterday. The RCMP meteorological section reported the minimum temperature during the day was seven degrees above zero and at 9 o'clock last night the thermometer stood at two above. The mercury is expected to drop to at least four below during the night.

At 9 p.m. winds were blowing at 30 miles per hour with gusts of 48. However they were expected to diminish to 15 and gusting to 25 after midnight.

A 'met' spokesman said last night the 28.4 inches of snow had fallen during the month of December and that yesterday there were 12 inches of snow covering the ground.

The high winds also caused heavy ground drifting and plows were kept busy throughout most of the day keeping the main highways open.

Christmas For Shut-Ins, Ill In Alberton Area Brightened
