

Plan Talks On Farm Marketing

 Ottawa, C.P.—Provincial ministers will meet with Agriculture Minister Gardner behind closed doors April 19 in an attempt to reach some agreement on future farm marketing policies should the Supreme Court of Canada rule invalid the financing methods of current producer marketing boards.

Vital issue in the test case raised by the Ontario government and to come before the court April 24 is whether tolls imposed by provincial boards on their grower members are license fees or indirect taxes. The tolls are used not only to control marketing but in many cases to equalize payments to growers on a pool basis.

There appears to be no doubt that the provinces under the constitution have powers to delegate to the producer boards authority to levy fees for services. But power to levy indirect taxes—tolls that may find their way into consumer prices—is the exclusive right of the federal Parliament.

British Churchman Comments On Exile of Greek Archbishop

LONDON (Reuters)—The Archbishop of Canterbury, primate of the Church of England, said Thursday the arrest and deportation of Greek Orthodox Archbishop Makarios of Cyprus was received by Christian opinion in Britain and elsewhere with "great perplexity and distress."

But the archbishop, Dr. Geoffrey Fisher, stressed the British government's "absolute duty" to restore order in the east Mediterranean island colony, where a wave of violence has gone on since last year to back up Greek Cypriot demands for union with Greece. He suggested a three-point solution to the dispute.

Makarios, leader of the Greek Orthodox church on Cyprus and of the union-with-Greece movement there, was deported by Britain last Friday to the Seychelles islands, along with three other church leaders.

Dr. Fisher, in his first major speech on Cyprus in the House of Lords, outlined this possible solution to end the disturbances there.

1. The government should immediately appoint a competent person or persons to draft a constitution on the lines of recent correspondence between the governor of Cyprus, Sir John Harding, and Makarios. This, he said, has shown a large area of common agreement.
2. When the draft had been drawn up, Greece and Turkey could join with Britain in an immediate appeal to the Cypriots to end the terrorism (Greek Cypriots make up about four-fifths of the island's 515,000 population, with Turkish Cypriots forming most of the minority).
3. Archbishop Makarios should be told his exile would end as soon as public order in Cyprus was restored. He should be assured that when the draft constitution was in being, direct negotiations with him would at once be resumed.

Dr. Fisher said the Greek Orthodox Church regarded the deportation of Makarios—"head of one of the historic churches of the world"—as an act of sacrilege, persecution and barbarism.

"Our friends in Greece and Cyprus must recognize that to us here it seemed shocking that an archbishop should take a lead in political matter and involve himself in all the partialities that political in-

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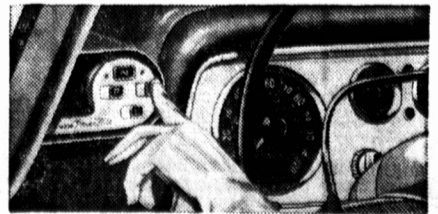
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
