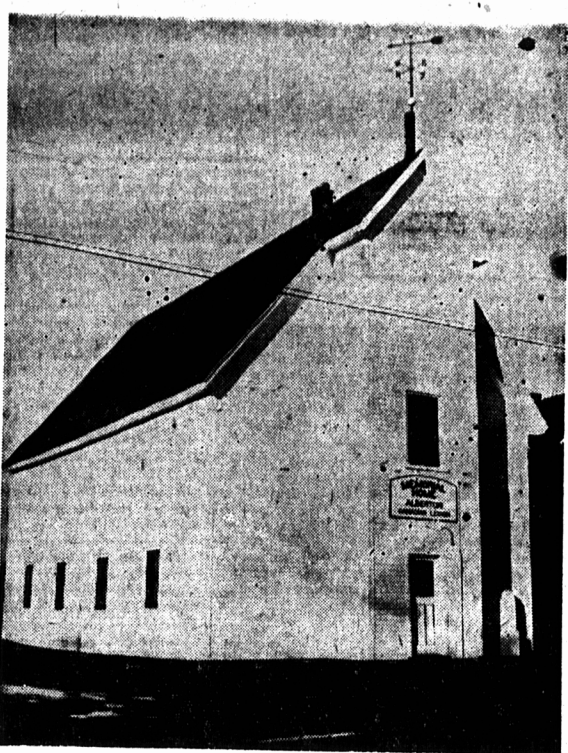

Roman Catholic Archbishop Of Halifax Appointed

OTTAWA, (CP)—Most Rev. Joseph Gerald Berry, Bishop of Peterborough, Ont., has been named Archbishop of Halifax. Msgr. Luigi Dadaglio of the Canadian Catholic Conference announced today. Archbishop Berry, who had been bishop of the Peterborough diocese since April 14, 1946, succeeds Archbishop John T. McVally, who died Nov. 18, 1952.

Token Strike In U. K. Costly

LONDON, (AP)—The biggest industrial strike since 1926 hit Britain Wednesday. It was a 24-hour token walkout to support demands for a 15-per-cent wage boost. Union officials warned that a protracted work stoppage may come later.

Pioneer Fox Rancher Dies At Summerside

A pioneer fox rancher died at his home on Convent Street, Summerside on Tuesday morning, in the person of Mr. J. W. Callbeck. He was 87 years of age. Mr. Callbeck was born at Tryon, a son of the late Albert and Mary Jane Callbeck, and he lived the early part of his life in that district and in Augustine Cove where he farmed. He came to live in Summerside some 46 years ago and purchased several farms north of the town which he made into one large farm. Shortly after coming to Summerside he set up a mill distribution route and continued this for some years.

Sudden Passing Of Prominent Sea View Resident

Residents of Sea View and vicinity learned with regret of the sudden passing at his home early Wednesday morning of Mr. Roy Duggan. He had for some time been subject to heart trouble and it is presumed that this was the cause of his death. The deceased was at one time one of the most prominent fox and mink farmers in the Province and was well known, not only in this Province but in other Provinces as well, for his activities in this industry, in particular with his mink producing strain which was of exceptional high quality.

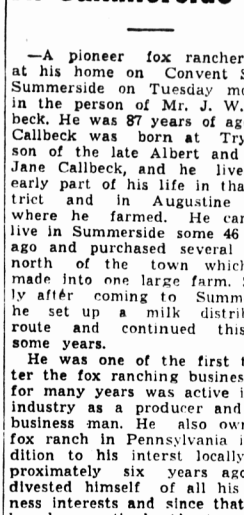
