Dr. Lea said they will be studied and that awarding of a tender will be announced Friday.

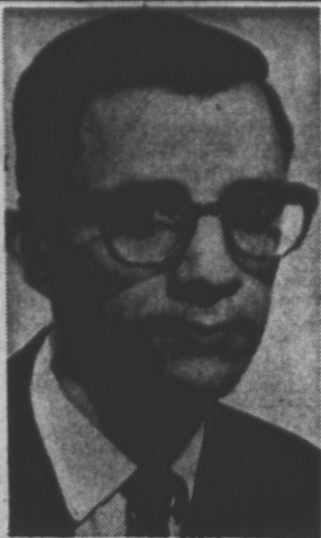
Construction of the school on Spring Park Road is to begin "immediately." The building will be a two-floor structure of 32 class rooms with laboratory facilities and office space.

## PWC Teacher Granted PhD

Ian W. Brown head of the department of history, Prince of Wales College, received a few days ago from Lehigh University a diploma indicating that he has successfully completed the work required to qualify him for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy in History.

Dr. Brown spent three years, 1962-65, at Lehigh which is located in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, U.S.A. He was awarded three research fellowships during these three years.

His doctoral thesis which the university has asked his permission to publish is entitled "The Anglican Evangelicals in British Politics 1780-1833."

Dr. Brown, who was born in Montreal, Quebec, began teaching at PWC in September 1959 and has been there since that time, with the exception of the academic year 1961-62 when he taught at the University of Kentucky.

He is a son of Rev. Harold W. Brown and Mrs. Brown who are now in Ottawa. Rev. Mr. Brown who is an Islander occupied the pulpit in Zion Presbyterian church here for several years. Dr. Brown is married to the former Joan Dickson of Queenston, Ontario, who studied commercial art at the Pratt Institute, Brooklyn, N.Y., prior to her marriage. They have three children, two sons and one daughter.
