### Says Toad Shortage Liable To Curtail Medical Research

LONDON, (CP)—A toad shortage in Britain and South Africa is worrying the British Family Planning Association.

The toads—the male of the common English variety (Bufo Bufo) and the female of a South African species (Xenopus laevis)—are used in human fertility tests. Floods in South Africa and cold weather here are responsible for the shortage.

"If this world shortage continues," said Dr. Barry Carruthers, the association's medical secretary, "medical research and routine work are liable to be severely curtailed."

The toads are used by the association in connection with would-be but unsuccessful parents. Samples of a woman's hormones are injected into the female toad, which will lay eggs within 24 hours if the results are positive. Samples of male sperm are injected into male toads, which then produce sperm in three hours in a positive reaction.
