AMERICAN LEAGUE TIGHTENS

Bucs Split With Braves; Tigers Whip Yanks Twice

Pittsburgh popped in and out of first place in the National League race Sunday by splitting a doubleheader with Milwaukee Braves who had regained the lead by six percentage points by the time the final out was made.

The American League tightened up with New York Yankees dropping a doubleheader to Detroit, which left their lead 4 1/2 games over the runnerup Chicago White Sox. The double victory ran the Tigers' streak to six and boosted them into a fourth place tie with Boston at the 500 mark.

For about two and a half hours, Pittsburgh rested in first place for the first time since June 16, 1948. Milwaukee in the first game of a doubleheader. In '48 they were tied with Boston Braves. This victory gave them a 21-percentage point edge and a 1 1/2 game lead in the won and lost columns.

However, when Milwaukee took the second game 4-3, the Braves regained the percentage point lead

although still trailing by a half game in the won-lost figures. The difference in games played (33 by Milwaukee, 40 by Pittsburgh) permits the percentage variant.

RALLY JUST FAILS

The Pirates, who fought off a ninth-inning threat by Milwaukee of Roy Face, almost pulled out the second game. They had two men on and two out in the ninth when Gene Freese grounded out to end the game.

Cincinnati clung to third place by splitting two with New York. The Redlegs took the opener 7-3 with Frank Robinson and Ray Jablonski each hitting two-run homers. Hank Thompson drove in one run and scored another of the Giants' winning spurt in the seventh inning of the second game for a 4-3 margin although Cincy rallied in the ninth with Gus Bell's second homer of the game and 11th of the year.

Harvey Haddix, an old St. Louis Cardinal, pitched Philadelphia to a 9-3 victory over his old mates in the second game after Murry Dickson, an ex-Phil, pitched St. Louis to a 2-1 triumph in the opener. The even break left the Cards in fourth place.

WHITEY FORD BEATEN

Detroit took New York twice, 6-3, chasing Whitey Ford for the first time this season, and 7-4, with three runs in the 10th inning. Bill Tuttle delivered vital hits in each game. Charley Maxwell homered for Detroit and Yogi Berra and Eddie Robinson for the Yanks in the second game.

Chicago took over second place by thumping Baltimore 12-0 and 9-2 with a total of 29 hits. Dick Donovan coasted home in one run and drove in two others.

In the American League, Kansas City clipped Boston 11-3 behind the pitching of Tom Gorman and Bobby Shantz.

Brooklyn recovered from Saturday's double defeat in Chicago to knock off the last-place Cubs 4-3 when Clem Labine's relief work bailed out bonus southpaw Sandy Koufax in the ninth.

Robert Hyndman Third At Amherst Driving Road-e-o

Marilyn Bell To Attempt To Swim Juan de Fuca Strait

TORONTO (CP) — Marathon swimmer Marilyn Bell, only conqueror of Lake Ontario and the youngest to swim the English channel, is to attempt the west coast's strait of Juan de Fuca this summer, it was announced Saturday.

Prizes totaling \$30,000 have been promised the 17-year-old blonde athlete if she succeeds in conquering the 18.3-mile, tide-hazardous waters between Victoria and Port Angeles, Wash.

She gets \$20,000 for making the attempt, even if she fails. That and an additional \$10,000 for success have been offered by the Telegram and Canadian publications carrying the Weekend Magazine supplement.

She is to make the attempt in late August or early September

after six weeks' training in Victoria.

It is said likely she will swim from Victoria to Port Angeles. Success would make her the first person to swim the strait from the Canadian side.

The only successful crossing from Port Angeles was made last July 8 by U. S. logger Bert Thomas, on the burly ex-frogman's fifth attempt. He is from Tacoma, Wash.

The 270-pound swimmer battled 11 hours 10 minutes in 48-degree water.

The strait so far has defied the efforts of a number of swimmers, including California's Florence Chadwick who has negotiated most of the world's other major water challenges (except Lake Ontario).

New Codfish Grounds Found Off Newfoundland

HALIFAX (CP) — International fisheries officials expect a recent discovery of "excellent" new cod-fishing grounds off the east coast of Newfoundland will increase cod landings in the northwest Atlantic.

The landings last year showed a 26 per cent drop from 1954. The decline was most pronounced in the Newfoundland area, with a corresponding decrease in the production of salt cod.

The International Commission for the Northwest Atlantic Fisheries will be out in force this year. The nations include Canada, United States, Portugal, Spain, France, Italy, Norway and Denmark.

RESEARCH SHOWED WAY

The discovery of the new cod fishing grounds resulted from experiments at the Canadian fisheries biological research station at St. John's, Nfld.

The grounds have been plotted along the northern edge of the Grand Banks, beyond the Strait of Belle Isle and spreading from 10 to 60 miles off shore.

Interest was aroused here by news that the Danish government has a new fisheries research vessel operating in Greenland waters. The vessel will test new fishing methods, explore fishing banks and aid location of fish shoals.

Using a second research cutter, Greenland officials will carry out experimental fishing with a pair-trawl, a system using a large net linked between two vessels.

39 TEAMS ENTER MONTREAL (CP) — Nine two-man teams, including several from Europe, were to take part in the annual six-day marathon bicycle race starting at the Velodrome here Sunday night.

Last year's event was won by Rene Cyr and Fulvio DeBonna of Montreal, who were to defend their title.
