EXPLANATION OF CONTEST

CONTEST RULES

Each week the name of some one or more advertisers on this Bulletin will be taken and words will be listed from the letters making up the name. 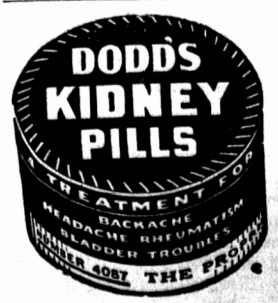

In Memoriam

MR. ROBERT C. CARSON

Robert C. Carson died in the city hospital early Monday morning. He was the victim of a stroke on Sunday morning from which he failed to rally. He had been in poor health for some time due to heart trouble.

The deceased was in his 62nd year. He was born in Brookfield, Prince Edward Island, a member of a family of ten brothers and four sisters. He came west to British Columbia in 1897, and to Prince George in 1921, where he continued to make his home up to the time of his death. He is survived by his widow, six sons and one daughter.
