APPOINTED TRUSTEES.—We hear that Rev. D. R. Reid and Dr. Conroy have been appointed trustees of the estate of the late Thomas Boyce and guardian of his children. They were sworn in on Thursday afternoon before the Judge of Probate.

IN AID OF THE POOR.—A grand concert in aid of the poor will take place in St. Patrick's Hall on Monday evening, April 2nd. Some of the best city talent will take part, and a good evening's enjoyment is assured. Doors open at 7:30; concert at 8.

DIPHTHERIA.—A case of diphtheria has been reported to the secretary of the Board of Health. It is in the house of a Mr. Ferguson, on the corner of Jewell and Water streets. Dr. S. R. Jenkins is in attendance.

AFTER THE CORSET.—The Women's Christian Temperance Union of New York claims that the corset is a link between woman and man. However this may be there is no denying the fact that both sometimes make their victims very tight.

DUTY ON TOBACCO.—The tobacco manufacturers are exhorting their manufacturing agents in anticipation of a raise in duty. On Thursday, Messrs. Hickey & Nicholson exaroused 16,000 lbs. of tobacco, they paid duty amounting to about \$4000.

HANSARD STAFF.—At Ottawa a few days ago, A. C. Campbell, a member of the Hansard staff for many years past, was appointed to the position on Hansard staff made vacant by the death of Mr. J. T. Richardson. The other applicants for the position were H. Burrows, of the Empire, and I. Oxenham, of Charlottetown.

BASKET BALL.—The basket ball match in the Market Hall on Thursday evening between teams from the Y. M. C. A. and the Prince of Wales College was fairly well attended and keenly contested. Two goals were thrown by Raymond from the Y. M. C. A., giving them six points. Two more points were made by the Y. M. C. A. on goals and three by the Prince of Wales team in the same way. Professor Shaw, of the Prince of Wales College, and Dr. H. D. Johnson were referees.

THE TOPIC PARTY.—The Topic Party on Thursday evening, in the lecture room of Prince Street Baptist Church, proved to be a decided treat to those who attended. A programme of more than ordinary merit was followed by the "Topic Party," which was conversation and discussion on chosen subjects by groups of four. The programme included such names as Miss Ed. Fenwick, Mr. Hawley, Miss Coonan of Boston, Rev. Mr. Corey, Miss Winnie Collins, Miss Minnie Wellner, Miss Josie Steadford, Mr. A. Bruce and others, in the order named. The choir of the church also gave a choice chorus, "Daybreak." Each number was enthusiastically received, and the concert was so thoroughly enjoyed that it was not possible to bring it to a close until after 10 o'clock. The subjects for discussion were: (1) "The Last Book I Read"; (2) "A Pneumatic Tube to convey mails and small parcels to and from the island, particularly in winter"; (3) "Salubrious School Libraries"; (4) "Do we have too many evening meetings, Church and Philanthropic, and is the home being neglected therefore?"

THE STEAMER STANLEY.—Yesterday afternoon about two o'clock, the familiar whistle of the Stanley informed our citizens that the gallant steamer was trying to "open navigation." In a short time crowds of people had assembled on the ice to welcome the boat as she broke her way up to the pier. The Stanley made short work of the ice from the block house to town, breaking it easily, and arriving safely at her berth, crowded with the people who had gone out to meet her. The Stanley brought a coal cargo and a large number of passengers. Captain Finlayson reports meeting with a great deal of ice back of Pictou Island and out as far west as Wood Islands. From Wood Islands to Charlottetown harbor there were fairly good fields and considerable open water. Off Connoily's wharf Captain Finlayson says there was about two feet of ice. The Stanley did not proceed to Pictou this morning, because Captain Finlayson considered that she would not be able to enter Pictou harbor on account of last night's storm. She will leave here for Pictou on Monday morning at seven o'clock, and will return to Charlottetown some evening, if possible. Captain Finlayson, however, is of the opinion that it will be impossible to make daily return trips at present.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

AT THE CAPES.—No crossing to-day. SNOW FALL.—A goodly quantity of snow fell during yesterday and last evening.

HE OUGHT TO KNOW.—Erasmus Wiman is to speak in Wilmington, Pa., on the 29th, on "What is the matter with the times?"

ST. DUNSTON'S CATHEDRAL.—Special Easter music at the cathedral to-morrow. The choir will be assisted by an orchestra of six pieces.

GOOD FRIDAY was generally observed. The majority of the stores and places of business were closed during the day. Services were held in the churches as usual.

BASKET SOCIAL.—A basket social and entertainment will be held in the hall at North River on Wednesday evening, 25th, i. e. Doors open at 7 o'clock. Admission 10 cents. Ladies with baskets free.

THEATRICAL.—The Will of the Wisp Company performed in the Masonic Temple on Thursday and Friday evenings. The attendance was small. The company opens at New Glasgow on Monday night.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon two drunks were disposed of for fines of \$1 or five days each; and the defendant in a malicious dog case was ordered to pay a fine of five cents and costs.

CHILD DESERTION.—Some years ago a man named Samuel Ball, belonging to West River, married a young woman named White, by whom he had two children, the eldest of which is three years old and the youngest eighteen months. It appears that Ball and his wife did not get along very well together, and on Monday last they quarrelled and Ball left the island. A day or two afterwards Mrs. Ball, accompanied by her sister, took the train for West River, and on Monday last she reached her father's house. The children were fairly well wrapped up. Mrs. Ball, on seeing the children being left on the ice, and near down to them. She recognized them as her son's, and brought them to her house, where they still remain.

Y. M. C. A.—Mr. Macdonald, of the Guardian, delivered his address on "Taxation" last evening, Principal Seaman, of Upper Prince Street School, presiding. Mr. Macdonald claimed that there was absolutely no necessity for any tax upon buildings, improvements, or any products of labor; neither was there any necessity for a tax on banks, insurance companies or commercial travellers, for all such licenses are really taxes upon trade, and must, in reality, be paid by the consumer. He pointed out that there was a natural fund of revenue in the unearned increment which is that portion of the value of land which the land owners do not make. This fund, he said, of the country, is very small; hence this tax would fall lightly on the farmers and most heavily on the owners of the town and village sites. The address was followed by an animated and most interesting discussion.
