[SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] A Terrible Conflagration. KINGSTON, Ont., July 2. A terrible conflagration is in progress near Mississippi, about ten miles beyond Sharlot Lake. A week ago fire was observed in the bush. On Monday it developed into gigantic proportions, and rushed towards McLaren's Mills. Every effort was made to turn the flames in another direction, but to no purpose, and yesterday word came that the mills were in danger and asking assistance. At latest the flames had entered to the centre of the lumber piles, and there was no hopes of saving the mills which are value at \$50,000. A Terrible Mining Accident. TORONTO, July 2. Twenty-five miners were killed in a British Columbia mine yesterday. An intoxicated man walking on the Canada Pacific track at Hull was killed today. Deaths from Cholera. PARIS, July 2. Between ten o'clock last night and ten this morning, there were five deaths from cholera at Toulon, and two deaths from the same disease at Marseilles last night. Gordon Safe. ASSOUAN, July 2. Col. 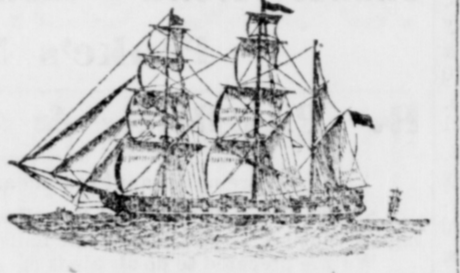
