The Maritime Visit.

MR. BLAKE threw down the gauntlet on his chosen ground, at his chosen time. The Maritime Provinces were, of the whole Dominion, deemed the most favorable point, whence, two years before the final struggle, to begin an attack which the storming party hoped was to result in their occupation of the citadel now held by the strongest Government that ever administered the public affairs of Canada.

This assertion is based on the fact that the people have been convinced that the Government are on the side of right. The coming of Mr. Blake and his friends was headed by a flourish of trumpets such as we never before heard. Mr. Blake was declared to be the greatest statesman, the greatest orator, the purest and best man in Canada.

Mr. Blake provoked enquiry. Sir Leonard Tilley produced convictions.

The Maritime Provinces and Manufactures.

THE facts brought out recently in the St. John Sun and other papers, as also in the speech of the Minister of Finance, clearly show that the Maritime Provinces are the natural seat of the manufactures of the Dominion, and that the introduction of more capital and the continuance of the present National Policy is all that is needed to develop rapidly their wonderful resources.

Already the cheapness of fuel, labor, etc., has enabled the sugar refineries of Halifax and Moncton to send their sugars and syrups past the doors of the Montreal refinery, and find in Ontario and Quebec a larger market than the sparse population of these lower provinces affords.

And what is true of these industries is also true of a number of others, such as car building, etc.—a St. John Manufacturer having secured a large order from the Syndicate in competition with other Canadian manufacturers.

Mr. Blake and the Sugar Duties.

THAT an industry like the sugar refining one, so calculated to benefit the Maritime Provinces, should receive the uncompromising opposition of Mr. Blake is scarcely to be wondered at, when we remember that to the ordinary Ontario Grit anything calculated to foster the progress of the Lower Provinces is so much gall and wormwood.

The Minister of Finance incontrovertibly proved the other night that sugar has not been made one cent dearer to the general public, and that the revenue of the Dominion has not only not suffered, but, on the contrary, has increased some \$46,000 from the alteration of the duty on sugars.

LETTERS patent have been issued incorporating the Canada Grape Sugar Refining Company (limited) with a capital of \$100,000.

LIVE stock in Great Britain during the last two years has diminished more than twelve per cent. There has been a decline of 2,000,000 sheep, and 1,000,000 lambs since 1879.

Laying a Corner Stone.

ABOUT four thousand people assembled at St. Peter's Bay yesterday to witness the interesting ceremony of laying the corner stone of the new church. The new building, which is some ten to fifteen feet above the level of the ground, was seated to hold 2,000 persons, and was completely filled, while many hundreds could not get inside.

Among the clergymen present we observed Rt. Rev. Bishop Sweeney, Rt. Rev. Bishop Rogers, Rt. Rev. Bishop Macdonald, Rt. Rev. Bishop McIntyre, and some twenty Priests from the Island and neighbouring Provinces.

Consecrating a Bishop.

The church of Stella Marie, Pictou, was, on Sunday last, the scene of the consecration of the Rev. Ronald McDonald to the Episcopate of Harbour Grace. The building was prettily decorated with bunting and flower wreaths. The edifice was crowded to the utmost, and numbers were unable to gain admittance.

The new Bishop—the Rev. Ronald McDonald—was born in Ahtagonish County, N. S., and is now forty-six years of age. He commenced his classical studies at Cape George, in the school of Malcolm MacLellan, whose attainments are well known in Eastern Nova Scotia.

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THE NEW COMET.—The new comet is now observable in the north-eastern heavens, near the position first assumed by its predecessor. Though it has been visible for several weeks, there are comparatively few citizens who have caught sight of it.

MR. DAVID MOORE of Ottawa, has been offered by an English company three hundred thousand dollars for the timber limit in which he holds on the line of the Canada Pacific Railway.

CHARLES STEWART, a colored man of Bay St. Louis, Mississippi, suspected of wife murder, was taken from gaol and hanged by a mob of negroes. His father-in-law was one of the most active of the lynchers.

A NUMBER of agricultural delegates from the European continent have sailed for Canada on the invitation of the Minister of Agriculture, who has asked them to visit the Canadian North-West.

THE illness of Vice-President Arthur from cholera morbus creates much excitement in Washington, and a good deal of speculation as to the succession if both his case and that of President Garfield should terminate fatally.

FRESH troubles are reported at Susa, and it is said that four Europeans have been killed by the Mahomedans. The commander of the British ironclad Monarch has ordered a number of marines ashore to protect the Europeans.

TWO years ago, at the general election, Dr. Christie was elected in Argenteuil by a majority of 59, as a protest against the National Policy. Two years later Mr. Abbott is elected over Dr. Christie by a majority of 150 as a declaration in favor of the National Policy.

DROWNED.—Two men named Andrew Robertson and John Elliot, belonging to Fredericton, were drowned in a mill pond on Sunday last.

RAILWAY WASHOUTS.—The heavy rains of the past few days have caused several serious washouts on the St. John and Maine Railway.

THE benefits of the Scott Act were apparent at St. Peter's Bay yesterday. Some four or five thousand persons assembled and passed the day in pleasant social intercourse. Not an angry word was uttered during the entire day.
